

united benefice of Worstead with Dilham in the diocese of Norwich.

"SCHEME.

"Whereas by an Order of His late Majesty King George the Fifth in Council dated the 17th day of December, 1929, and published in the London Gazette on the same day the benefice of Worstead and the benefice of Dilham were united into one benefice with cure of souls:

"And whereas the Bishop of the said diocese of Norwich has forwarded to us provisional proposals pursuant to the said Pastoral Reorganisation Measure, 1949, recommending that the union of the said benefices should be dissolved and that the said benefice of Worstead should be held in plurality with the united benefice of Stoley with Westwick and that the said benefice of Dilham should be held in plurality with the united benefice of Smallburgh with Barton Turf, all of which benefices are situate in the said diocese of Norwich.

"And whereas effect can be given to the said proposals so far as they relate to the dissolution of the said union by Scheme prepared by us and confirmed by Order of Your Majesty in Council pursuant to the said Union of Benefices Measures, and in so far as they relate to the said pluralities by subsequent Orders made by the said Bishop pursuant to the said Pastoral Reorganisation Measure:

"Now, therefore, we, the said Church Commissioners, do humbly recommend and propose to Your Majesty as follows, that is to say:—

"1. *Disunion of benefices.* The union of the benefice of Worstead and the benefice of Dilham in the said united benefice of Worstead with Dilham shall be dissolved and the said benefices of Worstead and Dilham shall thereupon each become a separate benefice with cure of souls within the limits of its separate parish.

"2. *Taking effect of disunion.* The disunion of the said united benefice shall take effect upon the date when any Order of Your Majesty in Council affirming this Scheme is published in the London Gazette.

"3. *Parsonage house.* The parsonage house of the said united benefice shall belong to and be the parsonage house of the separate benefice of Worstead.

"4. *Distribution of endowments.* Upon the disunion taking effect the endowments and property of the said united benefice shall be divided and distributed as follows, that is to say: a capital sum sufficient to produce an annual income of £147.12.0, being part of a larger capital sum held by us for the said united benefice, shall be assigned and annexed to the separate benefice of Dilham and all other the endowments and property of the said united benefice shall be assigned and annexed to the separate benefice of Worstead.

"5. *Patronage.* Upon the disunion taking effect the rights of presentation to the benefices of Worstead and Dilham shall be vested in the persons or bodies (or their successors in title) in whom the rights of presentation to those benefices were respectively vested immediately before the union of the said benefices."

And whereas the provisions of the Union of Benefices Measures, 1923 to 1952, the Union of Benefices Rules, 1926 and 1930, and the Pastoral Reorganisation Measure, 1949, relating to the preparation and submission of this Scheme have been duly complied with:

And whereas the said Scheme has been approved by Her Majesty in Council:

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to affirm the said Scheme and to order that it shall be and become effectual in law immediately upon the publication of this Order in the London Gazette.

WHEREAS the Church Commissioners have duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a Scheme bearing date the 10th day of February, 1956, in the words and figures following, that is to say:—

"We, the Church Commissioners, acting in pursuance of the New Parishes Measure, 1943, have prepared and humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council the following Scheme for constituting a new parish to be taken out of the parish of Saint James, Shirley, in the diocese of Winchester.

"SCHEME.

"Whereas we, the Church Commissioners, are satisfied that the spiritual interests of the area defined in the Schedule hereto and delineated on the map hereto annexed would be best served by constituting it a new parish:

"And whereas we are satisfied that a suitable endowment therefor will be provided:

"And whereas there is within the said area a church known as Saint Jude, Warren Avenue, which has been approved by us, the said Church Commissioners, as suitable to be the parish church of the new parish, but which said church has not yet been consecrated:

"Now, therefore, with the consent of the Right Reverend Alwyn, Bishop of Winchester, (in testimony whereof he has set his hand and affixed his episcopal seal to this Scheme), we, the said Church Commissioners, do humbly recommend and propose as follows, that is to say:—

"1. *Constitution.*

"(a) As from the date of the licence thereto of a Minister the area defined in the subjoined Schedule hereto and delineated on the map hereto annexed shall be a separate district for spiritual purposes.

"(b) As from the date of the consecration of the said church known as Saint Jude, Warren Avenue, the area shall become a new parish.

"(c) The name of the district (or parish as the case may be) shall be 'The District (or Parish) of Saint Jude, Warren Avenue, Southampton'.

"2. *Archdeaconry and Rural Deanery.*

The parish shall be in the Archdeaconry of Winchester, and in the rural deanery of Southampton.

"THE SCHEDULE.

"The area comprising:—

"All that part of the parish of Saint James, Shirley, which is bounded on the west by the district of Saint Peter, Maybush, Southampton, on the north-west by the parish of Rownhams, on the northeast by the parish of North Stoneham, and on the remaining sides by an imaginary line commencing on the boundary which divides the parish of Saint James, Shirley, from the parish of North Stoneham at a point in the middle of the stream or brook known as 'The Holly Brook' and continuing thence south-westwards along the middle of the last mentioned stream or brook to Shirley Pond, and thence in the same direction along the southeastern boundary of Shirley Pond to the point where it meets Winchester Road and continuing thence generally eastwards along the northern side of the last mentioned road and of Romsey Road to the boundary which divides the parish of Saint James, Shirley, from the district of Saint Peter, Maybush, Southampton."

And whereas the provisions of the New Parishes Measure, 1943, relating to the preparation and submission of this Scheme, have been duly complied with:

And whereas the said Scheme has been approved by Her Majesty in Council:

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said Scheme, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately upon the publication of this Order in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Measure.

And Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said diocese of Winchester.

WHEREAS the Church Commissioners have duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a Supplementary Scheme bearing date the 10th day of February, 1956, in the words and figures following, that is to say:—

"We, the Church Commissioners, acting in pursuance of the Union of Benefices Measures, 1923 to 1952, now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council the following Supplementary Scheme which we have prepared with the consents of the Right Reverend Michael, Bishop of Saint Albans, and of the Reverend Henry John, being the incumbent for the time being of the benefice of Kempston (in
