LOAD LINE CONVENTION.

THE MERCHANT SHIPPING (LOAD LINE CONVENTION) (VARIOUS COUNTRIES) ORDER, 1954.

Made 4th November, 1954.

Laid before Parliament 9th November, 1954.

Coming into Operation upon the date of publication in the London Gazette, 12th November, 1954.

At the Court at *Buckingham Palace*, the 4th day of November, 1954.

PRESENT,

The QUEEN's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS by section 65 of the Merchant Shipping (Safety and Load Line Conventions) Act, 1932 (22 & 23 Geo. 5. c. 9), it is enacted that Her Majesty, if satisfied that the Government of any country has ratified, acceded to, or denounced the Load Line Convention; or that the Load Line Convention has been applied or has ceased to apply to any country in pursuance of the provisions of Article 21 thereof, may, by Order in Council, make a declaration to that effect;

And whereas Her Majesty is satisfied that the Governments of the countries specified in Part I of the Schedule to this Order have acceded to the Load Line Convention; and that the Load Line Convention has been applied to the country specified in Part II of the said Schedule.

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, in pursuance of the powers vested in Her by the aforesaid section and of all other powers enabling Her in that behalf, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, is pleased to order and doth hereby order as follows:—

1. It is hereby declared that the Governments of the countries specified in Part I of the Schedule to this Order have acceded to the Load Line Convention.

2. It is hereby declared that the Load Line Convention has been applied to the country specified in Part II of the said Schedule.

3. This Order may be cited as the Merchant Shipping (Load Line Convention) (Various Countries) Order, 1954, and shall come into operation upon the date of its publication in the London Gazette.

WHEREAS by section 31 of the Merchant Shipping (Safety Convention) Act, 1949, 12, 13 & 14 Geo. 6. c. 43, it is enacted that Her Majesty, if satisfied that the government of any country has accepted the Safety Convention may, by Order in Council, make a declaration to that effect:

And whereas Her Majesty is satisfied that the governments of the countries specified in the Schedule to this Order have accepted the Safety Convention:

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, in pursuance of the powers vested in Her by the aforesaid section and of all other powers enabling Her in that behalf, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, is pleased to order and doth hereby order as follows:—

1. It is hereby declared that the governments of the countries specified in the schedule to this Order have accepted the Safety Convention.

2. This Order may be cited as the Merchant Shipping (Safety Convention Countries) (Various) (No. 3) Order, 1954, and shall come into operation upon the date of its publication in the London Gazette.
