**October 17.** The following Address was presented to Her Majesty by the Right Reverend the Lord Bishop of London.

To the **QUEEN's** most Excellent Majesty.

The humble Address of the Bishop of London, the Dean and Chapter of St. Paul's, and the rest of the Clergy of the Diocese of London.

**WE** Your Majesty's most Loyal and Dutiful Subjects, the Bishop of London, the Dean and Chapter of St. Paul's, and the rest of the Clergy of the Diocese of London, offer by our most hearty Praises and Thanksgivings to God for that great Victory obtained by the Forces of Your Majesty and Your Allies, under the Command of Your Captain General the Duke of Marlborough; which is so Glorious an Action, as will adorn the History of Your Majesty's Reign, and perpetuate the Memory of Your great General beyond the Power of Envy and Detraction; and likewise for the great Advantages obtain'd by Your Majesty's Fleet, under the Command and happy Conduct of Sir George Rooke: Which Successes at Land and Sea, we hope have so settled the Crown upon Your Majesty's Head, and the Succession in the Protestant Line, that all the Power of France shall never be able to unsettle it again.

This is not only a great Joy and Triumph to Your Subjects, but a new Accession of Power and Glory to Your Majesty, which we doubt not but You will improve, not only for the Advantage of Your Subjects, and the Peace and Security of Your own Reign, but for the Protection of Protestants abroad, which Your Allies of the Romish Communion, who have been preserved by Your Arms, cannot deny to Your Majesty's Intercession. God grace Your Majesty the Hearts of all Your Subjects, and the Necks of Your Enemies; that while they pursue the same Counsels You may have repeated Occasions to visit Your Cathedral of St. Paul's, to praise God for more Glorious Successes than these, which have already so much adorned what ever we have yet seen.

And we beg Leave upon this Solemn Occasion to renew in particular those Thankfull Acknowledgements to Your Majesty which were made in all our Names by the Address of the Convocation for Your great Bounty to the Clergy, in granting the First-Fruits and Tithes for the Augmentation of small Vicarages; which as we have reason to believe has contributed to these Glorious Successes, so we pray Almighty God to Renew Your Majesty with a long and prosperous Reign over us, to the lasting Settlement of this Truly Primitive and Apostolick Church in Unity and Peace.

The following Address from the Borough of Christ-Church, was presented to Her Majesty by William Ettricks Esq; one of their Representatives in Parliament.

For nothing less than that Prudence and Resolution which Your Majesty every Day shows in the Administration of Affairs, could have made Your Subjects Exert their Strength and true English Valour, which (by Divine Providence) has disappointed the most promising Hopes of Your Enemies. May this Your Zeal be ever attended with Peace at home, and Victory abroad. May Your Majesty's Life be prolonged to restore the Liberty of Europe, and maintain the just Rights and Privileges of all Your Subjects; and, after a Glorious Reign here, may You be Blessed with Immortality in Glory.

To the **QUEEN's** Most Excellent Majesty.

The humble Address of Your Majesty's Justices of the Peace, and High-Bailiff for the City and Liberty of Westminster, together with the Grand-Jury, assembled at the Quarter-Sessions of the Peace in Westminster-Hall, the 4th day of October 1704.

**M**ay it please Your Majesty to give us Leave to Congratulate the Glorious and Unparallel'd Victories lately obtained by Your Majesty's Forces under the Command of the Renowned Duke of Marlborough; and Your Success at Sea, with the taking Gibraltar, under the Conduct of Sir George Rooke; which Victories have Establish'd Your Majesty to be the Protector, and Preserver of the Liberties of Europe.

And that Your Majesty may always continue to be so, and Your Arms always Conquer, and Your Majesty have a long, happy, and prosperous Reign over us, shall ever be our Prayers.

All which Addresses Her Majesty received very graciously.

**Vienna, Oct. 11.** Letters from Presbourg of the 9th instant give an Account, That the Sicur Occoluciani, one of the Deputies of the Malecontents in Hungary, arrived there that Day with Passes from Prince Ragotski for the Imperial Commissioners, and the Envoy of the States General, who had resolv'd to set out the 13th for Schemnitz, the Place of Treaty: Some little Disputes had, notwithstanding the Cessation, happen'd between the Inhabitants of the Country about Presbourg and the Malecontents, which had all been accommodat'd through the Mediation of the States Envoy; and we have hitherto a fairer Prospect than could be expected of an entire Compofure or all Differences on that side. Divers Recruits have lately pass'd by here marching towards Italy to join the Cour of Leiningen, and will very shortly be followed by a further Reinforcement. The Marquis of Culfani is march'd with his Regiment, and the Regiment of Horle of Hanover, to reinforce General Herbeville, who Commands a Body of the Emperor's For-

ces in Bavaria; and General Thierheim, with the Imperial Forces under his Command, which lay between Passau and Linz, has Orders likewise to join him.

