9. Vacancies

The number of vacancies to be filled from the com-petition as a whole, and the number to be filled by Method I and Method II respectively, will be decided by the Commissioners.

10. Candidates Trained as Teachers

Candidates who have been trained as teachers, elsewhere than in England and Wales, and upon whose training public money has been spent cannot be appointed until the consent of the appropriate education authority (e.g., the Scottish Education Department, the Ministry of Education for Northern Ireland) has been notified to the Commissioners.

11. Assignment

The Interview Board will assess candidates' suitability for all the posts for which they are eligible under these Regulations; candidates will, however, be asked to state on their application forms their preferences among the four Departments. The Commissioners will decide to which Departments. The com-successful candidate is to be assigned. Assignments will be made in accordance with the needs of the public service and the candidates' suitability for par-ticular Departments, but the wishes of candidates will, where possible, be taken into account.

The names of the successful candidates will be shown under the Departments to which they are assigned.

Any attempt on the part of candidates to enlist support for their applications through Members of Parliament or other influential persons, except as referees to be named by them in their application forms, will disqualify them for appointment.
