The Commissioners for the affairs of Liege have had a Conference, whereas an account has been given to the Constable of Castille, but as yet we cannot guess what effects it may produce. Here are also arrived Deputies from the leveral Provinces under the Spanish jurildiction who are waiting his Excellencies leasure for their Audience.

The Commillioner Ognate ftands acculed by the Filcal of the Privy Council for being the caule of all the late diftu bances given us by the French, and of the ftop put upon the Couriers, which he confidently denies; he continues under the guard of two Mulqueteers but with the liberty to walk abroad with them.

On Saturday last arrived here the Heer Vrybergen in. 2. Yarche from Holland, being deputed with the Heer Meerman to the Constable of Cestille, but the latter his laid Collegue being fain ill by the way at Leyue as the former confinues integnize, but in the mean time his Excellency has forminated the Chief President Houines, and the Chancellour of Brabant as his Commissiones to conferre with them upon the lubject of the r Mission.

The Spanish toldiers in this City behave themselves with more Civility then formerly, being by their Officers better paid and disciplin'd: the Officers both of the Town as well as the Garrilon tsking care nightly by their Patrouilles to prevent any violencies, which with the care taken by the M gistrates in banishing all idle and wandring perfors who are not able to give a fatisfactory account of their buinters here, has much contributed to the quiet and fatisfaction of the City.

As yet the passage of the Couriers by Land into Spain continues interrupted by Monfieur de Louvoy the French Polt-mafter-General ; Letters arriving by fea from Spain of the 4th past advile us, that the young King frems tobe well eftablisht in health, and to be much pleased in feeing the exercises of the new Regiment of Guards, and that the Order of the Golden Fleece is to be spee ily fent into Poland with new elected King; by the same Courier is allo arrived an Order from that Court for the Reve formation of a considerable part of the Army in these Provinces.

Paris Offober 9. The Matter of a Bark lately arnived A Marfeilles gives information that fome days before he difedvered the fleet of the Auxiliaryes under the Command, of the Dake de Navailles on their return from Candia, fo that tis believed they may before this be arrived at Thoulton.

A Courrier from Venice bri jes lerters to the Venetian Amballador, imparting that the Duke de Navailles having Embarked his forces in order to their rerurn home, was put off to Standia, where for fome days he expected the opportunity of a fair Wind, which offered it self the 27 of August on which day he fet faile, but that before his departure General Morofini being centible of the advantages which might be probably sizen to the Energy by their departure , had made fome Overture to the Grand Vifier of a Treaty for an honorable furrender, buy finding that nothing would fatisfy him bur a lubmillion to his difcretion, was refolved to defend the place to the unermoft, and had prevailed with the Dake de Navailles and the Popes Nephew General Rofpigliof to lend him 400 men t'll the artival of the fresh succors daily expected ; under the command of the Duke de Mirandola. That the Turks immediately upon the departure of the Ships made three Aflaults upon the place, in which they were braten off with much flaughter , and the loss of 200 menone iy of the Defendants. Some reports are fince forced a-broad that the place after their lucces in the affaults, made honorable conditions for a furrender, but as to that point weas, yet lufpend our b. lief

Fron Bourdeaux they write that the Baftion Rgyal, of the Chafteau Trompette through some defect in its foundation is fallen down with so much violence that it bare down with it another work huilt rowards the Conyent of the bare-spored Carmelites, insomuch as the Cittadel now yes open and indifensible on the fide towards the Town;

which accident is the more confiderable in that the featon of the year will not probably give us an Opportunity to repair it this Winter, the expense bof which work as is computed may amount to the fumme of 200 thousand Growns.

This laft week King Castmir arrived at the Prince de Condes house at Chantilly, whither the Comedians are O.dered to repair for his divertilement.

From Rochelle we are informed that the Count de Schemberg is still deteined there, partly by the indisposition of his Lady, and partly by the crosses of the winds which have not of late favouredchis defigned voyage for Portugal.
