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*Plymouth, July 23.*

**O**N Wednesday last in the evening arrived here Sir *Thomas Allen* with the Squadron under his Command, and the last night put again to sea.

Yesterday his Excellency the Lord *Howard*, Ambassador to the Emperour of *Morocco*, embarked himself with all his Train, and this morning put to sea in Order to his voyage.

*Dantzic, July 9.* From *Warsaw* we are informed that the Grand Marshal *Sobieski* had for some time appeared dissatisfied with the Election, and particularly complained that there was not a due care taken for the payment of the Arrears of the Army, which being perceived by several discontented Officers of the Army, they applied themselves to him, and endeavoured to persuade him to draw the Army into a Confederacy, to declare against the Elector, and to insist upon their full satisfaction in point of pay, but he reproving their heat, declared to them his resolution never to bear Arms against his own Countrey, nor to be any way concerned in any civil Dissensions, telling them that he had hitherto made use of all his interest to procure the payment of the Army, but for the future would rest satisfied with what should be thought fit by the Republick. The Letters adding, that the said Marshal has by his example and good advice, prevailed with all the principal Officers of the Army to do the like, so that though for some time there was much fear left the Nation might be drawn into some great disorders, all things are now composed and in a quiet posture. The same Letters affirming, that the King is now in a good state of health, and has since his Election received Presents from the Great Lords, of very considerable value.

*Hambourgh, July 25.* The Duke of *Saxe Lawenbourg*, who lately departed from this place, arrived the 23 instant at *Eremen* with all his Family, and was met and received by the Magistrates with much honour and respect, and the next day with as much Ceremony attended out of the Town on his way for *Holstein*.

From *Stockholme* we are told, that the Frigate called *Amaranthè* is there fitting up, being designed for the transportation of the Herr *Grotius*, Ambassador from the States of the *United Provinces*, into *Pomerania*, and afterwards to attend the Sieur *Abraham de Eyck*, the Swedes Envoy into *Holland*, with a proposal as well to them as other foreign Nations, that in the voyage of their Merchants ships to *Merua*, *Rivel* and *Riga*, or other parts beyond them, they shall not be obliged to pay above two per Cent. Cukome at Entry or going out, which shall not at any time be increased upon them, nor shall any other imposition be required of them between those places and *Moscow*; that the Russians shall not be obliged to any higher Custom than they formerly have paid, that all strangers shall have an equal Trade with those of their own Nation, with liberty to have their own Magazines, and enjoy with freedom their own Religion; that their Goods shall not be subject to Arrest, but onely upon the account of Treason; as also that Vessels and Boats shall be appointed for the service and conveniency of Merchants, and that as it may be thought requisite, several other priviledges shall be granted for the conveniency and advantage of Trade.

Letters of the 10th instant from *Neuburg* advise us, that the Duke of that name arrived there the Friday before the Date of the said Letters, much discomposed both

in mind and body by reason of his long journey, and the ill success of his very expenceful design in *Poland*.

From *Poland* they write; that although some dissatisfactions have lately risen amongst some of the Grandees upon private accounts, all things are now friendly composed, and the people generally well satisfied with their Election, the King having much obliged them by conferring the great Offices and vacant Charges of the Kingdom upon none but Natives, and that the Protestants seem also to have as much satisfaction as the rest, having greater hopes of Protection and Toleration under his Government, then they have yet enjoyed under that of his Predecessors.

From *Copenhagen* we are informed that His Majesty has employed the Governours son-in-law as his Envoye to *Poland* to Compliment the new King upon his Election to that Crown, who is accordingly embarked upon a Yacht intending for *Dantzic*.

*Thoulon, July 22.* A Barke from *Morrea* arriving the 19 instant at *Cassis* 2 miles distant from this place, informes, that passing by *Milo*, he was met by a *Polach* lately put out from *Standia*, which affirmed that the succors under the command of the Duke of *Beaufort* arrived there the 22. of the last month: and that the Duke himself went to visit the City of *Candia*, where he was received with the discharge of all their Artillery, and the shouts and acclamations of the people, and that in viewing the posture of the Enemy, he had received a slight hurt by a hand Granado; but expected the Gallies upon whose arrival he intended to enter upon Action and endeavor to raise the Siege.

Letters from *Candia* bearing date the 13 of *June* give this account of the state of the Town, That the *Turks* had raised a battery upon the Bastion *St. Andre*, whereupon they had planted ten Guns with which they playd continually upon the Retrenchment, with such success, that they had dismounted several of the Defendants Cannon, and did so much execution within the Town, that none durst hazard themselves in fight of the Enemy. Infomuch as General *Morosini* had called together all his Engineers, to consider of the best ways of securing the place from the great danger which that way threatened the Town, who advised the making of an Inward Retrenchment, but feared they should not have time enough for so great a work. Only the Chevalier *de Vernade* undertook the making good that Post for Twenty days against the *Turks*, before the expiration of which time they hoped for the arrival of their Succors.

*Amsterdam, July 30.* The Heer *Thissen* who commanded the Fleet of ships lately arrived from the *East Indies*, was lately to attend the States-General at the place of their Assembly, to whom he delivered the Journal of all things of any moment which passed in those parts the last year.

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
