DISEASES OF ANIMALS ACT, 1950.

Notice is hereby given in pursuance of Section 85 (3) of the Diseases of Animals Act, 1950, that the Minister of Agriculture and Fisheries has made the following Orders:—

Statutory Instruments 1952 No. 190.

The Foot-and-Mouth Disease (Infected Areas) Special Order No. 12, 1952. (Made 1st February, 1952.)

Contracts, as from 4th February, 1952, the Foot-and-Mouth Disease Infected Area around Seaton, Hull, Yorkshire, declared by the Foot-and-Mouth Disease (Infected Areas) Special Order No. 5, 1952, and extended by Special Order No. 11, 1952, to an area comprising the districts situate within approximately 5 miles of Aldbrough, Hornsea and Hull, Yorkshire

Statutory Instruments 1952 No. 200.

The Live Poultry (Restrictions) Order, 1952. (Made 30th January, 1952.)

This Order, which came into operation on 4th February, 1952, revokes the Orders named in the Third Schedule thereto and re-enacts certain of their provisions.

It prohibits the holding of poultry shows and of sales of store poultry in the area specified in the First Schedule, and also restricts sales of poultry intended for immediate slaughter and the movement of poultry (including day-old chicks) into, within and out of that area. In the remainder of England and in Wales the holding of sales of store poultry and of poultry intended for immediate slaughter is permitted under licence. The movement of poultry from premises on to which there has been a movement of poultry during the previous 28 days and also the

movement of poultry (including day-old chicks) and hatching eggs from any other part of Great Britain into Scotland and the Isles of Scilly is prohibited. The Order contains provisions that apply to the whole of Great Britain, relating to the keeping of records, the cleanliness of poultry crates and the consignment of poultry to railway stations.

Statutory Instruments 1952 No. 204.

The Foot-and-Mouth Disease (Infected Areas) Special Order No. 13, 1952. (Made 2nd February, 1952.)

Revokes Article 3 of the Foot-and-Mouth Disease (Infected Areas) Special Order No. 9, 1952.

Statutory Instruments 1952 No. 218.

The Foot-and-Mouth Disease (Infected Areas) Special Order No. 14, 1952. (Made 4th February, 1952.)

1. Declares an area comprising the districts situate within approximately 15 miles of Burton Lazars, Melton Mowbray, Leicestershire, to be an Infected Area for the purpose of preventing the spreading of foot-and-mouth disease, to which Area the provisions of the Foot-and-Mouth Disease (Infected Areas Restrictions) Order of 1938 are applied. The area subject to restrictions lies in the counties of Leicester, Lincoln (Parts of Kesteven), Nottingham and Rutland.

2. Revokes Special Order No. 6, 1952, and Article 2 of Special Order No. 9, 1952.

In the last six columns of the Account, therefore, the figures appropriate to the National Bank of Scotland, Ltd. appear opposite the name of the Union Bank of Scotland, Ltd., and vice versa.
