WHEREAS the Church Commissioners have duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a Scheme bearing date the 16th day of April, 1953, in the words and figures following, that is to say:—

"We, the Church Commissioners, acting in pursuance of the New Parishes Measure, 1943, have prepared and now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council the following Scheme for altering the boundaries of the parishes of Bix, Nettlebed and Henley-on-Thames, all in the diocese of Oxford.

"Whereas we are satisfied that it is desirable that the boundaries of the said parishes should be altered in the manner hereinafter mentioned:

"And whereas the Right Reverend Kenneth, Bishop of Oxford, consents to the proposed arrangements (in testimony whereof he has signed this Scheme):

"Now, therefore, we, the said Church Commissioners, humbly recommend and propose that from and after the day of the date of publication in the London Gazette of any Order of Your Majesty in Council ratifying this Scheme the boundaries of the said parishes of Bix, Nettlebed, and Henley-on-Thames shall be altered in the manner described in the Schedule and delineated on the map annexed to this Scheme.

"THE SCHEDULE.

"(a) The territory to be annexed to the parish of Nettlebed:—

"All that part (coloured pink on the map annexed hereto) of the parish of Bix which lies to the north-west of an imaginary line commencing on the boundary which divides the parish of Bix from the parish of Saint Paul, Highmore Cross, opposite the middle of the eastern end of Deadman's Lane and continuing thence north-eastwards in a straight line for a distance of 57 chains (or thereabouts) to the boundary which divides the parish of Bix from the parish of Nettlebed where closes 120, 124, 175 and 179 on the map annexed hereto meet near Halfbridge Gate.

"(b) The territory to be annexed to the parish of Bix:—

"All that part (coloured green on the map annexed hereto) of the parish of Henley-on-Thames which is bounded upon the north in part by the parish of Fawley, upon the remaining part of the north and upon the west by the parish of Bix and upon the remaining sides by an imaginary line commencing on the boundary which divides the parish of Bix from the parish of Henley-on-Thames at the western end of the wall or fence which forms the southern boundary of close numbered 44 on the map annexed hereto and extending thence south-eastwards along the last-mentioned wall or fence and north-eastwards along the wall or fence which forms the southern boundary of the cemetery which forms close numbered 45 to its end and in a straight line to a point in the middle of the south-western end of the roadway which runs along the north-western side of the Travellers' Rest public house (thereby crossing the main road leading from Oxford to Henley) and continuing thence north-eastwards along the middle of the last-mentioned roadway to a point opposite the middle of its north-eastern end in the middle of the main road leading from Henley to Lower Assendon and continuing thence north-westwards along the middle of the last-mentioned main road for a distance of 9 chains or thereabouts to a point opposite the middle of the south-western end of an unnamed track or footpath leading from Lower Assendon to Crockmore Pond and continuing thence first north-eastwards, then generally northwards and then again north-eastwards to and along the middle of the last-mentioned unnamed track or footpath to the

boundary which divides the parish of Henley-on-Thames from the parish of Fawley."

"We, the Church Commissioners, acting in pursuance of the New Parishes Measure, 1943, have prepared and now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council the following Scheme for altering the name of the parish of Redhill in the diocese of Portsmouth.

"SCHEME.

"Whereas by the authority of an Order of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria in Council dated the 15th June, 1840, and published in the London Gazette on the 18th August, 1840, a Consolidated Chapelry District was assigned to the consecrated Chapel at Redhill in the parish of Havant in the County of Southampton and then in the diocese of Winchester and such Consolidated Chapelry District was named 'The Redhill District':

"And whereas the said Consolidated Chapelry District has since become a parish under the same name, and is now in the diocese of Portsmouth.

"And whereas it has been represented to us, the said Church Commissioners, and it appears to us that the name of the said parish should be altered as hereinafter recommended and proposed.

"Now, therefore, we, the said Church Commissioners, with the consent of the Right Reverend Launcelot, Bishop of Portsmouth (in testimony whereof he has hereunto set his hand), and with the consent of the parochial church council of the said parish (in testimony whereof this Scheme is signed by the Chairman of and two other members present at a meeting of the same council duly convened for the purpose of giving such consent) humbly recommend and propose to Your Majesty in Council that as from the date of the publication in the London Gazette of any Order of Your Majesty in Council ratifying this Scheme the name of the said parish shall be altered to 'The Parish of Saint John the Baptist, Rowlands Castle'."

And whereas the said Scheme has been approved by Her Majesty in Council:

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said Scheme, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately upon the publication of this Order in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Measure.

And Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said diocese of Portsmouth.
