Lisbon, June 8. N. S.

Several Men of War are lately arrived here from Ireland, with divers Transport-ships under their Command, having on board Horses and Recruits, which are landed and marched to the Army. A Fleet of about 400 Merchant-men, under Convoy of 6 Men of War, is fallen down our River, in order to sail for England with the first fair Wind. Letters from the Camp at Albuquerque of the 2d Instant give an Account, That after the taking of that Place, a Council of War was held, wherein it was resolved to march towards Badajos. The Marshal de Telle, who lay on that side with the French and Spanish Army, has reinforced that Garrison. They write from Gibraltar of the 23d inst. That the Enemy having some Forces posted at a place called the Sand-Hills, from whence they could see upon our Men, who were employed in levelling the Works the Enemy had raised during the Siege; Colonel Reyer was sent out the 13th with a Detachment of Granadiers to attack them; but the Enemy, upon his Approach, retired without making any Opposition; and our Men have since entirely demolished those Works.

**Vienna, June 3.** The Emperor has appointed the Prince of Salza to be President of his Council, and First Minister of State; Baron Zeilern to be Chancellor of Austria; and Count Philip of Zinzendorf to be Chancellor of the Court: And it is said he intends to make further Alterations in the Ministry. Prince Joseph of Lorraine is lately gone to Italy, to make the Campaign under Prince Eugene: The Reinforcements and Recruits designed thither continue their March by the way of Tirol. There is a Report, That a Body of the Malcontents in Hungary came unexpectedly before Buda, plundered one of the Suburbs of that Town, and carried away Prisoners divers of the Inhabitants, and several Men whom they found at work in the neighbouring Vineyards: That another Body of them came into the Neighbourhood of Pest, and drove away some Cattle, but were pursued, and the booty recovered, by a Detachment of that Garrison: And that they are drawing together a considerable number of Men near the River Morava, with intent to make an Excursion towards the Borders of Austria; but the River is at present so much swelled, that they will find it a very difficult matter to pass it. The Baggage of General Herbeville, who commands in Chief the Imperial Forces in Hungary, which came in the Island of Schutt, was sent down thither yesterday by Water; as was also a considerable quantity of Ammunition, which had been taken out of our Arsenal: And it is said, that a strong Reinforcement of Horse and Foot is shortly to march thither. It is reported, that 6 new Regiments will be raised very speedily.

**Bologna, June 7.** We have an Account from Turin, That a Party of Hussars, which had been sent out to make an Excursion towards Crescentino, met near that Place 4 Troops of Dragoons, computed at 180 Men, all new Cleashed, who were marching thither from the Valley of Aousta, whom they attacked, killed 40 of them, and brought the rest Prisoners to Turin.

**Dresden, June 10.** The King of Poland is still at Carelsbad, but intends to be on the 20th Instant at Gorkitz, where his Forces in this Electorate have their Rendezvous. A Minister of the Czar of Muscovy is come to Carelsbad to confer with his Majesty. He left the Czar at Witepski in Lithuania, making Preparations for the Siege of Riga. A Detachment of his Army was marching towards the Province of Moldavia, to join the Saxons and other Troops that are posted on the other side of the River Weissel.

**Frankfurt, June 10.** Prince Lewis went yesterday from Ratis, to join his Forces which are marching towards the Moselle. The Pontoons of a new Invention, which were lately made here, were sent away yesterday towards the Moselle; and a greater Number is ordered to be got ready with all possible Expedition.

**Cologne, June 11.** The Forces of the Circle of Westphalia which lay near this Place, began their March the 10th instant towards the Moselle. This day two Regiments of the Forces of Munster, and the Forces which are furnished by the City of Cologne, as their Quota, arrived here in their way thither. The Regiment of Horse of the Prince Royal of

Prussia, the Dragoons of Witgenstein, and that of Foot of Lottum, advanced this day 4 Leagues above this Place, marching likewise to the Moselle.

**From the Duke of Marlborough's Camp at Elst, June 13.** The Army commanded by his Grace the Duke of Marlborough continues still in this Camp, expecting the arrival of the Troops from the Imperial Army, and those of Prussia; the former are supposed to be advanced this day as far as Birkenfeldt, and part of the latter are on this side Mentz. Baron Flemming, General of the King of Poland's Forces, came hither on Wednesday last from the Waters at Enbs to wait on his Grace: And the same day the Count de Martigni, Grand Veneur to the Duke of Lorraine, brought Letters from his Master, recommending his Country and Interests to his Grace's Protection: Monsieur Geldermalsen, Deputy of the Council of State in Holland, arrived here this day from thence, being to continue with the Army during the Campaign. On the 8th Instant a Party of our Hussars brought into the Camp 27 Horses, which they had taken from the Enemy in the Road between our Camp and Rickenville. Another of our Parties of 60 Foot and 30 Hussars, that went out last night towards Luxembourg, returned this Day with a Booty of 150 Horses, which they took within a League of that Place from Wagons that were bringing Bread to the Enemy's Camp. The Situation of this Camp gives us a good Opportunity of besieging Saar-Louis. The Marshal de Villars continues in the same Camp, very strongly entrenched: The Desertion among his Troops is so great, that he has judged it necessary to post Guards round his Camp to prevent it, which does not however hinder great Numbers of his Men from coming over to us daily.

