This day Dr. Brampton, Vice-Chancellor of the University of Cambridge, Dr. Smelt, Dr. Richardson, Dr. Ashton, and Dr. Johnson, deputed by the said University, presented the following Address to Her Majesty, being introduced by the most Honourable the Lord High Treasurer.

May it please Your Majesty,

WE Your Majesty's most Dutiful and Loyal Subjects, the Chancellor, Masters and Scholars, of Your University of Cambridge, do beg Leave to tender our most sincere and humble Thanks for the Prince's Benignity and Liberality to the poor Clergy of the Church of England, by which, one of the Grievous of the Complaints will in a good measure be removed, Religion and Learning set on a much higher Degree of Esteem and Reputation than it has been many Years past.

We also humbly beg Leave to make use of this Access to Your Royal Majesty, to Congratulate Your Majesty upon the late Glorious Victory, which was attended Your Arms under the wise and vigilant Conduct of the Duke of Marlborough, who has attained the Honour of the English Nation beyond most of our Renowned Generals.

The Reigns of our most fortunate Princes afford not so many great and surprising Actions, such Prosperity and Happiness, as the few last, Your Majesty has sat upon the Throne, has blessed us with.

We have no King more to pray and wish for, but Your Majesty's long and a Continuance of these great and signal Successes; which we are assured of, under Your Majesty's most auspicious Influence, and that Your Armies are led by so valiant and successful Generals.

The following Address has also been presented to Her Majesty.

To the QUEEN'S Most Excellent Majesty.

The humble Address of the Bishop and Clergy of the Diocese of Oxford.

May it please Your Sacred Majesty

To give us Leave, at the same time that we do with the deepest Sense of Gratitude, acknowledge that Royal Bounty which You have extended to the poor Clergy of this Church, with equal Joy to contemplate the Glorious Success which God has given to Your Majesty's Arms.

We hope these Two are not improperly joined together, since This Signifying seems a Gracious Return from Heaven to That Eminent Virtue.

That He, by whom Princes reign, would go on to Reward Your Love and Zeal for his Church with renewed Instances of his Favour; That he would continue You a Powerful Protector and Shining Ornament to Her; That after He has made You a Successful Instrument of His Glory on Earth, he would make You a happy Partaker of it with Him in Heaven, are the fervent and constant Prayers of, Madam, Your Majesty's most Dutiful Subjects, and Faithful Humble Servants.

Which Addresses Her Majesty received very Graciously.

Paris, August 13. The Emperor has declared Prince Charles of Neubourg, Brother to the Elector Palatine, Governor of Tirol, with the same Authority and Privileges as the late Duke of Lorraine enjoyed when he held that Government. We hear from London, that General Hillier having received a Supply of Money from hence, and a Reinforcement of 3 Battalions from the River Rhine, is marched with the Body of Forces under his Command from the Island Schur towards Rabau, in order to make some Attempts against the Malecontents who are posted on that side.

From the Duke of Marlborough's Camp at Streinheim, August 17. N. S. Our Army, after the Glorious Victory obtained the 13th Instant over the French and Bavarians, by that night upon their Arms in the Enemy's Camp, and the 14th made a small Motion, and came with the Night to Wittling, and the Left to this Place. The Elector of Bavaria and the Marshal de Marcin, with the remainder of their Army, passed the Danube the same day over the Bridge of Lauingen, which they burnt as soon as they were got over, and marched to Bureffingen, near the Iller. Yesterday they retired further up the River towards the Iller. We have since repaired that Bridge, as also another at Hochster. We have an Account, That yesterday morning early the Troops that were in Garrison at Augsburg, quitted the Town, and are marched to join the

