Most Gracious and most Glorious Sovereign,

AMong the rest of Your ever Dutiful and Loyal Subjects, we beg Leave humbly to represent to Your Majesty, That great was the Joy wherewith we first receiv'd the News of that never to be forgotten Victory lately obtain'd in Germany over the French and Bavarian Armies, by Your Majesty's Forces and those of Your Allies, under the Command of his Grace the Duke of Marlborough. When we reflect upon the Justice of that Cause wherein Your Majesty is so gloriously engaged; not only for the necessary Defence of Your own Dominions; but Safety of Europe; When we consider that steady Application and Wisdom in Council; that unshaken Zeal to the Established Church; that prudent Management of the publick Revenues; and that tender Regard to the common Good of Your People, all which have so eminently appear'd throughout Your Majesty's Reign; we may reasonably look upon that Success, and such others as have attended Your Majesty's Arms both at Sea and Land, as the natural Effects or just Rewards of so good and wise an Administration: Yet can we not but be sensible, how far the Glory of that Action at Bleinheim, (great as it was) is owing to the true Courage of those Troops, supported by the Bravery and Conduct of that able General under whom they fought.

While we thus presume to Congratulate Your Majesty upon the Success of that Glorious Day, we cannot but at the same time beg Leave to own our farther Joy for the safe Deliverance of that Your Majesty's Captain General from those many and great Dangers to which his Person was so generously expos'd in the Heat of Battle; whereby he seems to have been preserved, as the most proper Instrument under Your Majesty, to pursue and finish that great Work, which Divine Providence seems to have design'd to be the immortal Glory of Your Majesty's Reign.

That it may so prove, and that a Work already so far advanced may have as successful and glorious an end, we beg Leave to assure Your Majesty of our utmost Endeavours; and that with Hearts full of Duty and Zeal, we shall continue to pray for Your Majesty's long Life and happy Reign ever us.

All which Addresses Her Majesty received very graciously.

Vienna, Octob. 1. N. S. Two Deputies who came lately from Prince Ragozki, were sent back the 27th past; and yesterday Baron Szarmay's Secretary returned hither with an Account, That the

Prolongation of the Truce to the 15th instant had been accepted by the Malecontents: He also brought Passes for the Imperial Commissaries, and for Monsieur Bruyinx Envoy from the States General to repair to Schemnitz the Place of Treaty. The Marquis de Priego goes from hence to morrow to the Duke of Marlborough's Camp to consult with his Grace, and the other Generals, about the sending of Succours to the Duke of Savoy. The Turkish Envoy left this Place the 27th past, in order to return home, being very well satisfied with his Reception; and the Presents which have been made him by the Emperor. Letters from Constantinople of the 18th of August, assure us, That the Ottoman Porte continues the Resolution to observe exactly the Treaty of Carlowitz, and particularly to maintain a good Correspondence with the Emperor.

From the Duke of Marlborough's Camp at Weissemburg, Octob. 7. The 3d instant in the Afternoon a great Sally was made out of Landau by 700 Men; but Prince Lewis being then in the Trenches, gave no good Orders, and dispos'd all things so well, that the Enemy was immediately repulsed with the loss of about 200 Men, without doing us any Damage at all. The 4th the Prussian Forces began a Redoubt for the Security of their Access on the Left; and the King of the Romans being in the Trenches gave Order for the Battery of Mortars to fire that Night. Yesterday a Lieutenant and 18 Men came over to us from the Town, who gave an Account, That the Garison suffers very much by their continual Fatigues, and that we have already dismounted several of their Cannon. Last Night the Redoubts and the Parallels between them were finished; and our Men have begun the Sap in search of the Enemy's Mines, in order to make a Lodgment on the Communication. The Prussian Battery of 30 Pieces of Cannon will be ready to morrow, though the Weather be now bad. His Grace the Duke of Marlborough intends to morrow to wait upon the King of the Romans in the Camp before Landau.

Berlin, Octob. 7. Part of the Troops design'd from hence to Prussia began their march yesterday, and the rest will follow in a few days. Monsieur Prebendow, Great Treasurer of Poland, is thence expected here with the Character of Ambassador Extraordinary from King Augustus, and that part of the Republick which is in his Interest, in whose behalf he is to acknowledge the King of Prussia in that Quality. Our Letters from Poland contain very little News, King Augustus being still in the same Post, near the joining of the Rivers Bugg and Weisfel, it being uncertain which way the King of Sweden design'd to march next; but it was said, That General Reinschild, with a Detachment of the Swedish Forces was advanced into the Territory of Lublin.

