Concerning COLOURS to be worn on Board Ships.

Hercas divers of Our Subjects have of late prefumed on Board their Ships to wear Our Jacks, Pendants and Enfishs, which according to Ancient Usage have been appointed as a Distinction for Our Ships, and many times thinking to enale the Punishment due for the sunce, have worn Jacks, Pendants and Ensigns in shape and mixture of Colours, so little disterent from Ours, as not, without Dissiulty, to be Distinguished therefrom, which Practice is found attended with manifold Incorveniencies: For prevention whereof for the sucure. We have thought sic, and, with the Advice of Our Privy Council, by this Our Royal Proclamation, do strictly Charge and Command all Our Subjects whissover, that they do not presume to wear in any of their Ships or Vessels, Our Jack, commonly called, The Union Jack, nor any Pendants, nor any such Ensigns or Colours in the facture. We have trougen in the out of our Privy Charge and Command all Our Subjects whisforver, That they do not prefirme to wear in any of their Sips or Vessels, our Jack, commonly cused. The Union Jack, nor any Pendants, nor any such Ensigns or Colours as at alliantly born by Our Sips, without particular Witners in the Lord High Admiral of England, or the Commissioners for Executing, the Office of Lord High Admiral for the time being. Dimtzick, Dec. 9. N. S. Letters from Wanfirm of the 2d Instant say, the King of Sweden was come with his Army as far as Semionir, where the Princes Alexander and Constantines, Sons to the late King of Poland, had been to wait upon him; and that they were afterwards gone towards the Country of Rustand, with intent, as it is stufpected, to make an Interest in favour of the Swedes among the Forces of the Crown which are quartered on that side. The Princes of the Family of Sapieba were shortly expected in the Buedish Camp. The Swedes exact great Contributions from the Country this which they pass. Our Advices say, part of their Troops are advanced as far as Winfirm. They write from Thorn, that the Great Council of the Nobility of Poland and Lithuania continues assembled in that Town, but has not yet taken any Resolution upon the several Marters before them; That it was much discourfed there, that a great number of the Nobility of the Greater Poland had entred into a Confederacy against the Swedes; That the Cardinal Primate having complained to the King of Poland, that some of his Troops had taken Quarters upon his Estate, they were ordered to remove from thence; And that Monsieur Du Heron, the French Envoy, who is n Custody for his unhandsome Carriage at the Court of Poland, having andeavoured to prevail with the Officer, to whose Care he is committed, to fuffer him to make his Estape, by offering him a Reward of 1000 Dollars, and a Regiment in the French King's Service, if he would go with him, the Officer immediately gave Notice thereof to the Court; whereupon Orders were given, that the Envoy be kept under cloie Continement. The King of Poland having expressed some Relentment against this City, upon the occasion of the Dispute which happened lately between our Burghers and ione of his Saxon Soldiers that were marching by this Place, our Magnitares have furt Deputies to make a true kepresentation of that Matter to his Majesty.