**Hague, June 16.** The Enemy's Forces before the Castle of Huy having made Preparations for a general Assault, and the Breaches being so wide, that the defending of the Place any longer was judged impossible, the Governor bear a Parley the 10th Instant about 9 at night, but could obtain no other Conditions than that the Garrison should march out of the Breach with their Arms, and should afterwards lay them down, and surrender themselves Prisoners of War; which was put in Execution the next day at noon. The 13th, that part of the Garrison which was in the Forts St. Joseph and La Saar marched out in like manner, and they were all carried to Namure. The Enemy have not since made any Motion; but they give out, that their Design is to attack Liege. Several Letters from Madrid came by the former Post giving an Account of a great Insurrection in Catalonia, wherein not only the ordinary sort of People, but even the principal Inhabitants, were concerned; and that upon Advice thereof, Orders were sent to the Governor of Cadix to disband two Regiments of Dragoons, composed of Natives of that Province, who were in that Garrison, and to imprison their Officers, which he had accordingly done. These Advices are confirmed by the Letters which came in this day; And they add, That the Marshal de Telle, upon Advice that our Forces had taken Albuquerque, had laid aside his Design of attacking the separate Army of Portuguese commanded by the Marquis das Minas, and retired towards Badajos, in order to provide for the Security of that Place, expecting that our Forces would besiege it. The Pope's Inter-Nuncio, who resides at Brussels, is lately come hither, to compose the Differences between the Roman Catholics in this Country, concerning the Bishop of Sebaste and a Priest named Code, who both pretend to an Authority over them, as Vicar-General, one being appointed by the Pope, and the other by the States General; upon which Subject the Inter-Nuncio had two days ago a Conference with the Deputies of the City of Amsterdam, in the Assembly of the States of Holland and Westfriesland, who are at present in Town. Our Fleet of Merchant-men, consisting of about 300 Sail, bound to the Baltick, failed lately, under Convoy of 11 Men of War.

**Plymouth, June 5.** Yesterday came in here a Danish Ship bound for Lisbon: The same day sailed 3 Dutch Men of War, 3 Dutch Privateers, and about 16 Sail of homeward-bound Ships and Prizes under their Convoy: This day came in the Ann, laden with Masts for the Dock; the Zealand Privateer of Middlebourg from cruising; the Barntad Galley of London, George Morris Master, from Leghorn; and the Friend-

Friendship of Boston, William Wind Master, from Newfoundland. Her Majesty's Ship the Rochester brought in here this day a French Prize of 26 Guns and 250 Tuns, laden with Wine, Oyl and other Goods, from Cadiz.

Westminster, June 10. Her Majesty having been graciously pleased to Call by Her Writ, Thomas Parker, of the Inner-Temple, Esq; Queen's Serjeant; Henry Chesham, of Grays-Inn, Esq; James Grove, of the Inner-Temple, Esq; William Bonister Esq; St. John Brodericke Esq; and Joseph Weld Esq; all of the Middle-Temple; John Barnes, of Grays-Inn, Esq; Henry Lloyd, of the Inner-Temple, Esq; Richard Wynn Esq; Richard Richardson Esq; both of the Middle-Temple; John Hoo Esq; and John Chesham Esq; both of the Inner-Temple; John Burch, of the Middle-Temple, Esq; John Conyns, of Lincoln's Inn, Esq; and Thomas Webb, of the Middle-Temple, Esq; to take upon them the State and Degree of Serjeant at Law; they accordingly appeared at the Chancery-Bar on the 8th Instant, where they took the usual Oaths, and delivered to my Lord Keeper a Ring for Her Majesty, and another for his Royal Highness the Prince of Denmark, with this Motto, [MORIBUS, ARMIS, LEGIBUS.] And this day, being conducted by their respective Societies to Gray's-Inn, they performed in the Hall, before all the Judges, the Ceremony of Counting; and having had their Coats put on, they walked from thence, being clothed in Parry-coloured Robes, and accompanied by a great many Gentlemen of the Long Robe out of the several Societies, and all their Officers, to Westminster-Hall, where, at the Bar of the Court of Common-Pleas, they again Counted, and gave Rings to all the Judges, Serjeants and Officers, in the usual manner; and afterwards returned to the Middle-Temple-Hall, where they entertained divers of the Nobility, the Judges, Serjeants, and a great number of other Persons of Quality, with a splendid Dinner, and with the exactest Order, amidst so great a number of Guests and Spectators.

The Counterfeiting of Powers to receive Seamen's Wages being grown so frequent a Practice, it is thought fit to give this publick Notice, that John Chettle, of St. Dunstons Steepy, Stocking-maker, was (at the Sessions held at the Old-Baily, London,) on Thursday the 24th of May last, convicted on three several Indictments for forging false Powers to receive Seamen's Wages, and was fined 20 Nobles for each Offence, and to stand three times on the Pillory, viz. at the Admiralty-Office, the Navy-Office, and the Pay-Office.

And they do further give Notice, that if any Seaman that has given Money to any Person belonging to the said Chest, or to any body for them, to get their Allowance settled or enlarged, or for Discharge of their Business, will come to them and discover it; they shall not only have their Pensions continued, but shall have their Monies again; But if they refuse to come in and make such Discovery, and it be otherwise found out, such their Pensions shall not only be suspended, but the Person shall be prosecuted with the utmost Severity according to Law. And if any Person that can make any considerable Discovery of such corrupt Practices, who are not Pensioners, will come in and prove the same, they shall be well rewarded by the said Supervisor and Governors.
