Rome, May 12. N. S. Franciscan Fryar, named Diaz, who was Confeilor to the late King of Spain, having, some time after that Prince's Death, openly declared that he doubted of the Truth and Validity of the Will which is attributed to him, incurred the Displeature of the French Faction here, who endeavoured to feize him, with intent to fend him to Spain or Naples, where he would have met with very levere Ulage. To prevent this the Pope caused him to be confined in the Cathe of St. Angelo, and he has continued there about a year and half; but (at the imperial Ambashador's Defire he was brought from thence iast week to his Excellency's House, and he intends to depart very foon for Germany. The Spanish Amballador, to thew his Retentment at the Pope's ordering a Guard to be placed near his House, by reason of the diforderly Behaviour of his Servants, retired to a Country House not far from this City, declaring he would not return till this Guard was removed; but this Court took no notice of it, and he has at last been forced to comply, and is come back to his House, notwithstanding the Guard continues polted in the fame place. Two Congregations of State were held this week, wherein the Pope was present, to con-ialt upon the Means to raise Money for the Substitute of his Forces, and several Taxes were proposed, particulary one upon the Clergy, but none of them were agreed upon; and it was resolved at last to take up by way of Loan 150000 Crowns from the Bank of this City; betides which it is faid Cardinal Negroni offers to lend the Pope 2 very confiderable Sum, whole Example may prove an Encouragement to others to do the like. Cardinal San Celareo is also gone to Gennia, to endeavour to borrow Money from that Republick.