*From the Duke of Marlborough's Camp at Weissenbourg, Oct. 17.* On Wednesday Monsieur Wachtberg, Envoy from the King of Poland to the Emperor and the Marq. de Prie, the Duke of Savoy's Minister at the Imperial Court, came hither to wait on the Duke of Marlborough, with Commissions from their respective Masters. Yesterday two Regiments of Foot and three Squadrons of Dragoons march'd, under the Command of Colonel Hrzal, with two Pieces of Cannon, in order to take Poss at Homberg on the River Blize. All our Approaches to Landau are now carried on to the Foot of the Glacis, and our Men are at Work on the last Parallel of Communication between the Right and the Left, which it is thought will be finished this Night. Mr. Stepany departed from hence two days ago in order to return to the Court at Vienna.

*Bylin, Oct. 18.* The Forces which lately march'd from hence towards Prussia have been Countermanded, and are ordered to Post themselves along the Frontiers of Pomerania towards Poland, the Horse by Butow up towards Dantzick, and the Foot in a Line from Colberg by Stolce and Lawenbourg, in order to preserve the Neutrality in those Parts, and prevent any Excursions that might be made by the Forces on either side. Letters from Dantzick of the 15th say, King Augustus was still at Pultusk, tho' as the Forage began to grow scarce, it was thought his Troops might soon be moving towards Tycockzyn on the Frontiers of Lithuania. The Swedes were marching with great diligence towards Warsaw. The 19th, early in the Morning, a Party of Saxon Horse surpris'd the Sieur Towianki, Palatine of Lencici, about 7 or 8 miles from Dantzick, and carried him away Prisoner. They gain'd at the same time a considerable Booty, and took several Sets of Horses belonging to the Cardinal. This Towianki was ever a most stiff Adherent of the Cardinal's, and consequently a great Opposer of King Augustus. They write from Brellaw of the same Date, That the Swedish General Horn was come thither in his way to Saxony, where he is to Surrender himself Prisoner according to his Parole. A Prince of the House of Lubomirsky was also come thither, who is Negotiating an Accommodation between King Augustus and the Crown General, which would be very much for his Majesty's Interest.

*Hague, Octob. 24. N. S.* The Detachment for the Moselle being drawn together near Mastricht under the Command of Major General Elkervelt, began to march the 20th instant, and is to be upon the Moselle by the 30th. The Baron of Troague is gone with this Detachment, who is to have the Direction of the Siege of Trarbach, as Chief Ingenier. We hear the French are drawing a Body of Troops together near Trier, and intend to send thither a Reinforcement from the Netherlands in order to oppose our Designs. Monsieur d'Auverquerque continues at Borchloen, with the Army of the States General under his Command, and the Enemies Forces are still within their Lines. They write from Brussels, That the Elector of Bavaria has given Orders to the several Towns in the Spanish Netherlands to provide, according to their Abilities, a certain number of Recruits and Horses for the Army against the Spring; and has Summoned the Nobility of the several Provinces to meet at Brussels in the beginning of the next Month, to consult upon the raising of new Taxes for carrying on the War.

*Falmouth, Oct. 8.* On the 10th instant failed the Prince Packet-Boat, Zacharias Rogers Commander, with one Mail for Lisbon. The next day failed two Dutch Privateers to the Westward. Yesterday came in a Dutch Privateer from Cruising; and the St. Mathias of Dram, homeward bound from Bristol.

*Plymouth, Octob. 15.* Yesterday came in the William and John of And from Guernsey, John Tasker Master, with Salt for this Place; And the Uphrow Anna Catharina of and from Rotterdam, Garret Cornelison Master, with Ballast, bound for Limrick.

*Portsmouth, Octob. 15.* On the 13th instant in the Morning failed to St. Helens Rear-Admiral Byng, with several of Her Majesty's Ships, who Anchored there till towards the Evening; and then set sail for the Downes.

*Yarmouth, Oct. 16.* Yesterday came into our Road Her Majesty's Ships the Pendennis, Rochester Prize, and Postillion, with several Ships under their Convoy from Hull, which failed hence this day for the River Thames.

*St. James's, Oct. 16.* The Baron de Schutz Envoy Extraordinary from the House of Brunswick Lunenbourg had this Day an Audience from Her Majesty, being Introduced by Sir Charles Cortrell Master of the Ceremonies; At which Audience he Congratulated Her Majesty in the Name of the Elector of Hanover and the Duke of Zell, upon the Victory obtained by Her Majesty's Fleet in the Mediterranean.

*St. James's, Octob. 17.* His Excellency the Baron de panheim, Ambassador Extraordinary from the King of

Prussia, had this Day an Audience of Her Majesty, being Introduced by Sir Charles Cortrell Master of the Ceremonies; At which Audience his Excellency delivered a Letter from the King his Master to Congratulate Her Majesty upon the Great and Glorious Successes of Her Majesty's Arms both by Sea and Land; And his Excellency took particular Notice to Her Majesty of the Extraordinary Advantages the Empire and the Common Cause have gained by the famous and memorable Victory at Hochstet.
