The Import Duties (Exemptions) (No. 15) Order, 1956, which continues until 18th September, 1957, the existing exemption from duty chargeable under the Import Duties Act, 1932, of certain ferromanganese and iron and steel goods. The exemption for tinplate and terneplate (and other similar products coated with tin or terne metal) is discontinued and these goods accordingly again become tinued and these goods accordingly again become liable as from 19th March, 1957, to various rates of duty under the Import Duties Act, 1932.

The Order comes into operation on the 19th March, 1957, and has been published as Statutory Instruments 1956, No. 1863.
