"2. Taking effect of union. Upon the day when any Order of Your Majesty in Council affirming this Scheme is published in the London Gazette the union shall forthwith take effect.

"3. Parsonage House. "(a) Upon the union taking effect the parsonage house at present belonging to the benefice of Shackerstone shall be the house of residence of the incumbent of the united benefice.

"(b) The parsonage house belonging to the bene-"(b) The parsonage house belonging to the bene-fice of Congerstone and the site and appurtenances thereof and the grounds heretofore usually occupied and enjoyed therewith shall, as soon as conveniently may be, be sold and disposed of by us at such time or times and in such manner in all respects as

time or times and in such manner in all respects as to us shall seem expedient. "(c) So much of the net proceeds of such sale or sales as we, after consulting with the Bishop for the time being of the said diocese, shall deem necessary shall be applied by us towards the cost of carrying out improvements to the residence house of the united benefice and any balance of the said net proceeds shall be held by us for the augmentation of the endowment of the united benefice." # "SCHEME

"Whereas we, the Church Commissioners, are satisfied that the spiritual interests of the area defined in the subjoined Schedule and delineated on the map hereto annexed would be best served by constituting it a new parish:

stituting it a new parish: "And whereas we are satisfied that a suitable endowment therefor will be provided: "And whereas we have not approved any con-secrated church within the area as suitable to be the parish church of the new parish: "Now, therefore, with the consent of the Right Reverend Noel, Bishop of Newcastle (in testimony whereof he has set his hand and affixed his episcopal seal to this Scheme), we the said Church Com-missioners, do humbly recommend and propose as follows, that is to say:--

#### "1. Constitution :

"(a) As from the date of the licence thereto of a Minister, the area defined in the subjoined Schedule and delineated on the map hereto annexed shall be

a separate district for spiritual purposes. "(b) As from the date of the consecration of a church within the area, approved by us, the said Church Commissioners, as suitable to be a parish church or if the church is consecrated before such approval, the date of the approval, the said area

"(c) The name of the district (or parish as the case may be) shall be 'The District (or Parish) of Saint Francis, High Heaton, Newcastle-upon-Tyne." "2.
