

Road and continuing thence eastwards along the said walls or fences to the northern end of the boundary between numbers 99 and 101, Canterbury Road and continuing thence southwards along the last mentioned boundary and in a straight line in continuation thereof to the middle of Canterbury Road and continuing thence eastwards along the middle of the said road to a point opposite the northern end of the eastern boundary of close numbered 156 on the map and continuing thence southwestwards to and along the last mentioned boundary for a distance of 1,440 feet and continuing thence in a straight line southwestwards to the eastern end of the southern boundary of the house or premises known as 19 Swanstree Avenue and continuing thence first southwestwards then northwestwards along the said boundary and along the rear boundaries of the houses or premises known as numbers 21-39 Swanstree Avenue and in a straight line northwestwards in continuation thereof to the middle of Swanstree Avenue and continuing thence southwestwards along the middle of the said Avenue and in a straight line in continuation thereof to the boundary which divides the parish of Bapchild from the parish of Sittingbourne."

WHEREAS the Church Commissioners have duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a Scheme bearing date the 13th day of May, 1957, in the words and figures following, that is to say:—

"We, the Church Commissioners, acting in pursuance of the Pastoral Reorganisation Measure, 1949, and the Union of Benefices Measures, 1923 to 1952, now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council the following Scheme which we have prepared with the consent of the Right Reverend William, Bishop of Salisbury (in witness whereof he has signed the Scheme), for effecting the union of the benefice of Bloxworth, the benefice of Winterbourne Anderson with Winterbourne Zelstone and the benefice of Winterbourne Tomson, all situate in the diocese of Salisbury.

"SCHEME.

"1. *Union of Benefices.* The benefice of Bloxworth, the benefice of Winterbourne Anderson with Winterbourne Zelstone and the benefice of Winterbourne Tomson shall be permanently united together and form one benefice with cure of souls under the style of 'The United Benefice of Bloxworth with Winterbourne Anderson, Zelstone and Tomson', but the parishes of the said benefices shall continue in all respects distinct.

"2. *Taking effect of union.* Upon the day when any Order of Your Majesty in Council affirming this Scheme is published in the London Gazette the union shall forthwith take effect.

"3. *Parsonage House.* Upon the union taking effect the parsonage house at present belonging to the benefice of Winterbourne Anderson with Winterbourne Zelstone shall be the house of residence of the incumbent of the united benefice.

"4. *Patronage.* In every series of five successive turns of presentation or nomination to be made to the united benefice after the union has taken effect, the patron of the benefice of Bloxworth shall have the first and fourth turns, the patron of the benefice of Winterbourne Anderson with Winterbourne Zelstone shall have the second and fifth turns and the patron of the benefice of Winterbourne Tomson shall have the third turn."

WHEREAS the Minister of Housing and Local Government, after giving to the Incumbent and Churchwardens of the Parish of Dogmersfield, in the County of Hampshire, 10 days' previous notice of his intention in that behalf, has, under the provisions of the Burial Act, 1853, as amended by subsequent enactments, made a Representation to Her Majesty in Council that, for the protection of the Public Health, the opening of any new burial ground in the Civil Parish of Dogmersfield, in the said County of Hampshire, save with the previous approval of the Minister of Housing and Local Government, should be prohibited and that burials should be discontinued therein as follows, viz.:—

Dogmersfield.—Forthwith and entirely in the Old Churchyard of the Church of All Saints, in the said Parish.

Now, therefore, Her Majesty in Council is pleased hereby to give notice of such Representation and to order that the same be taken into consideration by a Committee of the Privy Council on the 11th day of July next.

And Her Majesty is further pleased to direct that this Order be forthwith published in the London Gazette, and that copies thereof be affixed on the doors of the Churches or Chapels of, or on some conspicuous places within, the Parish affected by such representation one month before the said 11th day of July.
