

line eastwards across Moor's Lane to the Middle of the southwestern end of the unnamed brook or stream which forms the northwestern boundary of closes numbered 2287 and 2353 and continuing thence generally northeastwards along the middle of the said brook or stream to the southern side of Cromwell Lane and continuing thence in a straight line northwards across Cromwell Lane to the middle of the southern end of the unnamed brook or stream which flows in a northerly direction across Senneleys Park and continuing thence northwards along the middle of the last mentioned brook or stream to its junction with the unnamed brook or stream forming the southern boundary of close numbered 2425 and continuing thence westwards along the middle of the last mentioned brook or stream to a point opposite the southern end of the wall or fence forming the western boundary of the last mentioned close and continuing thence first northwards to and then generally northwards along the last mentioned wall or fence to the southern side of Mill Lane and continuing thence in a straight line northeastwards across Mill Lane to the middle of the southern end of the unnamed brook or stream which forms generally the southeastern boundary of closes numbers 2490 2489 2488 3092 3097 3098 and continuing thence northeastwards along the middle of the last mentioned brook or stream to the western side of Barnes Hill and continuing thence first eastwards to then northeastwards along the middle of Barnes Hill to a point over the middle of Lapal Tunnel by which the Dudley Canal passes under Barnes Hill and continuing thence eastwards along the middle of Lapal Tunnel and the middle of the Dudley Canal to the boundary which divides the parish of Saint Gabriel, Weoley Castle, from the parish of Saint Mary, Selly Oak, at the centre of Weoley Castle Bridge."

WHEREAS the Church Commissioners have duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a Scheme bearing date the 16th day of August, 1956, in the words and figures following, that is to say:

"We, the Church Commissioners, acting in pursuance of the Pastoral Reorganisation Measure, 1949, and the Union of Benefices Measures, 1923 to 1952, now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council the following Scheme which we have prepared with the consent (in witness whereof he has signed the Scheme) of the Right Reverend Harold, Bishop of Saint Edmundsbury and Ipswich, for effecting the union of the benefice of Acton and the benefice of Little Waddingfield (now part of the benefice of Great and Little Waddingfield) both of which benefices are situate in the diocese of Saint Edmundsbury and Ipswich.

"SCHEME.

"*Union of the benefices of Acton and Little Waddingfield*

"1. The benefice of Acton and the benefice of Little Waddingfield, being part of the benefice of Great and Little Waddingfield, shall be permanently united together and form one benefice with cure of souls under the style of 'The United Benefice of Acton and Little Waddingfield,' but the parishes of the said benefices shall remain in all respects distinct.

"2. The union shall take effect upon the day when any Order of Your Majesty in Council affirming this Scheme is published in the London Gazette and the Reverend Canon Robert Theodore Lambert, if he is then incumbent of the benefice of Acton, shall, with his consent (which has been given to us in writing) be the first incumbent of the united benefice.

"3. Upon the union taking effect the remaining part of the benefice of Great and Little Waddingfield shall be known as the benefice of Great Waddingfield.

"4. After the union has taken effect (a) the right of presentation to the united benefice shall be exercised alternately by the patron of the benefice of Acton and by the patron who was patron of the benefice of Little Waddingfield immediately prior to its union with the benefice of Great Waddingfield, the said patron of the benefice of Little Waddingfield having the first presentation to the united benefice to be made after the union, and (b) the right of presentation to the benefice of Great Waddingfield shall be exercised solely by the patrons who were patrons of the benefice of Great Waddingfield immediately prior to its union with the benefice of Little Waddingfield.

"5. Upon the union taking effect the parsonage house belonging to the benefice of Acton shall be the house of residence of the incumbent of the united benefice.

"6. Upon the union taking effect a capital sum of £4,449 10s. 4d. being part of a larger capital sum held by us for the benefice of Great and Little Waddingfield and producing an annual income of £142 10s. 11d. together with the whole of the endowments and property of the benefice of Acton, be assigned and annexed to the united benefice and all the endowments and property of the benefice of Great and Little Waddingfield (including the house which was the house of residence of the incumbent of the said benefice) shall be assigned and annexed to the benefice of Great Waddingfield."

And whereas the provisions of the Union of Benefices Measures, 1923 to 1952, the Union of Benefices Rules, 1926 and 1930, and the Pastoral Reorganisation Measure, 1949, relating to the preparation and submission of this Scheme have been duly complied with:

"SCHEME.

"1. *Union of Benefices.* The benefice of Great with Little Hockham and the benefice of Wretham with Illington shall be permanently united together and form one benefice with cure of souls under the style of 'The United Benefice of Great with Little Hockham with Wretham with Illington', but the parishes of the said benefices shall continue in all respects distinct.

"2. *Taking effect of union.* Upon the day when any Order of Your Majesty in Council affirming this Scheme is published in the London Gazette the union shall forthwith take effect.

"3. *Parsonage House.* Upon the union taking effect the parsonage house at present belonging to the benefice of Great with Little Hockham shall be
