Vienna, April 11. N. S.

Prince Eugene has put off his Departure to Italy for three or four days. Count Lewenstein will be going shortly to his Government of Bavaria. Our last Accounts from General Heister say, That he was marched from Comornah towards Presbourg, in order to attack a Body of Malecontents which was drawing together on that side, under the Command of Berzeni and Ozkay, two of their Chiefs. We have received the Confirmation of the Defeat lately given by General Palfi, Ban of Croatia, to another Body of the Malecontents, with these further Particulars; That he had with him but 700 Men, and the other were 3000 strong, and that 3 Officers of Note among the latter were killed in the Action. Most of the Imperial Forces that were in Garrison at Modern, Posing, and Fort St. George, three Forts of which the Malecontents have lately possessed themselves, are arrived at Anger and Mark on this side the River Mark, and (as is said) are to be sent to Italy. A Battalion of Militia, which lay at Scherdingen, mutinied lately, and marched towards Lintz; but Colonel de Wend followed them with 300 Horse, and soon reduced them. There is a Report of a new Revolution in Turkey; and that the Grand Signior himself has been obliged to retire into Asia: Others say, the Grand Vizzer only is removed from his Employment, and another put into his Place; but we know not yet what Credit is to be given to this News.

Zurich, April 15. Signior Vendiamo Bianchi arrived here lately from Venice, being sent by that Republick to renew their ancient Treaties with the Cantons of Zurich and Bern. We have an Account, That the Garison of Verue beat a Parley the 7th Instant; but not coming to any Agreement with the French, they began to fire again on both sides with greater Fury than before.

Coblentz, April 19. Two Regiments of the King of Prussia's Forces, one of those of Munster, and one of Swiss, which is in the Pay of the States General, marched lately by this Place, going to Triers.

Frankfort, April 19. The Danish Forces that are in Bavaria are ordered to begin their March forthwith to Italy. We hear, That 3 French Battalions are lately come to Haguenau. The Enemy on this side continue to work with great Application upon their Lines. Several Regiments of our Hussars lie between Lauterbourg and Weissembourg; where (as is said) more Forces are expected; And the Count de Frieze intends next week to put himself at the head of them.

Triers, April 19. The French Forces on this side are in motion; They have got together 15 Regiments of Foot and 7 of Horse at Metz, and the Town of Diedenhoven is likewise filled with their Forces. We on our side take all the necessary Precautions for preventing their Designs, and are finishing our Lines and other Works for the Security of this Place with all possible Expedition.

Paris, April 12. We have the Confirmation of the Surrender of Verue, with these further Particulars; That on the 6th Instant the Garison beat a Parley, and offered to capitulate upon honourable Conditions; but the Duke of Vendosme refused to grant them any: The next day they beat a Parley again; but the Duke insisting, That they should surrender themselves Prisoners of War, they began to fire upon the Besiegers with greater Fury than ever. The next day they set fire to their Mines, and blew up most of their Fortifications; and retired into the Fort called the Dunjeon; and after they had thus dismantled the Town, and killed abundance of our Men, they surrendered at last on the 9th at Discretion, for want of sufficient Provisions. They write from Italy, That the Grand Prior has formally besieged the Town of Mirandola.

Hanover, April 21. The Elector of Hanover intends to go hence to-morrow, in order to make a Visit to the Duke of Cell. The Regiment of Stark, which is to serve this Summer under his Grace the Duke of Marlborough, began to march yesterday.

Hague, April 24. N. S. Yesterday morning there came an Express from the Count de Noyelles, dated at Treves the 19th Instant, giving an Account, That the French were drawing together an Army of 53000 Men on the Moselle, with intent (as was thought) to attack Saarburch; but there being no Express come from him since, it is believed the Enemy have not yet undertaken any thing. The Count de Noyelles on the other hand was assembling all the Forces he had in those Parts, which amount to upwards of 50 Battalions and 70 Squadrons, besides the English, which are ordered to march out of Garrison by the first of May, N. S. Yesterday in the afternoon the Deputies of the States for Foreign Affairs came to confer with his Grace the Duke of Marlborough upon the Subject of this Express; and it was agreed, That the Army on the Maese should be formed immediately, in order to make a Diversion on this side. Admiral Allemonde took Leave of the States General this day, in order to go to Amsterdam: Having settled there his own private Affairs, he intends to embark next week on board the Squadron under his Command designed for Portugal, and afterwards to set sail with the first fair Wind. Letters from France confirm the raising of the Siege of Gibraltar, and the taking of Verue by the French; which last Place surrendered the 9th for want of Provisions.

