Letters from Presbourg of the 9th inftant give an Account, That the Sieur Occoluciant, one of the Departies of the Malecontonics in Hungary, arrived there that Day with Paffes from Prince Ragotski for the Imperial Commillaries, and the Envoy of the States General, who had refolved to let out the 13th for Schemnitz, the Place of Treaty: Some little Diffutes had, nor withfranding the Ceffation, happened between the Inhabitants of the Gountry about Presbourg and the Malecontents, which had all been accommodated through the Mediation of the States Envoy; and we have hitherto a fairer Prospect than could be expected of an entire Compositive or all Differences on that fide. Divers Recruits have lately passed by bere marching towards Italy to join the Count of Leiningen, and will very shortly be followed by a further Reinforcement. The Marquis of Gulani is marched with his Regiment, and the Regiment of Horse of Hanover, to reinforce General Herbeville, who Commands a Body of the Emperor's Forces.

Frow Sie Duke of Marlborough's Comp at Weissenbourg, Offic 17.
On Wednesday Monsieur Wachleberg, envoy from the K. of Poland to the Emperor and the Marq. de Prie, the Luke of Savoy's Minister at the Imperial Court, came hither to wait on the Duke of Marlborough, with Commissions from their respective Masters. Yesterday two Regiments of Foot and three Squadrons of Dragoons march'd, under the Command of Colonel Hirzel, with two Pieces of Cannon, in order to take Post at Homberg on the River Blize. All our Approaches to Landau are now carried on to the Foot of the Glacis, and our Men are at Work on the last Parallel of Communication between the Right and the Lett, which it is thought will

Beylin, Off. 18.
