baken; but the flumber of our killed and wounded did not amount to halt that of the enemy. Matters being disposed for assaulting the first Counterscarp on the Prince of Hess's side, in order to make a Lodgment, the Attack was begun about 8 the same evaning, commanded by Major-General Tettase, and Brigauer-General Palant, the Prince being there in Person. Our Men went on with such Resolution, being tavoured by a continual fire of the Cannon and Mortars from our several Attacks, that in less than an hour's time they had beat the Enemy from their Works, and made their Lodgment. The 14th, about 3 in the asternoon, the Enemy beat a Parley, and at 6 the Holtages were exchanged; but the Conditions on which they proposed to surrender the Town were not produced tall yesterday, which being very extravagant, were rejected, and others sent in by his Grace the Duke of Mariborough, and after several Messages to and sto, the Capitalation was agreed upon about 11 last night, and are ligned and exchanged this morning. Paris, May 11. The French Court was to have gone next week to Marli, but the Durchels of Burgundy being Indisposed, that Journey is pur off for the present. Letters from Nimes of the 29th past give an Account, That the Marshal de Montrevel had caused most of the Inhabitants of Saumanes Miralet, and other Neighbouring Villages to be seized, for corresponding with the Malontents of the Sevennes, and that a great number of them were sent to Sea, in order to be put on board the Gallies, or transported to our Plantations in the West-Indies; and that he was since marched into the Meuntains of the Sevennes, in order to attack the Malecontents. He has with him about 13000 Men of the King's Troops, and expects a Regiment of Dragoons, and 6 Batalions more. There are Letters from Marieilles of the 30th which say, the Inhabitants of that Place had mutinied, upon the Occation of the Capitation-Tax, and had killed their Consul. Our Advices from Italy bring nothing centiderable, the Season being yet too bad for the Forces of either fide to enter upon Action.

We have been very much furprized to hear that the French advanced on a fudden surprized to hear that the French advanced on a sudden the 9th Instant at night, to the number of above 40000 Men, into the Neighbourhood of Tongeren, the Marshal de Bonsslers coming up with part of these Forces on one side of the Town, and the Marshal de Villeroy with the rest on the other, so that our Troops, which were marching to post themselves there, were oblighed to return with all diligence under the Cannon of Mastricht. The Enemy attacked Tongeren, where two Battalions of Foot were quartered, who desended themselves 28 hours, and then were forced to surrender at Discretion. Their vigorous Resistance gave an opportunity to our Troops to draw together before Mastricht; so that when the Enemy attenwards advanced towards them, with a design, as is thought, Mastricht; so that when the Enemy attenwards advanced towards them, with a design, as is thought, of obliging our Horse, as they did the last year, to repais the Macse at Nimeghen, and cur Foot to retire into the Outworks of Massicht, and there to Bombard them, they found, to their great disappointment, the Army drawn up in order of Battel, advantagiously posted, and ready to engage them, though the Enemy were much superiour in number; So after having continued some hours in sight, they marched back to Fongeren, where they are still, encamped.
