WHEREAS the Church Commissioners have duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a Scheme bearing date the 16th day of April, 1953, in the words and figures following, that is to say:—

“We, the Church Commissioners, acting in pursuance of the New Parishes Measure, 1943, have prepared and now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council the following Scheme for altering the boundaries of the parishes of Roehampton; Putney; and Saint John, Robinhood, all in the diocese of Southwark.

“Whereas we are satisfied that it is desirable that the boundaries of the said parishes should be altered in the manner hereinafter mentioned:

“And whereas the Right Reverend Bertram, Bishop of Southwark, consents to the proposed arrangements (in testimony whereof he has signed this Scheme):

“Now therefore we, the said Church Commissioners, humbly recommend and propose that from and after the day of the date of publication in the London Gazette of any Order of Your Majesty in Council ratifying this Scheme the boundaries of the said parishes of Roehampton; Putney; and Saint John, Robinhood, shall be altered in the manner described in the Schedule and delineated on the map annexed to this Scheme.

“THE SCHEDULE.

“(a) The territory to be annexed to the parish of Roehampton:—

“All that part of the parish of Putney, (coloured pink on the map annexed hereto), which lies to the southwest of an imaginary line commencing at a point on the boundary which divides the parish of Roehampton from the parish of Putney in the middle of Telegraph Road and continuing thence south-eastwards along the middle of Telegraph Road to the boundary which divides the parish of Putney from the parish of All Saints, Wandsworth.

“(b) The territory to be annexed to the parish of Putney:—

“All that part of the parish of Roehampton, coloured brown on the map annexed hereto, which is bounded on the east by the parish of Putney and on the remaining sides by an imaginary line commencing at a point on the boundary which divides the parish of Roehampton from the parish of Putney and the parish of Saint Margaret, Putney, in the middle of Putney Heath and continuing thence westwards along the middle of Putney Heath to a point opposite the middle of the northwestern end of Telegraph Road and continuing thence south-eastwards to and along the middle of Telegraph Road to the boundary which divides the parish of Roehampton from the parish of Putney.

“(c) The territory to be annexed to the parish of Saint John, Robinhood:—

“All that further part of the parish of Roehampton, (coloured green on the map annexed hereto), which is bounded on the south by the parish of Wimbledon, on the west by the parish of Saint John, Robinhood, and on the remaining sides by an imaginary line commencing at the point where the boundary which divides the parish of Saint John, Robinhood, from the parish of Roehampton crosses the wall or fence which divides the house and premises on the northwestern side of Roehampton Vale from Richmond Park and continuing thence north-eastwards along the last mentioned wall or fence to the northwestern end of the wall or fence which forms the northeastern boundary of the house and premises known as number 80, Roehampton Vale, and continuing thence south-eastwards along the

last mentioned wall or fence to a point opposite its southeastern end in the middle of Roehampton Vale and continuing thence north-eastwards along the middle of Roehampton Vale to a point opposite the northwestern end of Stag Lane and continuing thence south-eastwards to and along the middle of Stag Lane to its southeastern end and in a straight line in continuation thereof to the boundary which divides the parish of Roehampton from the parish of Wimbledon.”

And Whereas the provisions of the New Parishes Measure, 1943, relating to the preparation and submission of this Scheme, have been duly complied with:

And Whereas the said Scheme has been approved by Her Majesty in Council:
