The Secretary of State for the Home Department has issued a Warrant to the following effect:—

**THE CIVIL DEFENCE CORPS (SICK PAY)
WARRANT, 1958.**

1. Where a member of the Civil Defence Corps established by and under the warrant of the Secretary of State loses remuneration in his private employment in consequence of an injury or disease caused by or arising out of the performance of his duty as a member of the said Corps, and the injury or disease was received or contracted without his own default, he shall be entitled to sick pay in accordance with the provisions of Article 2 of this Warrant.

2.—(1) The sick pay to which a member of the Civil Defence Corps is entitled shall be payable so long as he continues to lose remuneration in his private employment or for a period of twenty-six weeks, whichever is the less, and the rate thereof shall be whichever is the lower of the following rates, that is to say:—

(a) a rate equal to the rate of such loss of remuneration, less the rate of any national insurance benefit to which the member may be entitled; or

(b) a rate equal to the difference between £8 10s. a week for a man or £6 10s. a week for a woman and the rate of any national insurance benefit to which the member may be entitled, so, however, that no account shall be taken of any increase in the rate of such benefit in respect of children or adult dependants.

(2) In relation to a period of less than a week, including such a period at the end of a period of completed weeks, sub-paragraph (b) of the preceding paragraph shall have effect as if for the reference therein to the weekly rates there were substituted a reference to the daily rates of 28s. 4d. for a man and 21s. 8d. for a woman.

(3) In this Article the expression "national insurance benefit" means sickness benefit under the National Insurance Acts, 1946 to 1957, and injury benefit under the National Insurance (Industrial Injuries) Acts, 1946 to 1957.

3. This Warrant shall come into operation on the sixth day of February, 1958.
