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Windsor, August 9.

The following Address has been presented to Her Majesty by the Vice-Chancellor, and several other of the Heads of Houses of the University of Oxford.

To the **QUEEN's** most Excellent Majesty.

Humble Address of the Chancellor, Masters and Scholars of the University of Oxford.

Sheweth that Your Majesty,

We Your Majesty's most Dutiful and Loyal Subjects; the Chancellor, Masters, and Scholars, of the University of Oxford, most humbly beseech Your Majesty to accept our unfeigned and most sincere Charity, in so freely parting with a part of Your own Revenue for the more comfortable Subsistence of Your Clergy of the Church of England; whereby Your Majesty has given the most sensible Proof of Your real Concern for the said Church, at the same time relieving the Necessities of the said Clergy, and wiping off so great a Burden as their Poverty had brought upon her.

We therefore Return to make but our Duty, and our Prayers; and beseech Your Majesty to be assured, that we are sure the said Charity will be no less prevalent, than we are sure the said Prayers will be; humbly presuming that God will be the restorer of Your Majesty's Bounty to those who wait at his own Altar.

We also interpret it as a Reward of this Your Piety; and that God may enable You as effectually to assert the Rights and Liberties of Your injured Allies, as he has happily directed You to provide for the Necessities of his Church, shall be the daily Duty of Your Majesty's most Dutiful and Loyal Subjects and Prayers.

Which Address Her Majesty received very graciously.

Paris, May 14. Her Majesty's Ship the Nonfuch arrived at the 6th Instant, which on the 28th past took a French Prize of 18 Guns, 6 Patrocoers, and 68 Men, laden with Sugar, and bound from Martinico to Bourdeaux: The Deal-Cattle, and Company with the Nonfuch, took at the same time a French Vessel, which was also homeward-bound from Martinico.

Paris, August 1. N. S. The Garrison of Verceil beat a Parley the 20th past, after the Trenches had been opened 36 Days, when they had made a very vigorous Defence. The Duke of Vendome would allow them no other Terms than that they should remain Prisoners of War; but that neither they nor the Inhabitants should be plundered; so they marched on the 24th, and the Enemy have since been busy in demolishing their Works before that Town: It's believ'd they'll attack it, which Place our Duke has provided with a strong Garrison, and all other Necessaries for its Defence. The French suffer much through Sickness and Detention. A Party of 500 Men of the Garrison of Montmeillon, which Place is besieged by the French, has lately beat up the Enemy's Camp-Quarters at Chavanne, burnt their Magazine, and seized up their Cannon, whereof they brought two Pieces to the Castle.

At the Duke of Marlborough's Camp at Friedberg, Aug. 3. The 21st past the Army made a small March from Aicha, the Right Wing advancing about half a League on this side the Town, and the Left to a Village called Reebach. The next morning the Duke of Marlborough, with the Piquet of the Cavalry of the Left, and a Detachment of 500 Foot, attacked the Par, and marched to view the Ground for a Camp at this Place, where the Enemy had put a Garrison of 200 Foot and as many Horse, who, as soon as his Grace came upon the Plain, within sight of the Town, retired towards the Army, driving before them their Horses that were grazing near the Town, which they had not time to mount. The 22d Squadrons of Dragoons were thereupon ordered to cut off their Rear; but by reason of the Ways through which the Men were to pass, they could not come up time enough to prevent their Escape: They took above 1000 Hacks in the Town, and pursued the rest to their grand

