PRESENT,

The QUEEN's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS the Church Commissioners have duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a Scheme bearing date the 7th day of January, 1955, in the words and figures following, that is to say:—

"We, the Church Commissioners, in pursuance of the Church Patronage Act, 1870, and of the Acts therein mentioned, have prepared the following Scheme for effecting a transfer of the ownership of the advowson or perpetual right of patronage of and presentation to the church and cure (hereinafter called 'the said Benefice') of Eastwell with Boughton Aluph in the County of Kent and in the diocese of Canterbury.

"SCHEME.

"Whereas we are satisfied that James William Thurston Holland of 25, Castle Street, Liverpool, in the County of Lancaster, Solicitor, as sole surviving executor of the will of the late William Threlkeld Wood, is the patron or person entitled to present or nominate to the said benefice, and that Elizabeth Mary Cave-Rogers of 21, Saint David's Road, Llandudno, in the County of Caernarvon, Married woman, and Dennis Stephen Threlkeld Wood of The Cocked Hat, East Knoyle, in the County of Wilts, Esquire, as residuary legatees under the said will have some legal interest in the said advowson:

"And whereas the said James William Thurston Holland desires to transfer the advowson of the said benefice, and the said Elizabeth Mary Cave-Rogers, and Dennis Stephen Threlkeld Wood also desire to transfer their respective interests therein to the Archbishop of Canterbury for the time being and are consenting to this Scheme (in testimony whereof they have executed the same):

"And whereas we are satisfied that the transfer will tend to make better provision for the cure of souls:

"Now, therefore, with the consent of the Right Honourable and Most Reverend Geoffrey Francis, Lord Archbishop of Canterbury (in testimony whereof he has executed this Scheme), we, the said Church Commissioners, humbly recommend and propose that upon and from the day of the date of the publication in the London Gazette of any Order of Your Majesty in Council ratifying this Scheme and without any conveyance or assurance in the law other than such duly gazetted Order, the whole advowson or perpetual right of patronage of and presentation to the said benefice shall be transferred to the said Geoffrey Francis, Lord Archbishop of Canterbury, and his successors in the same archbishopric and shall thereupon and thenceforth become and be absolutely vested in and shall and may from time to time be exercised by the Archbishop of Canterbury for the time being."

And whereas the said Scheme has been approved by Her Majesty in Council:

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said Scheme, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately upon the publication of this Order in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Acts:

And Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said diocese of Canterbury.

WHEREAS the Church Commissioners have duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a Scheme bearing date the 7th day of January, 1955, in the words and figures following, that is to say:

"We, the Church Commissioners, acting in pursuance of the Pastoral Reorganisation Measure, 1949, and the Union of Benefices Measures, 1923 to 1952, now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council the following Scheme which we have prepared with the consent of the Right Reverend Neville, Bishop of Coventry (in witness whereof he has signed the Scheme), for effecting the union of the benefice of Fenny Compton and the benefice of Wormleighton, both situate in the diocese of Coventry.

"SCHEME.

"1. *Union of Benefices.* The benefice of Fenny Compton and the benefice of Wormleighton shall be permanently united together and form one benefice with cure of souls under the style of 'The United Benefice of Fenny Compton and Wormleighton', but the parishes of the said benefices shall continue in all respects distinct.

"2. *Taking effect of union.* Upon the day when any Order of Your Majesty in Council affirming this Scheme is published in the London Gazette the union shall forthwith take effect and the Reverend Kenneth Gordon Packard, if he is then incumbent of the said benefice of Fenny Compton, shall with his consent (testified by his signature hereto), be the first incumbent of the united benefice.

"3. *Parsonage House.*

"(a) Upon the union taking effect the parsonage house at present belonging to the benefice of Fenny Compton shall be the house of residence of the incumbent of the united benefice and as soon as conveniently may be the parsonage house at present belonging to the benefice of Wormleighton and the site and appurtenances thereof and the grounds heretofore usually occupied and enjoyed therewith shall be sold and disposed of by us at such time
