The following Address was presented to The QUEEN on the occasion of Her Majesty's visit to Sheffield University on the 27th instant:---

HER MOST EXCELLENT MAJESTY QUEEN ELIZABETH THE SECOND

May it please Your Majesty, We, the Members of the University of Sheffield, wish humbly to express our loyalty to Your Majesty and to offer you, our Visitor, a most hearty welcome.

welcome. The present Session will see the completion of the fiftieth year since Your Majesty's great-grandfather, King Edward VII, granted the Royal Charter where-by University College, Sheffield, became the Univer-sity of Sheffield, and, a few weeks thereafter, came in person with Queen Alexandra to open the building in which we are now met and to greet the new University which he had thus founded. Four years later Your iMajesty's grandfather, King George V, then Prince of Wales, honoured us by coming to open our Library, which had heen provided by the open our Library, which had been provided by the bounty of a generous citizen, and accepted the Degree of Doctor of Letters; and we have since been honoured and encouraged by visits from other members of Your Majesty's Royal House.

Despite the disturbances of two world wars and the industrial uncertainties of the period between them, the number of full-time students has grown nearly twentyfold since our Charter was granted. Our buildings are much larger and the range of studies and the volume of research carried on within our walls has grown immensely. We believe that our walls has grown immensely. We believe that there has been a great increase in the contribution of this University to our nation and to the world of learning.

We rejoice that, thus early in your Reign, Your Majesty and His Royal Highness The Duke of Edinburgh have graced our University by this visit to inaugurate the celebrations that mark our Jubilee Session; and we read in this the happiest augury for the future. We pray that your Reign may be long, prosperous and peaceful; and that Your Majesty may have the happiness of seeing the ties between Crown and people, already close, grow ever stronger as the years go by. ever stronger as the years go by.
