*Civil Service Commission, 2nd May, 1952.*

The Civil Service Commissioners hereby give notice that the following Regulations are published with the approval of the Lords Commissioners of H.M. Treasury, viz.:—

RECONSTRUCTION COMPETITION FOR THE APPOINTMENT OF ILLUSTRATORS IN VARIOUS GOVERNMENT DEPARTMENTS.

1. *Age.*

Candidates must be at least 21 and under 47 years of age on 1st January, 1952, i.e., they must have been born on or after 2nd January, 1905, and on or before 1st January, 1931.

BUT

a candidate who has served or is serving on a regular (including a regular short-service) engagement in H.M. Forces may deduct the period of such service from his actual age.

2. *Sex.*

Both men and women may compete under these Regulations.

3. *Nationality.*

Candidates must be British subjects. They must also satisfy one of the following conditions:—

(a) If natural-born British subjects, they must either

(i) have at least one parent who is, or was at death, a British subject; or

(ii) have resided in Her Majesty's dominions and/or been employed elsewhere in the service of the Crown for at least five years out of the last eight years preceding the date of their appointment.

(b) If naturalised British subjects, they must have resided in Her Majesty's dominions and/or been employed elsewhere in the service of the Crown for at least five years out of the last eight years preceding the date of their appointment.

(c) If not qualified under (a) or (b) of this paragraph they must satisfy the Commissioners that they are so closely connected with Her Majesty's dominions either by ancestry, upbringing or residence, or by reason of national service, that an exception may properly be made in their favour.

Provided that a candidate will not be eligible for appointment to the Admiralty, or Ministry of Supply unless he or she is a natural-born British subject and born within the United Kingdom or in one of the self-governing Dominions, or parents also born within the United Kingdom or in one of the self-governing Dominions, except when the circumstances are such as to justify a departure from the general rule, in which case, provided the candidate satisfies

the conditions prescribed by the preceding paragraphs, he or she may be admitted to competition or appointment by special permission of the First Lord of the Admiralty, or Minister of Supply, as the case may be.

4. *Qualifications.*

Candidates must have had at least five years' training and experience of illustrative work. This must consist of at least one year on practical art work in the Civil Service or outside industry or a combination of the two; the remainder of the five years must have been spent in one or more of the following ways:—

(a) Full-time employment on practical art work in the Civil Service.

(b) Full-time employment on practical art work in outside industry.

(c) Full-time training at a recognised art school.

5. *Health and Character.*

Every successful candidate must satisfy the Commissioners as to his or her health and character.

6. *Competition.*

The Commissioners may summon to appear before a Selection Board all who are found to be *prima facie* eligible, or may, if they see fit, summon only those whose qualifications and experience are considered to be specially suitable for the posts for which they are being considered. The Board will take into consideration the candidates' record of education, experience, and certified samples of their work which they will be asked to bring with them, any recommendation from persons named by the candidates as having direct knowledge of their work in the past, and the personal qualities of the candidates as shown at the interview; and on their estimation of all the above facts they will frame their recommendations. The decision of the Civil Service Commissioners shall be final.

7. *Candidates trained as Teachers.*

Persons upon whose training for the occupation of teacher public money has been spent cannot be appointed until the consent of the appropriate central education authority (e.g. the Ministry of Education, the Scottish Education Department, the Ministry of Education for Northern Ireland) has been notified to the Commissioners.

8. *Assignment.*

Candidates will be required to state on their application forms for which Department or Departments they are competing. In the case of candidates who are declared successful for more than one Department, it will rest with the Commissioners to determine the Department to which they shall be assigned, due regard being paid, as far as possible, to the preference of the candidates.

9. *Canvassing.*

Any attempt on the part of candidates to enlist support for their applications through Members of Parliament or other influential persons, except as referees to be named by them in their Application Forms, will disqualify them for appointment. The Selection Board will disregard spontaneous recommendations from persons who are not personally acquainted with the candidate's work, whether at school, or other educational institution, in the Forces, or otherwise.

10. *Fee.*

A successful candidate shall be required to pay a fee of 12s. 6d. before the issue of a certificate of qualification for appointment.
