The following Address has been presented to Her Majesty by the Right Reverend the Lord Bishop of Rochester.

To the *QUEEN's* most Excellent Majesty.

The humble Address of the Bishop, and Dean and Chapter of the Cathedral Church of Rochester, together with the rest of the Clergy of that Diocese.

MADAM,

WE cannot but think it our bounden Duty, to bless and praise Almighty God, that He has given us a Queen, whose whole Life has been the great Example, and Ornament of the Holy Religion we profess: Especially, that, since God has placed Your Majesty on the Throne of Your Ancestors, He has not only made You a most Gracious Nursing Mother to the Church of England in general, but has inclined Your Royal Heart, to relieve, and support the most distressed, and necessitous part of it, with a Princely Munificence.

For this Your most generous, and merciful Act of Bounty to the House of the Lord our God, where it was most needed, the best Return that we, and all who minister in Holy Things, can make to Your Majesty, is, to pray, without ceasing, that God would pour down on Your Sacred Head all the Blessings of Heaven, and Earth.

And, Madam, for our Brethren and Companions sake; from the bottom of our Souls we wish You all Prosperity, for the Safety and Happiness of all Your own Dominions, and the Protection of the rest of Christendom from the great Oppressor; as God has already given You the Honour of rescuing Germany from him by Your Victorious Arms, which we joyfully Congratulate.

Which Address Her Majesty received very Graciously.

Turin, August 12. The Enemy have sent away the Pallisadoes and other useful Materials at Verceil, and intend to demolish entirely the Fortifications of that Place: They had sent 12 Battalions on the other side of the Po, but they have since repass'd that River: Several small Detachments of their Forces have lately appeared near Ivrea and Verrue, being sent, as is suppos'd, to attend some of

their Officers who came to view the Avenues of those Towns; however, we cannot yet judge with any certainty what the Enemy will undertake. In the mean time, all possible care is taken in providing for the Security of those Places; and our Duke has so well fortified his Camp near Crescentino, that it is believed the Enemy will hardly venture to attack him. Letters of the 5th instant from Pignerol say, That the French Forces under the Duke de la Feuillade were still in the Neighbourhood of that Town: He lately sent a Detachment of five Companies of Foot to join Monsieur Albergotti, who Commands a small Body of the Enemies Troops near Asti; but they were attackt not far from Cony, by a Body of our Militia, who oblig'd them to retire with the loss of many of their Men killed, and some taken Prisoners. About 150 French Prisoners have lately been brought hither, who had been sent out in a Party from the Enemies Camp near Verceil, and surpriz'd and taken by some of our Troops between Trin and Crescentino. Their Army continues very sickly.

Geneva, August 12. Letters from Italy give an Account, That a strong Party of Imperial Forces, which came out of the Country of Trent, having lately made an Excursion into the Dutchy of Mantua, and plundered and burnt two Villages there, the Grand Prior, who Commands the French and Spanish Forces on that side, has caus'd several Villages under the Dominion of Venice to be put under Military Execution, because the Imperialists had been suffer'd to pass through the Territories of that Republick from whom he Demands Satisfaction for the Damage the Duke of Mantua's Subjects have suffered in this Occasion: He is advanced with his Army very near to Verona, and keeps that Place in a manner blockt up, having stopt several Wagon loads of Hay and other Provision, which were carrying thither, and distributed them among his own Troops. The Venetians have in that Town a Garison of about 6000 Men, well provided with all Necessaries for their Defence, in case the French should make any Attempt upon it. The Garison of Mirandola, which has been blockt up some time by a Detachment of the Grand Prior's Army, holds out still, and has lately made a Sally, wherein they killed about 200 of the Enemy, and took many Prisoners.

Hambourg, Aug. 22. Letters from the King of Poland's Camp near Jaroslau, say, He had Reviewed that day part of the Cossacks who are lately come to his Assistance, and had detach'd them towards Sandomir, to protect that Palatinate, which continues firm in his Interest, from the Excursions of the Lithuanian Forces under General Sapieba; and that his Majesty intend'd the next day to Review the rest of the Cossacks, and

1700 Muscovite Auxiliaries, which lay on the other side of the Saan, about half a League from his Camp. These Letters add, That Prince Wiefnowiski, who Commands a Body of Lithuanians that have preserved their Loyalty to their King Augustus, had possessed himself of the Kober Schans on the Dwina, and would shortly be joined by Oginski, with a Reinforcement of Lithuanian Troops, and another Body of Muscovites, in order to block up Riga; but they write from Coningsberg, That the latter were met on the Banks of the Dwina about 11 Leagues above Riga by a Body of the Swedish Forces, and of those of Sapieha, Commanded by General Levenhant, who entirely routed Oginsky's Forces, and the Muscovites that were with them, killing a considerable number upon the spot, and took all their Cannon and Bagage. The taking of Dorpad by the Muscovites is confirmed by the last Letters from Riga.

Falmouth, Aug. 21. Yesterday arrived here the Expedition Pacquet-Boat, Francis Clyes Commander, which came in 12 days from Lisbon.

Plumouth, Aug. 22. This day came in here the Queen Pacquet-Boat, Captain Cuiwerden Commander, bound for Lisbon, being forced back by contrary Winds.

Cowes, Aug. 23. Yesterday a French Ship was by stress of Weather forc'd to Anchor at Shanklin Chine on the back of this Island, which being near the House of Caprain Alckhorne, he ordered his Servants to fire at her with some small Arms; upon which, the French Men on board her, soon came a Shore in their Boat, and surrendered themselves Prisoners, and the Vessel was secured: She is called the Elizabeth of Rochel, is laden with Salt from thence, and bound for Calais.

Portsmouth, Aug. 24. Her Majesty's Ship the Laistoffs sailed out of our Harbour yesterday morning to Spithead, where there are several more of Her Majesty's Ships. The Battalion of Her Majesty's Foot Guards designed for Portugal, is on board the several Ships appointed to Transport it, which will Sail with the first fair Wind.

Yarmouth, August 25. Several light Colliers are lately come into our Road from the Southward, being bound for Newcastle. This morning there passed through our Road about 100 Sail of laden Colliers under Convoy of several of Her Majesty's Ships bound for the River Thames.

Windfor, Aug. 27. This day Count Zeffirini, Envoy Extraordinary from the Great Duke of Florence, had a Private Audience of Her Majesty, and of his Royal Highness the Prince, by whom he was graciously received, being introduced by Sir Charles Cottrel Master of the Ceremonies.

There are Three Mails due from Holland.
