WHEREAS the Church Commissioners have duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a Scheme bearing date the 24th day of October, 1952, in the words and figures following, that is to

say:—
"We, the Church Commissioners, in pursuance of the Church Patronage Act, 1870, and the Acts mentioned therein, have prepared the following Scheme for effecting a transfer of the ownership of the advowson or perpetual right of patronage of and presentation to the church and cure (hereinafter called 'the said benefice') of Erith, in the diocese of Rochester of Rochester.

"Whereas we are satisfied that Harry George Best and Frank Charles Best, as the executors of the last surviving executor of the Will of Philip George, 6th Baron Wynford, late of Wynford Eagle in the County of Dorset, are the patrons or persons entitled to present or nominate to the said benefice in case the same were now vacant:

"And whereas the said Harry George Best and Frank Charles Best desire to transfer the advowson of the said benefice to the Bishop of Rochester for the time being and are consenting to this Scheme.

"And whereas we are satisfied that the transfer will tend to make better provision for the cure of souls:

"Now, therefore, with the consent of the Right Reverend Christopher, Bishop of Rochester (in Reverend Christopher, Bishop of Rochester (in testimony whereof he has executed this Scheme), we, the said Church Commissioners, humbly recommend and propose that upon and from the day of the date of the publication in the London Gazette of any Order of Your Majesty in Council ratifying this Scheme and without any conveyance or assurance in the law other than such duly gazetted Order, the in the law other than such duly gazetted Order, the whole advowson or perpetual right of patronage of and presentation to the said benefice shall be transferred to the said Christopher, Bishop of Rochester, and his successors in the same Bishopric and shall thereupon and thenceforth become and be absolutely vested in and shall and may force the total be absoluted. vested in and shall and may from time to time be exercised by the Bishop of Rochester for the time being.

And whereas the said Scheme has been approved by Her Majesty in Council:

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said Scheme, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately upon the publication of this Order in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Arts.

And Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said Diocese of Rochester.

"Now, therefore, with the consent of the Right Reverend William, Bishop of Bath and Wells (in testimony whereof he has executed this Scheme), we, the said Church Commissioners, humbly recommend and propose that upon and from the day of the date of the publication in the London Gazette of any Order of Your Majesty in Council ratifying this Scheme and without any conveyance or assurance in the law other than such duly gazetted Order, the said interest of the said Thomas Broomhead and Phyllis Margaret Hicks in the advowson or perpetual right of patronage of and presentation to the said benefice shall be transferred to the said William, Bishop of Bath and Wells, and his successors in the same Bishopric and shall thereupon and thenceforth become and be absolutely vested in and shall and may from time to time be exercised by the Bishop of Bath and Wells for the time being."
