The Civil Service Commissioners hereby give notice that the following Regulations are published with the approval of the Lords Commissioners of H.M. Treasury, viz.:—

Recruitment under Normal Regulations of Sea Transport Officer (Male) in the Ministry of Transport.

Candidates must be at least 35 years of age on the 1st January, 1952. The Commissioners have not specified an upper age limit for this competition. In general, however, Government Departments require a reasonable period of service from persons newly appointed to the Civil Service; and accordingly the Commissioners reserve the right to give weight to this factor in considering candidates for these posts who are over 50 years of age.

2. Sex.

3. Nationality.

(b) If naturalised British subjects, they must have resided in Her Majesty's dominions and/or been employed elsewhere in the service of the Crown for at least five years out of the last eight years preceding the date of their appointment.

(c) If not qualified under (a) or (b) of this paragraph they must satisfy the Commissioners that they are so closely connected with Her Majesty's dominions either by ancestry, upbringing or residence, or by reason of national service, that an exception may properly be made in their favour.

Candidates at the date of making application must (a) possess at least a Master's Certificate of Competency and be fully experienced in liner trades, or (b) have had suitable experience in the Royal Navy and have held a rank not below that of Lieutenant Commander.

Competition.

Those candidates who from their applications appear most suitable will be invited to attend for interview before a Board consisting of representatives interview before a Board consisting of representatives of the Civil Service Commissioners and the Ministry of Transport.