Guard, which upon their Approach retired under the Protection of their Camp. His Grace went into the Town, where he left 400 Foot and 100 Horse, under the Command of the Lord North and Grey, and then returned to the Camp. The 23d our Army marched again, and encamped with the right at Wolfurtshausen, and the Left at Ooltmaring, this Town being in the Center of the Line, and within a League of Augsburg, so that the Elector of Bavaria's Communication with his own Country is in a manner entirely cut off. We received Advice from Prince Eugene, That the Marshal de Tallard was arrived the 18th at Villingen; whereupon his Highness was marched with 20 Battalions and 60 Squadrons, including the 30 lately sent from our Army, to observe his Motions, having left the rest of the Troops under the Command of Count Nassau Weillbourg; to defend the Lines of Stojhofen. The Hereditary Prince of Heile Cassel returned from Donawert to the Army, though he was 16 yet quite recovered from the Wounds he received in the Action on the Schellenberg; and the Duke of Marlborough declared him General of the Horse. The 26th our Army made a general Forage in sight of the Enemy's Camp, without any Loss. That evening we received Advice; That the Marshal de Tallard, after he had been battering the Town of Villingen 6 days; had been obliged, upon Prince Eugene's advancing the 23d to Retire, to raise the Siege; that he marched two Leagues the same day, and was the 24th at Durlingen; And that Prince Eugene will march on the other side of the Danube to observe him. The 28th, the Duke of Marlborough reviewed the Troops of our Left Wing, which appeared in very good order; several of the Officers and Soldiers that were wounded at the Action on the Schellenberg being returned to their Regiments. The Elector of Bavaria continuing obstinately to refuse all Terms of Accommodation with the Allies, the Count de la Tour, General of the Imperial Horse, with the Count de Coeffricke, Lieutenant-General in the Service of the States-General, were sent out the 29th with a Detachment of 30 Squadrons of Horse and Dragoons to put the Country under Military Execution towards Munich, which will also be done in other Parts, to deprive the Enemy as far as we can of any means of Subsistence. The 31st we had Advice by a Defector; That the Elector of Bavaria had sent a Detachment of Horse towards Landshut; whereupon the Duke of Wirtemberg was immediately sent out with 2000 Horse and Dragoons to observe them; but we had notice soon after, that the Enemy's Detachment consisted only of 4 Squadrons, which were sent to reinforce the Garrison of Munich; Orders were then dispatched to the Duke of Wirtemberg to join with the Count de la Tour in the Execution of his Commission; which having been performed as far as Munich, whereby the Enemy will not be able to find any Subsistence on that side; those Generals rejoined the Army this evening. We are to march to-morrow towards Aicha, the Artillery and Baggage being marched that way this afternoon.

Berlin, August 9. Letters from Poland say, That the King decamped the 18th past from Sendomir, and marched towards Lemberg; and by Letters of the 28th we have an Account, That he was then at Lanzur, and would march in a day or two to join the Muscovites, who were arrived in the Neighbourhood of Jacislaw. The Senators and others who are in his Interest had published a Manifesto, declaring the new Elected King Stanislaus; and all his Adherents, Traitors and Enemies to their Country. The King of Sweden was marched with his Army to join General Reinschild, intending (as was believed) to endeavour to give the King of Poland Battle. The Czar was come in Person to the Siege of Nerwa.

Hague, August 15. N. S. The Army of the States-General, commanded by Monsieur d'Avouquerque, repaired the Maëlle the 5th Instant, and is now encamped at Vellem. The Marquis d'Allegre arrived the 6th at Namur, with a Reinforcement of 12 Battalions and 1200 Horse from the French Army in Germany. General Sauffh having repaired the Scheldt with the Army under his Command, far down before Fort Matella the 2d Instant, and took it on the 4th; the Garrison, which consisted of 200 Men, part of French, and the rest Switzers, remaining Prisoners of War; he has orders to demolish that Place. The French Forces under the Count de la Meche lately made some Mistakes,

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which gave a Jealousy that they intended to Lombard Bergen-upzoom; but Monsieur Salifen being marched thither with part of his Army, has obliged them to give over that Design. Directions are given for the sending of a Reinforcement of two Regiments of Foot and 600 Recruits to Portugal. Sixteen of our East-India Ships are safely arrived under Convey of Admiral Vandergoes, who had been sent out with a Squadron of 11 Men of War to meet them; Eight of them are entered into the Texel, and the rest are sailed to Rotterdam and Zealand. Another East-India Ship arrived in the Texel about a fortnight ago, which came without Convoy. They write from Paris, That the French Fleet commanded by the Count de Toulouze put to Sea from Toulon the 22d past. We have no Letters by the last Post from Germany directly from the Duke of Marlborough's Camp; but from other Places we have an Account, That notwithstanding the Marshal de Tallard's having joined the Elector of Bavaria, which he did on the 5th Instant near Augsburg, our Army was going to besiege Ingolstadt, and was advanced the 7th to Schrobenhausen, in their March thither; That Prince Eugene with the Forces under his Command lay at Munster near Donauwert; and that the Count de Vehlen was at Rotweyl with a Body of Troops to observe the Marshal de Villeroy, who continued with his Army in the Black Forest.

