WHEREAS the Church Commissioners have duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a Scheme bearing date the 5th day of April, 1956, in the words and figures following, that is to say:—

"We, the Church Commissioners, acting in pursuance of the Pastoral Reorganisation Measure, 1949, and the Union of Benefices Measures, 1923 to 1952, now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council the following Scheme which we have prepared with the consent of the Right Reverend John, Bishop of Derby (in witness whereof he has signed the Scheme), for effecting the union of the benefice of Earl Sterndale and the benefice of Monyash, both situate in the diocese of Derby.

"SCHEME

"1. *Union of Benefices.* The benefice of Earl Sterndale and the benefice of Monyash shall be permanently united together and form one benefice with cure of souls under the style of 'The United Benefice of Earl Sterndale and Monyash', but the parishes of the said benefices shall continue in all respects distinct.

"2. *Taking effect of union.* Upon the day when any Order of Your Majesty in Council affirming this Scheme is published in the London Gazette the union shall forthwith take effect and the Reverend James Francis Hildage, if he is then incumbent of the said benefice of Monyash, shall with his consent (certified by his signature hereto), be the first incumbent of the united benefice.

"3. *Parsonage House.*

"(a) Upon the union taking effect and until the avoidance of the united benefice by the said Reverend James Francis Hildage the parsonage house at present belonging to the benefice of Monyash shall be the house of residence of the incumbent of the united benefice.

"(b) Upon the union taking effect the parsonage house at present belonging to the benefice of Earl Sterndale and the site and appurtenances thereof and the grounds heretofore usually occupied and enjoyed therewith shall be sold and disposed of by us at such time or times and in such manner in all respects as to us shall seem expedient.

"(c) The net proceeds of such sale or sales shall be held by us for the augmentation of the endowment of the united benefice provided however that (1) if the Bishop of Derby shall at any time so request, so much of the proceeds as we shall deem necessary shall be applied by us towards the cost of purchasing a site to be available, if required, for a new house of residence for the incumbent of the united benefice and (2) if at any time after the avoidance of the united benefice by the said Reverend James Francis Hildage the said bishop shall so request, such further sum as we shall deem necessary shall be applied towards the erection or provision of a new house of residence for the incumbent of the said united benefice.

"4. *Patronage.* After the union has taken effect the right of presentation to the united benefice shall be exercised by the patrons of the two benefices alternately, the patron of the benefice of Earl Sterndale having the first presentation to the united benefice to be made after the union."

And Whereas the provisions of the Union of Benefices Measures, 1923 to 1952, the Union of Benefices Rules, 1926 and 1930, and the Pastoral Reorganisation Measure, 1949, relating to the preparation and submission of this Scheme have been duly complied with:

And Whereas the said Scheme has been approved by Her Majesty in Council:

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to affirm the said Scheme and to order that it shall be and become effectual in law immediately upon the publication of this Order in the London Gazette.

"We, the Church Commissioners, in pursuance of the Church Patronage Act, 1870, and of the Acts therein mentioned, have prepared the following Scheme for effecting a transfer of the ownership of the advowson or perpetual right of patronage of and presentation to the church and cure (hereinafter called 'the said benefice') of Feltham in the County of Middlesex and in the diocese of London.

"SCHEME.

"Whereas we are satisfied that Sir James Ernest Thorold, Baronet, formerly of 3, Gipsy Lane, Headington in the County of Oxford but now of The Old Hall, Syston, Grantham in the County of Lincoln and Sir Geoffrey Ronald Codrington, K.C.V.O., C.B., D.S.O., O.B.E., formerly of 110, Eaton Square, Westminster in the County of Middlesex, but now of Roche Court, Winterslow, Salisbury, Wiltshire, a Colonel in Your Majesty's Territorial Army as Personal Representatives of the late Ernest James Wythes, Esquire, are the patrons or persons entitled to present or nominate to the said benefice:

"And whereas the said Sir James Ernest Thorold and Sir Geoffrey Ronald Codrington desire to transfer the advowson of the said benefice to the Bishop of London for the time being and are consenting to this Scheme (in testimony whereof they have executed the same):