Hague, Octob. 14. N. S. The Forces design'd for the Modelle are in a readiness to march, and will be reinforced by four Bataillons and six Regiments of Horse, from the Army Commanded by the sieur d'Auverquerque. Our Fleet of Men of War and Merchant Ships from the Streights is arriv'd, and the Admirals Callenberg and Wassenaer, are expected here this Evening. The Convoy for Portugal, with a Reinforcement for our Troops there, set sail yesterday from the Texel. They write from Swisserland, That the Castles of Ivrea are surrendered to the Duke of Vendome; and the Garison made Prisoners of War. These Letters add, That there were yet three considerable Bodies of Camisars in the Seveane, who were so exasperated by the Desertion of some of their Brethren, that they had resolv'd to put to Death any Person that should come to make Proposals to them of that Nature, as they had already done one that came with great Offers from the Marshal de Villars to one of their Chiefs.

Dublin, Sept. 25. This day a Proclamation was published by Order of the Lords Justices, declaring Her Majesty's Pleasure, That the Parliament in this Kingdom, now Prorogued unto the 3d day of October next, should be further continued by Prorogation from that day unto Saturday the 10th day of February next.

Falmouth, October 2. Yesterday came in here Her Majesty's Ships the King's-fisher, Burlington and Dartmouth, with 7 homeward-bound East-India Ships under their Convoy from St. Helena, which Place they left the 25th of July last. This Morning came in here several Coasters from the Eastward; as did also the Terceras, the Mead Gally, and the Sea Nymph, bound for the Streights; with the John and the Charles, both of this Place, laden with Salt from Lanes, but sail from Plymouth; and the Four Brothers of and for France.

Plymouth, October 3. Yesterday passed by this Harbour Her Majesty's Ships the Hazardous and Layfette, with Six Sail of Ships under their Convoy, bound for Falmouth; and Eight Sail of Merchant-men came in here for London.

Dartmouth, October 3. Yesterday in the Evening passed by this Harbour to the Westward three of Her Majesty's Ships; as did this day two more, being bound to Plymouth, and thence to Ireland, to Convoy the Transport Ships which are to receive on board the Forces design'd to be sent from that Kingdom to Portugal. Yesterday came in here two Guernsey Privateers from cruising.

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Hull, October 4. Yesterday failed from hence Her Majesty's Ships the *Rechefer Prize* and *Postillion*, with about 30 Sail of Merchant Ships under their Convoy, bound for London. Last night came up 3 or 4 laden Merchant Ships from London, and one with Wine from Portugal: They came from the *Thames* under Convoy of Her Majesty's Ship the *Nightingale*, which saw them into the *Humber* yesterday morning, and then proceeded to the Northward with a Fleet of light Colliers.

Deal, October 4. The *London* and the *Lucy Gallies* failed this Morning from the *Downs* to join a *Dutch Fleet* which was passing by the back of the *Goodwin Sand* to the Westward, and is supposed to be their Convoy with Forces on board for Portugal.

Portsmouth, October 5. Rear-Admiral *Bing* failed this Morning from *Spithead* with several of Her Majesty's Ships for the *Downs*.

Whitehall, October 5. There are Letters from Sir *William Mathews*, Governor of the *Leeward Islands*, dated at the *Maderas* the 14th of June, O. S. giving an Account of his being arrived there on board one of Her Majesty's Ships; and that he had been received by the Governor of that Island with great Marks of Distinction and Civility, and intended to proceed the next day on his Voyage to the *Leeward Islands*.

London, October 6. On the 4th Instant Sir *Thomas Cook*, lately chosen Lord Mayor for the Year ensuing, deiring to be excused, as being through his Indisposition disabled from holding the said Office, the Common Council consented thereto, and did accordingly discharge him from that Election: And this day the Common Hall met in order to proceed to a new Choice, and returned Sir *Owen Buckingham* and Sir *Thomas Rawlinson* to the Court of Lord Mayor and Aldermen, who Elected Sir *Owen Buckingham* to be Lord Mayor for the Year ensuing.