Falmouth, August 5. The first Instant Her Majesty's Ship the Medway passed by this Port, with two homeward-bound Merchant Ships from Leghorn, and two from Lisbon, belonging to London. The Angry Hollander, a Privateer of Flushing, came in here the same day from cruising: He has lately taken two Prizes, and sent them home. The 2d the Sidney Frigate came in here; as did also the Diligent Paquet-Boat from Jamaica, which came away from thence about six weeks ago, and left those Islands very healthy. The 3d came in the Mary of London, William Fullwood Master, homeward-bound from Carolina, laden with Rice, Coco, and other Goods. Her Majesty's Ship the Hastings sailed hence this evening, with the Clarinda Frigate, the Mary Brigantine, and several other Vessels, bound up the Channel, under her Convoy. Yesterday the Isabella, Jacob Sunnon Master, and the Africa, John Miller Master, both of Whitehaven, and homeward-bound from Virginia, put into this Port: They parted on the 3d Instant with the homeward bound Fleets from thence, consisting of about 140 Merchant Ships, and are sailed to the Eastward.

Plymouth, August 6. On the 3d Instant came in from cruising two Dutch Privateers, one of 26, the other of 20 Guns, who brought in with them as Prize the Tercera of 24 Guns, and another Ship of 18 Guns, both belonging to Nantes, and homeward bound with Sugar and Coco from Martinico. The same day came in Her Majesty's Ship the Medway, with a French Privateer of 8 Guns, whom she had taken to the Westward of this Place; as did also the Mary from Carolina, and the Clarinda from the Terceras, both of London and homeward bound; and about 35 Merchant Ships from Virginia, 5 of them bound hither, and the rest to Bristol, Whitehaven and other Ports. Yesterday came in Her Majesty's ship the Revenge, who with the Falmouth, being on the 4th Instant off of Scilly, fell in with a Squadron of 8 French Men of War, by whom the Falmouth was taken after a stout Resistance: The Revenge has brought in with her as Prize, a French Privateer of 8 Guns, whom she took the 23d past. This day came in Her Majesty's ships the Moderate and Gloucester, who yesterday, off of the Lizard, engaged two French Men of War of about 60 Guns each, and several Privateers; The Fight continued several hours, till the French bore away, and Her Majesty's Ships chased them for about an hour, but could not come up with them.

Yarmouth, August 7. Her Majesty's Ships the Weymouth and Chatham, with about 15 Sail of homeward bound Merchant Ships under their Convoy from the Baltick, came into our Road the 5th Instant; as did likewise Her Majesty's Ship the Crown from the Southward, and Her Majesty's Ship the Rochester from cruising, which some days before took an Ostend Caper of 6 Guns and 45 Men. Her Majesty's Ships the Chester and Nightingale, failed out of our Roads yesterday for Newcastle, with about 150 Sail of light Colliers under their Convoy.

Cowes, August 7. Last Saturday in the evening came in the Return Brigantine of and from New-York, John Porter Master, to clear for Holland; She came with the Virginia Flier, which is passed by for the Downes.

Deal, August 8. Her Majesty's Ships the Dreadnought, Oxford and Falkland, Convoys to the Virginia Fleet, which is lately come into the Downs, have brought in a considerable Prize, being a French Man of War from Rochfort, richly laden, of 36 Guns, but can carry 40, and 300 Men, 20 of them being Land Officers, who were going to Canada, wither she was bound: There were also on Board a Bishop and several Priests; which they took in their Voyage homeward, in the Latitude of 46 Degrees. There came also with this Fleet two French Prizes, one of 12, the other of 19 Guns, both laden with Sugar, Coco and other Goods, from Martinico, which the Falkland had taken in her Voyage outwards.