Plimouth, April 14. The 10th Instant came in here the St. Anne, a Danish Ship from Norway, laden with Deal and Timber for this Port; and the St. Peter from the same Place, laden with Deals for Bristol. The 12th came in the Alliance Packet-Boat in 12 days from Lisbon. This day arrived here the King William Packet-Boat, John Smith Commander, from Jamaica, having been 49 days in her Passage. The Wolfenburgh and the Gentleman, two Dutch Privateers, failed hence this day to cruise.

Plimouth, April 15. On the 11th Instant Her Majesty's Ship the Rochester brought into this Port as Prize the Benjamin of Nants, of 300 Tuns, laden with Sugar from Martinico. The same day came in here the Hope, John Israel Master, from Southampton; the Friendship, John Munford Master, from Lynn; the King Olive of Stockholm, John Weststrand Master, bound for Lisbon; and a Danish Ship laden with Deals from Norway. The 12th came in the Constancy, Triumphant of Venice, homeward-bound from Amsterdam; the John from Penzance; and the Levant Galley of Amsterdam, homeward-bound from Leghorn. That day Her Majesty's Ship, the Chatham brought in a French Prize called the Eagle of Calais, laden with Flax; and Her Majesty's Ship, the Triton another Prize, being a French Privateer of 12 Guns. Yesterday the Levant Galley abovementioned set sail for Amsterdam.

Barnmouth, April 15. Yesterday came in here the Mermaid Galley of London, Captain John Gudgeon Commander, homeward-bound from Smirna. She failed from thence the 6th of February last, and in the Straights was chased by a French Man of War of 50 Guns; but being the better Sailer, got clear of her. The 22d of the last Month she touched at Algiers: A small Vessel from Tetuan came into that Port; the Men on board which reported that they had seen the Engagement between the Confederate Squadron commanded by Sir John Leake and the French Squadron under the Command of Monsieur Pointy; and that of the latter, 3 of their biggest Ships were taken, as many burnt, and 4 sunk.

Tarmouth, April 16. Several light Colliers passed thro' our Roads this afternoon, which came from the River Thames, and are bound to Newcastle; and they were joined by divers others from hence.

Whitehall, April 19. Letters from Cambridge of Monday last give an Account, That Her Majesty came thither that day about one in the afternoon, was received by the Mayor and Corporation in their Formalities a Mile out of Town, and by the University, his Grace the Duke of Somerset, their Chancellor, in his Robes, being at their head, at the end of the Regent-Walk that leads to the Schools. Her Majesty went into the Congregation-House; and afterwards to Trinity-College, where, being entred into the Lodgings, She was pleased to bestow the Honour of Knighthood upon John Ellis, Doctor in Physick, the Vice-Coancellor, James Montague and Isaac Newton Esqs; Her Majesty was nobly entertained at Dinner by the University, and afterwards was pleased to see the Library, and several Colleges, and then returned to Newmarket.

And thence to return to England, and not to be stayed or delayed on any Providence whatsoever.

This is likewise to give Notice, That Deputy Post-Masters are appointed at each Island to attend and regulate all Masters concerning Letters and Packets, and to Correspond with the General Post-Office about the same: Therefore all Persons Corresponding with New-England, New-York, Jersey, Maryland, Pennsylvania, Virginia, Carolina, and Bermudas, may have their Letters to the respective Governments put up in Bags apart, in the Method they are now sent to each Island; And the Deputy Post-Master of each Island hath Orders; where the next and most immediate Conveyance is to be had, to send them to the Master of America, as hath hitherto been the Practice for conveying Letters from Barbadoes to Bermudas by Sloops, and other Embarkations, daily trading between the said Islands and the Continent; by which means Returns may be as constantly made from the Continent to the said Post-Masters, and by them transmitted to England by the Packets, in their Monthly Courses, whereunto their Orders oblige them; without any further Charge there, than what is to be paid at the General Post-Office in England, according to the Rates following.
