WHEREAS the Church Commissioners have duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a Scheme bearing date the 17th day of July, 1952, in the words and figures following, that is to say:—

"We, the Church Commissioners, in pursuance of the Church Patronage Act, 1870, and of the Acts mentioned therein, have prepared the following Scheme for effecting a transfer of the ownership of the advowson or perpetual right of patronage of and presentation to the church and cure (hereinafter called 'the said benefice') of Diss in the diocese of Norwich.

"Whereas we are satisfied that Muriel Sinclair Manning, of 9, Battery End, Wash Common, Newbury in the county of Berks Spinster is the patron or person entitled to present or nominate to the said benefice in case the same were now vacant:

"And whereas the said Muriel Sinclair Manning desires to transfer the advowson of the said benefice to the Bishop of Norwich for the time being and is consenting to this Scheme (in testimony whereof she has executed the same):

"And whereas we are satisfied that the transfer will tend to make better provision for the cure of souls:

"Now, therefore, with the consent of the Right Reverend Percy, Bishop of Norwich (in testimony whereof he has executed this Scheme), we, the said Church Commissioners, humbly recommend and propose that upon and from the day of the date of the publication in the London Gazette of any Order of Your Majesty in Council ratifying this Scheme and without any conveyance or assurance in the law other than such duly gazetted Order, the whole advowson or perpetual right of patronage of and presentation to the said benefice shall be transferred to the said Percy, Bishop of Norwich and his successors in the same Bishopric and shall thereupon and thenceforth become and be absolutely vested in and shall and may from time to time be exercised by the Bishop of Norwich for the time being."

And whereas the said Scheme has been approved by Her Majesty in Council:

WHEREAS the Church Commissioners have duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a

Scheme bearing date the 12th day of June, 1952, in the words and figures following, that is to say:

"We, the Church Commissioners, acting in pursuance of the Pastoral Reorganisation Measure, 1949, and of the Union of Benefices Measures, 1923 to 1936, now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council the following Scheme which we have prepared with the consent of the Right Reverend John, Bishop of Derby (in witness whereof he has signed the Scheme), for effecting the union of the benefice of Etwall and the benefice of Egginton both situate in the Diocese of Derby.

"SCHEME.

"1. *Union of Benefices.* The benefice of Etwall and the benefice of Egginton shall be permanently united together and form one benefice with cure of souls under the style of 'The United Benefice of Etwall and Egginton' but the parishes of the said benefices shall continue in all respects distinct.

"2. *Taking effect of union.* If upon the date when any Order of Your Majesty in Council affirming this Scheme is published in the London Gazette the benefice of Egginton shall be vacant the union shall forthwith take effect, but if upon that day the said benefice shall be full, the union shall take effect immediately upon the first vacation thereafter of the said benefice and the Reverend James Hodgson if he is at the relevant date incumbent of the said benefice of Etwall shall with his consent (testified by his signature hereto), be the first incumbent of the united benefice.

"3. *Parsonage house.* Upon the union taking effect the parsonage house at present belonging to the benefice of Etwall shall be the house of residence of the incumbent of the united benefice, and the parsonage house belonging to the benefice of Egginton and the site and appurtenances thereof and the grounds heretofore usually occupied and enjoyed therewith shall as soon as conveniently may be, be sold and disposed of by us, the said Church Commissioners, at such time or times and in such manner in all respects as to us shall seem expedient and the net proceeds of such sale or sales shall be appropriated to the Expenses Fund of the diocese of Derby established pursuant to the said Union of Benefices Measures.

"4. *Patronage.* After the union has taken effect the right of presentation to the united benefice shall be exercised by the patrons of the two benefices in a series of four turns, the patron of the benefice of Etwall having the first turn and the patrons of the benefice of Egginton having the second, third and fourth turns in the same order of turns between themselves as that in which they are at present entitled to present to the benefice of Egginton.

"5. *Diversion of Endowments.* Upon the union taking effect a capital sum of £2,696 15s. 5d. producing an annual income of £89 and being part of a larger sum held by us for the endowment of the benefice of Egginton shall be severed and diverted from the said benefice of Egginton and from the united benefice and shall be appropriated and held by us for the augmentation of the benefice of Cubley with Marston Montgomery."

And whereas the provisions of the Union of Benefices Measures, 1923 to 1936, and the Union of Benefices Rules, 1926 and 1930, and the Pastoral Reorganisation Measure, 1949, relating to the preparation and submission of this Scheme have been duly complied with:

And whereas the said Scheme has been approved by Her Majesty in Council:

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to affirm the said Scheme and to order that it shall be and become effectual in law immediately upon the publication of this Order in the London Gazette.
