Vienna, May 30. N. S.

N the 22d instant the Baron de Szirmai's Sectetary arrived here from Hungary, with Propo-fals about the Exchange of Prisoners. Since the late Emperor's Death we have not heard from thence of any Action of moment, the Malecontents having suspended their Incursion into Moravia, altho they had already made the necessary Preparations for that purpose; and the Imperialists continuing in their Quarters in the Island of Schut, except a strong Party that was sent to guard a Convoy of Stores and Provisions to Trenschin, which Place they are said to have telieved the 18th instant. A Courier will be dispatched from hence to morrow towards Turkey, to notifie the late Emperor's Death, and his present Imperial Majesty's Accession to the Throne, and to assure the Porte of his Disposition to observe the Treaty of Carlowitz; And it is said a Minister will be sent thither in two or three months to renew those Assurances with more Solemnity. Letters from Salo of the 19th instant fay, That Prince Engene endeavoured on the 12th to pass the Mincio near Valeggio; but finding the Ene-my too strong on that side, he sent his Foot over the Lake di Garda, from Lazice to Salo, and ordered the Horse to march round thither; and having joined the Forces which had been left there, under the Command of General Bibra, intends, as is believed, to make his way into the Milaneze through the Brescian. The Republick of Venice has appointed Signior Delfino, who at present resides here as their Ambassador, and Signior Morosini, their Ambassador at Rome, to be their Ambassadors Extraordinary, to make their Compliments of Condoleance and Congratulation to the Emperor. Monsieur Mascousky, who has been here all the Winter, in the Quality of Deputy from the Circle of Swabia, returned thither the 26th, has ving obtained several Mattets which he was sent hither to sollicite; particularly, That Donawert should be restored to the Rights of an Imperial City, and have

a Vote in the Diet of that Circle as formerly.

From the Duke of Marlborough's Camp at Elst, June 5. On the 3d instant the English and Dutch Troops which were encamped near Igel, on the other side of the Moelle, passed that River at Two in the morning over several Bridges laid for that purpose, and from thence marched to those prepared for them over the Sar, which River they likewise pussed at Consaarbrug. They were followed by the Danish Forces, the Lunenburgers, and Hessians, who were all encamped in the Plain between that Place and Triers. We had a most dissolut Desslee to pass, where it was expected the Enemy would have opposed us, which they might have done with great Advantage; but they did not attempt it: And after a long March of near 8 hours, we came with our Right within a quarter of a League of Sysk: The Troops lay on their Arms all night, it being too late to encamp; and this morning we made Motion and took this Camp, our Right being at Perle near Syrk on the Moselle, and our Left at Hollandorp, his Grace the Duke of Marlborough having taken his Quarter at this Place near the Centre of the

Line. Upon the appearance of our Forces the 3d in the afternoon, the Enemy, who were encamped near Sirk, immediately retired with great Precipitation to Retel, where they continue. The Deferters tell us they were joyn'd that day by 30 Squadrons from the Upper Rhine, and that 20 Battalions are marching from thence, which will also be with them in a day or two. The 7000 Palatine Troops in the English and Dutch Pay are hourly expected.

Berlin, June 6. The King went yesterday to Orianenbourg with intent to continue there a sew days. Monsieur Prebendow, the Great Treasurer of Poland, who lately came hither in the Quality of Ambassador from that Crown, is gone to Orianenbourg to wait upon his Majesty. Letters from Saxony say, The King of Poland went the 29th past to Carelsbad, intending to stay there a fortnight or three weeks. His Majesty's Troops are marching to form a Camp near Guben on the Frontiers of Lusatia. They write from Cracow of the 27th past, That the Diet of that Palatinate met the 25th at Prozovice upon a Summons from the new elected King Stanislaus, whom they had acknowledged.

From the Confederate Army at Loen, June 8. A great number of Wagons were brought in here two days ago, which had been demanded from the neighbouring Country to carry our Ammunition and Bagage.

Letters from Huy of the 6th instant give an Account, That on the 31st past the Enemy began to Bombard the Place from a Battery of 5 Mortars, and the next day their Batteries of Gannon began to play in order to make a Breach on that side which is next the Maese. The 2d instant a Drummer came from the Enemy, saying, He had a Message to the Governor; but he sent Orders for him to retire immediately, or else, if he refused to do it, the Garison should fire upon him; whereupon he went back without delivering his Mef-The 3d, between 10 and 11 at night, the Enemy made a false Attack towards Fort St. Joseph, to amuse the Garison, and at the same time assaulted Fort Picard, which they carried after a very good Renstance; and afterwards they also possessed themselves of the Red-Forr, so that we have only the Tower of Terravise left on that side, which is undermined, in order to blow up when our Men can keep it no longer. We loft at the taking of those two Forts, a Lieurenant, an Enligh, and 12 of 15 private Men. The Enemy, as soon as they were Masters of the Red-Fort, began to erect a Battery there against the Castle. Hague, June 12 N. S. Our homeward-bound Fleet from Curaffaw is larely arrived. The Earl of Albemarle went from bence yesterday to the Aimy Com-manded by Monsieur d'Auverquerque. Letters from Huy of the 8th instant fay, That the Garison in the Castle of that Place fill defended it felf very vigoroufly; and that the Breaches which the Enemy's Cannon has made are not yet in a Condition or them to make an Assault. The Letters which came in this day from France fay, The Marshal de Villeroy has Orders, if he can make himself Master of that Place, to fer down afterwards before Liege; Directions being sent at the same time to the Maishal de Villars, to Intrench himself, and to avoid coming to a Bartle. By an Express which came in yesterday there is an Account, That his Grace the Duke of Marlborough having passed the Saar, marched the 3d instant with great Expedition towards Syrk, in order to have engaged the Enemy, but that upon his approach they retired to Rerel, where they were advantagionlly posted behind a River, and some Intrenchments, the forcing of which is hardly thought practicable; fo that it is supposed his Grace will undertake some Siege.

Faimouth, May 31. The European-Galley, Peter Wall Commander, came in here the :8th past from Leghorne, but last from Crookehaven in Ireland. She came away from Leghorne in Company with five other Merchant-men, one of which, called the Medi-terranean, in her Passage from Ireland, took a French Privateer of twelve Gunt. Yesterday Her Majesty's Ship the Chatham brought in here two Prizes; one called the Europa of Nanz, of 130 Tens, 16 Guns, and 50 Men, laden with Wine, Brandy, and other Goods; the other, the Catherine of St. Malo, of 90 Tuns, 8 Guns, and 19 Mon, laden with Sugar of 90 Tuns, 8 Guns, and sound for Cadiz; both which Prizes and Ginger, and bound for Cadiz; both which Prizes are last from Brest.
