Vienna, Auguſt 27; N. S. On the 24th Inſtant Te Deum was ſung here, with a triſic Diſcharge of our Cannon; for the Signal Victory obtained over the French and Bavarians at Blenheim the 13th Inſtant. A Courier from Rome paſſed lately through this City, in his way to Poland, with a Brief to the Nuncio there; whereby the Pope authorizes him to allow King Auguſtus the Tenth of all Eccleſiaſtical Revenues for the ſpace of two years. The Cardinal Primate is cited to make his Appearance at Rome within the Term of three months; and both he and all the other Biſhops in Poland are warn'd not to crown Stanislaus for King, under the Penalty of being deprived of their Benefices, which the Pope threatens to confer on others, in caſe of Diſobedience. A Meſſenger arriv'd here the 17th Inſtant, with Letters from the Two Deputies of the Malecontents in Hungary; who were with Prince Ragotzi before Segedin the 13th. The Trenches had been opened 3 days, and a French Engineer had given the Prince Hopes of taking the Place in 6 days more; however he thought fit to raiſe the Siege the 12th, and was going to Gungos, to meet there with his chief Generals, in the Preſence of the Archbiſhop of Colocza; in order to examine the Emperor's Declaration of the 20th of June, and the Conditions which Count Lamberg had Orders to propoſe for a Ceſſation of Arms: In the mean time Directions are given to haſten the raiſing of the Recruits for General Heiſter's Army, who we hear is advanced to Schavava, and has poſſeſſed himſelf of that Paſs; having routed a Body of the Malecontents which lay there. A conſiderable Body of the Militia is alſo ordered to join him. We hear the Malecontents in Tranſylvania have elected Ragotzi Prince of that Country.

From the Duke of Marlborough's Camp at Eppingen, September 3 On the 18th of the laſt Month the Marſhal de Tallard, with moſt of the other Priſoners of Note; march'd from Hochſter towards Hanau and Francfort, under a Guard of 40 Engliſh Horſe. At the ſame time the Repartition was made of all the reſt of the Priſoners, who were ordered to ſeveral Places adjoining, for the better Conveniency of keeping them, till they could be removed further into the Country; and we found that in the whole (including near 3000 who are entered into our Service) their number exceeds 13000 Officers and Soldiers.
