7. Candidates Trained as Teachers.

Persons upon whose training for the occupation of teacher public money has been spent cannot be appointed until the consent of the appropriate central education authority (e.g. the Ministry of Education, the Scottish Education Department, the Ministry of Education for Northern Ireland) has been notified to the Commissioners.

8. Canvassing.

Any attempt on the part of candidates to enlist support for their application through Members of Parliament or other influential persons, except as referees to be named by them on their application forms, will disqualify them for appointment.

9. Fee

A successful candidate will be required to pay the appropriate fee before the issue of a Certificate of Qualification for appointment, viz.:—

The Civil Service Commissioners hereby give notice that the following Regulations are published with the approval of the Lords Commissioners of H.M. Treasury, viz.:—

RECRUITMENT UNDER NORMAL REGULATIONS OF ASSISTANT TRAFFIC SUPERINTENDENTS (MALE AND FEMALE) IN THE TELECOMMUNICATION SERVICE OF THE POST OFFICE.

1. Age.

Candidates must be at least 17½ and under 23 years of age on the 1st March, 1951. *But*

(a) a candidate who has served or is serving on a regular (including a regular short-service) engagement in H.M. Forces may deduct the period of such service from his actual age;

(b) a candidate who has served in H.M. Forces otherwise than on a regular or short-service engagement may deduct the period of such service from his actual age, up to a maximum of two years;

(c) candidates who have served in any established post to which they were admitted with the Certificate of the Civil Service Commissioners, or who have served on established conditions except for sick leave and pension in a post to which such a certificate would normally apply, may deduct from their actual age any time not exceeding two years which they have spent in such service before 1st March, 1951.

2. Sex and Marriage.

(i) Both men and women may compete under these Regulations.

(ii) Married women who have formerly been established Civil Servants and have drawn marriage gratuity (other than those who resigned compulsorily on marriage and whose resignation took effect before 15th October, 1946, or who are widows or divorced, or who are separated from their husbands, or whose husbands suffer without hope of recovery from total physical or mental incapacity) will not be eligible unless they undertake to refund on appointment the marriage gratuity paid.

3. Nationality.

Candidates must be British subjects. They must also satisfy one of the following conditions:—

(a) If natural-born British subjects, they must either

(i) have at least one parent who is or was at death a British subject; or

(ii) have resided in His Majesty's dominions and/or been employed elsewhere in the service of the Crown for at least five years out of the last eight years preceding the date of their appointment.

(b) If naturalised British subjects, they must have resided in His Majesty's dominions and/or been employed elsewhere in the service of the Crown for at least five years out of the last eight years preceding the date of their appointment.

(c) If not qualified under (a) or (b) of this paragraph, they must satisfy the Commissioners

that they are so closely connected with His Majesty's dominions either by ancestry, upbringing, or residence, or by reason of national service that an exception may properly be made in their favour.

4. Health and Character.

Successful candidates must satisfy the Civil Service Commissioners as to their health and character.

Candidates must offer all the compulsory subjects (1) to (4) and any two subjects chosen from the optional subjects (5) to (11).

Every candidate must attain in each subject he or she offers, and in the examination as a whole, such a standard as to satisfy the Civil Service Commissioners.

Of those who obtain the highest aggregate marks in the Written Examination a certain number to be determined by the Commissioners will be admitted to Part II of the examination. The order of merit of the candidates will be determined by the aggregate marks in the whole examination.

6. Candidates trained as Teachers.

Candidates who have been trained as teachers and upon whose training public money has been spent, cannot be appointed until the consent of the appropriate central education authority (e.g., the Ministry of Education, the Scottish Education Department, the Ministry of Education for Northern Ireland) has been notified to the Commissioners.

7. Fee.

A fee of 15s. is payable by all candidates. This must be sent with the application form and is not returnable in any circumstances.

The Civil Service Commissioners further give notice that an Open Competition will be held under the above Regulations, the written examination beginning on the 22nd May, 1951.

No person will be admitted to the competition from whom the Secretary of the Civil Service Commission has not received on or before the 29th March, 1951, an application on the prescribed form, a copy of which may be obtained from the Secretary at once.

CITY AND COUNTY OF NEWCASTLE UPON TYNE.

Whereas the Mayor, Aldermen and Citizens of the City and County of Newcastle upon Tyne (hereinafter called "the Corporation") have made application to the Minister of Local Government and Planning (hereinafter called "the Minister") for the issue of an order under section 303 of the Public Health Act, 1875, partly to alter or amend section 56 of the Newcastle upon Tyne Improvement Act, 1882, (hereinafter called "the local Act") so as:—

(1) to authorise the Corporation (a) to close from the 22nd April, 1951, to the 8th July, 1951, a part of the park known as Exhibition Park, and comprising 1.69 acres or thereabouts, for the purposes of an industrial exhibition;

(b) to charge for admission to such part a sum not exceeding one shilling and sixpence for each adult person and ninepence for each child.

(2) for the several purposes of the application, or for purposes connected with, incidental to or consequent on those purposes, to make any such alteration or amendment of the said local Act, or of any other local Act, or of any Act confirming a Provisional Order made in pursuance of any of the Sanitary Acts or of the Public Health Act, 1875, and in force in the City and County of Newcastle upon Tyne, as may be necessary or desirable:
