#### TENDERS FOR TREASURY BILLS.

TENDERS FOR TREASURY BILLS.

1. The Lords Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury hereby give notice that Tenders will be received at the Chief Cashier's Office, at the Bank of England, on Friday, the 6th August, 1954, at 1 p.m. for Treasury Bills to be issued under the Treasury Bills Act, 1877, the National Debt Act, 1889, and the National Loans Act, 1939, to the amount of £240,000,000.

2. The Bills will be in amounts of £5,000, £10,000, £25,000, £50,000 or £100,000. They will be dated at the option of the tenderer on any business day from Monday, the 9th August, 1954, to Saturday, the 14th August, 1954, inclusive, and will be due 91 days after date.

3. The Bills will be issued and paid at the Bank of England.

4. Each Tender must be for an amount not less

4. Each Tender must be for an amount not less than £50,000, and must specify the date on which the Bills required are to be dated, and the net amount per cent. (being an even multiple of one penny) which will be given for the amount applied for. Separate tenders must be lodged for Bills of different dates. different dates.

5. Tenders must be made through a London Banker, Discount House or Broker.

6. Notification will be sent by post on the same day as Tenders are received, to the persons whose Tenders are accepted in whole or in part, and payment in full of the amounts due in respect of such accepted Tenders must be made to the Bank of England by means of cash or a Banker's Draft on the Bank of England not later than 1.30 p.m. (Saturday, 11.30 a.m.) on the day on which the relative Bills are to be dated.

7. Members of the House of Commons are not precluded from tendering for these Bills.

8. Tenders must be made on the printed forms

9. The Lords Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury reserve the right of rejecting any Tenders.

## DANGEROUS DRUGS REGULATIONS, 1953. SUSPENSION OF WITHDRAWAL OF AUTHORITIES.

Whereas the authorities, respectively conferred by the Dangerous Drugs Regulations, 1937, and the Raw Opium etc. Regulations, 1937, on Alexander

Terrace, Peterhead:

And whereas at the same time the Secretary of State directed under the said Regulation 7 that it should not be lawful for the said Alexander Watt to give prescriptions for the purposes of the Dangerous Drugs Regulations, 1937:

And whereas by virtue of Regulations 29 and 38 of the Dangerous Drugs Regulations, 1953, the Secretary of State is empowered at any time to restore such an authority as aforesaid which has been with-

such an authority as aforesaid which has been with-drawn under either of the said Regulations of 1937, or to suspend such a withdrawal:

And whereas I am satisfied that it is expedient to suspend the aforesaid withdrawal of authorities from the said Alexander Watt:

Now, therefore, I hereby suspend, in pursuance of the powers conferred upon me by Regulations 29 and 38 of the Dangerous Drugs Regulations, 1953, the aforesaid withdrawal of authorities from the said Alexander Watt, and I further suspend the operation of the said direction regarding prescriptions given in respect of the said Alexander Watt.
