The QUEEN's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS the Church Commissioners have duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a Scheme bearing date the 4th day of May, 1956, in the words and figures following, that is to say:—

the words and figures following, that is to say:— "We, the Church Commissioners, in pursuance of the Church Patronage Act, 1870, and of the Acts therein mentioned, have prepared the following Scheme for effecting a transfer of the ownership of the advowson or perpetual right of patronage of and presentation to the church and cure (hereinafter called 'the said benefice') of Enmore in the County of Somerset and the diocese of Bath and Wells of Somerset and the diocese of Bath and Wells.

" SCHEME

"Whereas we are satisfied that Gilbert Sandford Poole of South Petherton in the County of Somerset, a Lieutenant Colonel (retired) in Your Majesty's Army and Patrick Frank Hancock of 9 Pelham Crescent in the County of London, Esquire, as Executors of the Will of Harold Hamilton Broad-mead, deceased, are the patrons or persons entitled to present or nominate to the said benefice in case the same were now vacant: the same were now vacant:

"And whereas the said Gilbert Sandford Poole and Patrick Frank Hancock desire to transfer the advowson of the said benefice to the Bishop of Bath and Wells for the time being and are consenting to this Scheme (in testimony whereof they have executed the same):

"And whereas we are satisfied that the transfer will tend to make better provision for the cure of souls:

souls: "Now, therefore, with the consent of the Right Reverend William, Bishop of Bath and Wells (in testimony whereof he has executed this Scheme), we, the said Church Commissioners, humbly recom-mend and propose that upon and from the day of the date of the publication in the London Gazette of any Order of Your Majesty in Council ratifying this Scheme and without any conveyance or assur-ance in the law other than such duly gazetted Order, the whole advowson or perpetual right of patronage of and presentation to the said benefice shall be trans-ferred to the said William, Bishop of Bath and Wells, and his successors in the same Bishopric and shall thereupon and thenceforth become and be shall thereupon and thenceforth become and be absolutely vested in and shall and may from time to time be exercised by the Bishop of Bath and Wells for the time being."

And whereas the said Scheme has been approved by Her Majesty in Council:

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said Scheme, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately upon the publication of

this Order in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Acts.

And Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said diocese of Bath and Wells.

TRIAL OF THE PYX OF THE LONDON MINT. VERDICT.

WERDICT. We, whose names are hereunder written, having been sworn on the 14th day of March, 1956, before the Queen's Remembrancer at Goldsmiths' Hall in the City of London, made the following assays and trials of Her Majesty's coins which, according to accounts produced by the officers of the Royal Mint in London, were coined in the said Mint from the 1st day of January, 1955, to the 31st day of December, 1955, both dates inclusive, in accordance with the Coinage Acts 1870 to 1946 (hereinafter called "the Acts") and were set aside and placed in the pyx of the said Mint as prescribed by regula-tions made under the Acts.

We ascertained the number of coins in each packet produced to us and that such number corre-sponded with the number which the officers of the Mint represented the packet to contain. 2. We found no gold coins in the said pyx. 3.-(a) We found that the silver coins therein weighed in all not more than twelve ounces troy. (b) We weighed in bulk such silver coins and we ascertained that they were on the whole within the variation allowed under the Acts from the standard weight thereby prescribed, there being no variation from standard weight. (c) We then assayed such silver coins comparing them with the silver trial plate produced by the Board of Trade, and we found that they were on the whole within the variation allowed under the
