Acts; they may not make more than two attempts in all and these must be made not later than the third examination held under these Regulations after the completion of national service. The date officially recorded as the last day of national service is normally the last day of demobilisation or release leave: candidates are not however, procluded from leave; candidates are not, however, precluded from competing at an examination held during their demobilisation or release leave.

4. Health and Character. Successful candidates must satisfy the Civil Service Commissioners as to their health and character.

5. Examination. The candidates will undergo a written examination consisting of papers in English and Arithmetic, three General Papers, and a test of

General Intelligence.

Of the candidates who obtain the highest marks in the written examination a certain number, to be fixed by the Commissioners, will be summoned to an interview at which the Interviewing Board will award each candidate a mark for his record and personal

The final order of merit will be determined by combining the marks for written examination and interview.

Candidates who have been trained as teachers and upon whose training public money has been spent, cannot be appointed until the consent of the appropriate central education authority (e.g., the Ministry of Education, the Scottish Education Department, the Ministry of Education for Northern Ireland) has been notified to the Commissioners. to the Commissioners.
- 7. Assignment. The Commissioners will decide to which Department each successful candidate is to be assigned. A candidate who declines to accept the post offered will have no claim to be assigned to another, but will be regarded as having declined appointment. Assignments will be made in accordance with the needs of the public service, but the wishes of candidates will, where possible, be taken into account. into account.

8. Fee. A fee of 15s. is payable by all candidates. This must be sent with the application form, and is not returnable in any circumstances.
