

**Falmouth, August 26.** Two Dutch Privateers sailed hence the 23d Instant to cruize. The next day sailed the Prince Pacquet-Boat Zachariah Rogers Commander, for Lisbon. Yesterday morning Her Majesty's Ship the Hound came in here, which sailed again in the afternoon for Plimouth. This day there passed by here to the Eastward Her Majesty's Ship the Hector, with about 34 Sail of Merchant Ships under her Convoy from Milford, which were joined by 9 Coasters from hence, bound to the Isle of Wight.

**Plimouth, Aug. 27.** Her Majesty's Ships the Revenge, Medway, Exeter, and Mary, sailed hence the 24th Instant to the Westward. The same day Her Majesty's Ships the Moderate and Gloucester, with a Dutch Man of War, and under their Convoy about 50 Merchant Ships from Portugal, &c. set Sail from this Port, being bound some for London, and the rest for Holland, and other Parts. Yesterday sailed the Eagle and Irish Transport Ship for St. Malo, with 600 French and Spanish Prisoners, who are to be exchanged. This day came in Her Majesty's Ship the Hector from Milford and under her Convoy the Catherine and Mary, of and for Rotterdam, laden with Tallow and other Goods from Dublin; the Diligence of Liverpool, and the Bristol of Bermudas, laden with Sugar from Nevis, and bound to London; about 26 Coasters from Liverpool, with Rock Salt and Lead for London; and 10 light Vessels from Falmouth, bound for the Isle of Wight. The same day came in the Sidney from Falmouth.

**Dartmouth, August 25.** This day passed by here to the Eastward two or three Men of War, with a Fleet of about 40 Merchant Ships under their Convoy, part of them English, and the rest Prizes, taken by the Dutch Privateers, and bound for Holland, which all came out of Plimouth yesterday: They were joined by a Prize laden with Salt and Provisions, which was lately brought in here by a Dutch Privateer.

**Cowes, August 28.** The 26th Instant in the evening there came into our Road several outward-bound Merchant Ships from Spithead. Yesterday a Dutch Privateer of 22 Guns, Captain Stevenson Commander, brought in here a French Privateer of 6 Guns, which he had taken near Cape la Hogue.

**Yarmouth, Aug. 28.** Several light Colliers are lately come into our Road from the Southward, being bound for Newcastle. Her Majesty's Ship the Dover came in also yesterday from the Southward.

**Portsmouth, August 29.** Her Majesty's Ships the Gloucester and Moderate came to Spithead the 27th Instant. Yesterday Sir Stafford Fairborn, Vice-Admiral of the Red Squadron of Her Majesty's Fleet, sailed out of our Harbour to Spithead, on board Her Majesty's Ship the Edgar: Her Majesty's Ship the Deptford sailed hence also at the same time to Spithead.

**Deal, August 29.** Yesterday in the afternoon came into the Downs about 40 Sail of Merchant Ships, being the remainder of the homeward-bound Portugal Fleet, which came last from Plimouth, in Company of a Dutch Man of War, and several Prizes bound for Holland, that are passed by on the back of the Goodwin Sands.

*This is to give Notice to all Persons concerned, That Her Majesty has thought it necessary, in this time of War, to direct, That no Person whatsoever be received on board any of Her Majesty's Men of War as a Passenger, or any of the Pacquet-Boats, or be permitted to pass beyond the Sea on board any other Vessel out of any Port of England or Wales, who have a Pass under Her Majesty's Royal Signet and Sign Manual, or under the Hand and Seal of One of Her Principal Secretaries of State; Except only Officers, Soldiers and Recruits, for Her Majesty's*

*Army in Holland, Flanders or Portugal, who are to produce a Pass for that purpose from the Generalissimo, or General. And henceforth all the Officers of the Customs, and other Her Majesty's Officers in the several Ports, are to take due Notice, and be careful that none be suffered to pass beyond the Sea, but in the Manner above mentioned.*

*Whereas a Letter, dated the 23d Instant, and signed S. W. was sent by the Penny-Post to One of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State; This is to give Notice to the Person who writ the said Letter, That if he will come to the Secretary of State to whom he directed it, he shall meet with all fitting Encouragement.*