Electors; The Garrison of Munich has done the like. And this morning two Deputies came from Augsbouurg to wait upon my Lord Duke, and pray his Grace's Protection; whereupon a Detachment is ordered to march and take Possession of that Place. The Number of Prisoners taken from the Enemy increases every day, by the coming in of those who in the Rout escaped into the Country: They amount now to above 11000, besides more than 1200 Officers. The Marshal de Tallard, with 16 General Officers, and 13 Colonels, which he has requested may be with him, will be going the 19th towards Francfort and Hanau, with a Guard to attend them. Our Army is to advance at the same time towards Ulm, in order to oblige the Enemy to decamp from the Neighbourhood of that Place, which is the last where they have any Magazines in this Country; so that when they have lost that, they must of necessity retire over the Rhine for want of Subsistence on this side. The French Forces which were in that Town are marched out of it, and the Garrison there consists now only of Bavarians. Monsieur de Tallard confesses, their Army consisted of 82 Battalions, and 147 Squadrons; whereas we had but 64 Battalions and 166 Squadrons; whereof 1500 Horse, under the Command of Prince Lewis of Baden, had been detached for the Siege of Ingolstadt. The Troops on the Left, commanded by his Grace the Duke of Marlborough, have taken 34 Pieces of Cannon, with 35 Standards, and upwards of 90 Colours, besides 13 Pieces of Cannon taken by our Right Wing under Prince Eugene, with a great many Colours and Standards, whereof we know not yet the Number. This Day was observed as a day of Thanksgiving throughout the whole Army, for the Glorious Success wherewith it has pleased God to bless us, and in the Evening a triple Discharge was made of all our Artillery and small Arms.

A LIST of the French Troops made Prisoners at Discretion in the Village of Bleinem, the 13th of August, 1704.

Four Regiments of Dragoons, viz. That of the Maître de Camp General, La Reine, Vally, Rouan, consisting of 3 Squadrons each; Seventeen Regiments of Foot, viz. Navarre 3 Battalions, semeterre 2, Greder German 2, Onis 2, Artois 2, Provençois 1, Languedoc 2, Binisais 1, Argentous 1, Surlaude 2, St. Second 1, Lassy 1, Bouillonis 1, Moursroix 1, Mansfort 2, Royal 3, Of the Artillery 1. In all, 28 Battalions.

Berlin, August 19. On the 17th Instant Monsieur Boothheim, Aid de Camp to the Prince of Anhalt Dessau, passed through this Place going to Freyenwaldt, where the King of Prussia is at present, with an Account of the Glorious Victory obtained by the Allies over the French and Bavarians at Bleinem, which has caused an universal Joy in these Parts. Our last Letters from Poland say, That the King of Sweden continued to advance towards Ruffeland, with intent, as was supposed, to attack the King of Poland, and

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that the new King expected the Issue at Warlaw ; and in the mean time was preparing to march with about 5 or 6000 Men of the Crown Army, who have been brought over to his Party, towards the Greater Poland, to oppose the Forces which are moving that way from Saxony. They write from the King of Poland's Camp at Jarollaw of the 4th Instant, That an Express was arrived there on the first from Prince Wieszowski, who commands a Body of the Forces of Lithuania, with Advice of his having taken the Koerber-Schans, with the Slaughter of 250 Swedes, and afterwards passed the Dunia, and blocked up Selbourg, a Castle where there was a Garrison of 400 Swedes, which he hoped to be Master of in a little time, and then to make an Excursion towards Riga. Some Muscovite Troops are marching to join him, and it is believed they intend to block up that Place in the Winter.

Frankfurt, August 20. The French Army under the Marshal de Villeroi advanced lately so near to our Lines at Splohoffen, that our Forces there expected to be attacked ; but the Enemy thought fit to retire without attempting any thing ; and some Advices add, that he intends to repair the Rhine. The Siege of Ingolstadt is turned into a Blockade ; and it is said Prince Lewis, with part of the Troops which were before that Place, is marching in order to rejoin the main Army.

Hague, August 26. N. S. There has lately been a Rising at Ghent and Brussels, where part of the Inhabitants had gathered together, who cried out, *Long live King Charles III.* of Spain, but it has been suppressed ; and the Burghers of Antwerp appearing to be in the same Disposition, a Patrole is ordered to go in the Streets there day and night, to prevent any Insurrection, with Directions not to suffer so much as 4 of them to be together. The Army commanded by Monsieur d' Auverquerque is still encamped near St. Tron. Our Letters from the North say, there has been a Battel in Poland, between part of the Swedish Army and a Body of Poles, Saxons and Muscovites, wherein the latter were worsted, and lost their Artillery and Bagage. Five Gallies came out lately from Ostend to attack 3 of our Frigats which lay at Schonevelt, but were obliged to retire with the Loss of many of their Men. Our Fleet of Herring-Busses is safely arrived. Directions are given for the speedy raising of Recruits for our Forces in Germany, the Province of Holland having for this purpose paid its own Quota, and advanced that of the other Provinces. On the 20th Instant at night the States General dispatched an Express to the Duke of Marlborough, with the following Answer to the Letter whereby his Grace notified to them the Glorious Victory obtained by the Arms of Her Majesty of Great Britain, their High and Mightinesses, and the rest of the Allies, over the French and Bavarians at Bleisnam.

