And Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said Diocese of Salisbury.

WHEREAS the Church Commissioners have duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a Scheme bearing date the 6th day of November, 1952, in the words and figures following, that is to say:

"We, the Church Commissioners, acting in pursuance of the Union of Benefices Measures, 1923 to 1936, and the Pastoral Reorganisation Measure, 1949, now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council the following Scheme which we have prepared with the consent of the Right Reverend Kenneth, Bishop of Oxford (in witness whereof he has signed the Scheme), for effecting the union of the benefice of Baulking and the benefice of Uffington with Woolstone, both situate in the diocese of Oxford.

" SCHEME.

"1. *Union of Benefices.* The benefice of Baulking and the benefice of Uffington with Woolstone shall be permanently united together and form one benefice with cure of souls under the style of 'The United Benefice of Uffington with Woolstone and Baulking', but the parishes of the said benefices shall continue in all respects distinct.

"2. *Taking effect of union.* Upon the day when any Order of Your Majesty in Council affirming this Scheme is published in the London Gazette the union shall forthwith take effect and the Reverend Sidney William Doran, if he is then incumbent of both of the said benefices of Baulking and Uffington with Woolstone shall, with his consent (testified by his signature hereto), be the first incumbent of the united benefice and his admission thereto shall be without any form of, or fee for, presentation or nomination and he shall not be required to pay any fees in respect of his collation, institution, licence, or induction to the united benefice beyond such fees as he would have been liable to pay if his admission to the united benefice had been an admission solely to that one of the said two benefices for the holding of which in plurality with the other a Dispensation was heretofore granted to him.

"3. *Parsonage House.* Upon the union taking effect the parsonage house at present belonging to the benefice of Uffington with Woolstone shall be the house of residence of the incumbent of the united benefice."

And whereas the provisions of the Union of Benefices Measures, 1923 to 1936, the Union of Benefices Rules, 1926 and 1930, and the Pastoral Reorganisation Measure, 1949, relating to the preparation and submission of this Scheme have been duly complied with:

And whereas the said Scheme has been approved by Her Majesty in Council:

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to affirm the said Scheme and to order that it shall be and become effectual in law immediately upon the publication of this Order in the London Gazette.

WHEREAS the Church Commissioners have duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a Scheme bearing date the 6th day of November, 1952, in the words and figures following that is to say:—

"We, the Church Commissioners, acting in pursuance of the Pastoral Reorganisation Measure, 1949, and the Union of Benefices Measures, 1923 to 1936, now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council the following Scheme which we have prepared with the consent of the Right Reverend Spencer, Bishop of Peterborough (in witness whereof he has signed the Scheme), for effecting the disunion of the united benefice of Oakham with Burley and the union of the benefice of Langham with the benefice of Burley all of which benefices are situate in the diocese of Peterborough.

" SCHEME

"Whereas by an Order of His late Majesty King George the Sixth in Council dated the 31st day of July, 1940, and published in the London Gazette on the 6th day of August, 1940, the benefice of Oakham and the benefice of Burley were united into one benefice with cure of souls:

"And whereas by clause 4 of the said Order the incumbent of the united benefice was directed to make provision for employing the services of a curate to assist him in the performance of his duties and a part, which in the events that have happened is now £175 per annum, of the endowments of the united benefice was appropriated as a fund towards meeting the cost of providing the services of a curate as aforesaid and is now, by virtue of the Church Commissioners Measure, 1947, payable by us the Church Commissioners to the diocesan board of finance as trustees to apply the same to the purpose aforesaid:

"Now therefore, we, the said Church Commissioners, do humbly recommend and propose to Your Majesty as follows, that is to say:—

"1. *Disunion of the united benefice of Oakham with Burley*

"(1) The union of the benefice of Oakham and the benefice of Burley shall be dissolved and the said benefices of Oakham and Burley shall thereupon, subject to the succeeding provisions hereof in regard to the benefice of Burley, each become a separate benefice with cure of souls within the limits of its separate parish.

"(2) The disunion of the said united benefices shall take effect upon the day when any Order of Your Majesty in Council affirming this Scheme is published in the London Gazette and the Reverend Harry Vaughan Prytherch if he is then incumbent of the said united benefice shall with his consent (testified by his signature hereto) be the first incumbent of the separate benefice of Oakham.

"(3) The parsonage house at Oakham of the said united benefice shall belong to the benefice of Oakham.

"(4) The liability for the repayment to us, the said Church Commissioners, of the principal sum of £144 5s. 10d. together with interest, which by a deed dated the nineteenth day of April, 1951, is charged upon the endowments and emoluments of the said united benefice of Oakham with Burley shall attach solely to the endowments and emoluments of the benefice of Oakham, and the emoluments of the benefice of Burley shall stand discharged from any portion of the said liability.

"(5) (a) The provisions of clause 4 of the said Order in Council dated the 31st day of July, 1940, shall be wholly rescinded and the said sum of £175 per annum shall be freed and discharged from the trusts imposed by that clause and shall be assigned and annexed to the benefice of Burley as part of the endowment thereof.

(b) All other the endowments and property of the united benefice shall be assigned and annexed to the endowment of the benefice of Oakham.

"2. *Union of the benefices of Langham and Burley*

"(1) The benefice of Langham and the benefice of Burley shall be permanently united together and form one benefice with cure of souls under the style of 'The United Benefice of Langham with Burley', but the parishes of the said benefices shall continue in all respects distinct.