My Lord,

Colonel Panton has brought us your Grace's welcome Letter dated from the Camp at Hochstetten the 14th Instant, and has related to us what passed in the Signal Battel fought the day before.

We return your Grace most hearty Thanks for the speedy Notice you were pleased to send us of so agreeable News. After the first Blow you had given them at Schellenberg, we had all Reason to expect somewhat much greater would follow, but never durst have carried our Hopes so far as to think of so Glorious and complete a Victory as you have, with the Army of the Allies, gained over the Enemy.

The Action of that Day has placed the greatness of your Merit in its true Light: A Day whose Glory might have been envied by the greatest Captains of Ages past, and whose Memory will endure through all Ages to come.

We heartily Congratulate your Grace upon this Occasion, and rejoice in the Glory you have acquired, as well as for the Advantage the Common Cause has obtained. This Action will let France see that Her Troops are not Invincible, and has given it such a Blow as that King never felt in the whole Course of his Reign.

And we give Thanks to God, whose Goodness has blessed your brave Attempts, and pray that he will prosper more and more your Generous Designs: Assuring you, That none can be wish greater Esteem and more Sincerity than we are,

Chester, August 14. Yesterday we received the joyful News of the most Glorious Success of Her Majesty's Forces under the Command of his Grace the Duke of Marlborough against the French and Bavarians ; whereupon our Governor invited our Mayor, Recorder, Aldermen, Sheriffs, and the Gentlemen of this City, to the Castle, where the Cannon was fired: They drank Health and long Life to Her Majesty, with further Success to Her Arms, and those of Her Allies ; which being ended, our Mayor, Recorder, Aldermen, &c. invited the Governor and the rest of the Company to the Pavilion, where the aforesaid Healths were repeated, with Bonfires, Illuminations, Ringing of Bells, and all possible Demonstrations of Joy suitable to the Occasion.

London, August 14. This day we had publick Rejoycings for the Glorious Victory wherewith God hath blessed Her Majesty's Arms over the French and Bavarian Forces. The Mayor, Alder-

men, Bayliffs, Council and Commonalty, walked round the Tower with Musick playing and Drums beating, and at all the Houses drank Her Majesty's Health, and long and happy Reign and Success. In the evening they were nobly treated by Robert Knigham Esq; one of our Representatives in Parliament. And the Night was concluded with Ringing of Bells, Illuminations, March and drinking Success to Her Majesty's Forces by Sea and Land. *Bristol, August 16.* Yesterday came in the Dragon Gally, William Fraeke Commander, in 6 weeks from Antigua.

Plymouth, August 17. Her Majesty's Ships the Revenge, Medway, Mary and Exeter, came in here this day with two French Privateers, one of 28 Guns and 156 Men; the other of 24 Guns and 156 Men, taken by the Medway in the Soundings.

Tavemouth, August 18. Her Majesty's Ships the Greyhound and Kinfaul sailed hence the 15th for Newcastle, with about 200 Sail of light Colliers under their Convey. About 150 Sail of laden Colliers passed through our Roads to the Southward the 16th in the morning, under Convey of Her Majesty's Ship the Gloucester. Yesterday came into our Road about 60 Sail of laden Colliers, under Convey of Her Majesty's Ship the Nightingale; and this day came in about 20 Sail more, most of them bound to the Southward, but are yet here waiting for a fair Wind.

Windsor, August 20. This day Don Ludovico da Cunha, Envoy Extraordinary to the Queen from the King of Portugal, had an Audience from Her Majesty, wherein he delivered a Letter from his Master to Her Majesty, assuring Her Majesty of his firm Resolution to observe the Treaty of Alliance concluded with Her Majesty and Her Allies, whatever Vicissitudes might happen. The said Envoy Extraordinary at the same time acquainted Her Majesty that he had express Orders from his Master, to give Her Majesty all possible Assurances, that his Master would with all Vigour pursue the Intentions of that Alliance till the same was accomplished.

Windsor, August 20. Monsieur Vryberge, Envoy Extraordinary from the States General of the United Provinces, had this day Audience from the Queen, wherein he Congratulated Her Majesty by express Order from his Masters, upon the great and complete Victory obtained over the Enemy near Flevoche, by the Arms of the Allies under the Valiant and Wise Conduct of my Lord Duke of Marlborough. And at the same time he presented to Her Majesty a Letter from the States General upon the same subject.
