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Lisbon, June 23. N. S.

THE Dutch Fleet commanded by Admiral Allemonde arrived here the 13th Instant. The 20th the Earl of Peterborough; on board Her Majesty's Ship the Renelagh; came into our River, as the rest of the Fleet under the Command of his Lordship and Sir Cloude-ville did the next day. The excellent Heat of the weather rendering the Siege of Badajos impracticable at this time, our Army is gone into Quarters of Refreshment; and the Earl of Galway, with the other Generals, are shortly expected here, to concert Measures with the Earl of Peterborough and Sir Cloudeville Showell.

Paris, June 17. The French Army commanded by the Marquis de Vendôme passed the Doria the 12th Instant near Paris, and the next day, encamped along a Rivalét, with the Right at Rondizzone, and their Left at Torazzo. Our Army upon their Approach retired to Chivas, and the Foot pitched themselves in a Line newly made, which reaches from the Po; and by the means of a Bridge over that River, has Communication with the Village of Castagnito, which is also fortified. The Enemy have since been making Preparations for attacking those Works, where they will meet with a vigorous Resistance. They have sent to France 1000 Men whom they took Prisoners at Ivrea, Verue, and Milan; but those who were at Verceil are to remain in Italy, in pursuance of an Article of the Capitulation granted upon their Surrender of that Garison. Out of 12000 French Prisoners which the French were sending under a Guard to Genoua, in order to their being Shipp'd off to France, 400 have found means to escape, many of whom are come hither.

Paris, June 19. On the 17th Instant we came within sight of Chivas; The same day the Duke of Arenne passed the Po at Crescentino with a Detachment of Horse and Foot, and advanced towards Castagnito, and we are preparing to attack that Place, as well as the Line lately made on the other side of the Po. We expect that the Duke of Savoy is marched with his Horse towards Gaffo, having left his Foot at Castagnito, in the Line mentioned, and at Chivas. They write from the Grand Duke's Camp at Moscolino of the 17th, That he had sent 5 Regiments and 4 Squadrons to Montechiari, and continued to march the Imperialists, who were to be joined on the 20th to the Palatine Troops, and other Reinforcements, making the whole about 5000 Men, and intended, in all appearance, to encamp as soon as they should be come up.

Vienna, June 24. The Emperor has appointed the Count Schonborn, Nephew of the Elector of Mentz, to be Vice-Chancellor of the Empire, and Count Wallenstein to be near Marshal of the Court. The Danish Horse designed for Hungary are marched by this Place in their way thither, and the Foot, who come by Water, are expected here the next day. General Herbeville continues with the main Body of the Imperial Forces in the Island of Schur, expecting a Reinforcement. Our Advices from Buda say, That General Glocksberg began his March the 13th towards Pax, in order to attack the Fort which the Malecontents have lately taken near that Place. A Body of Malecontents has laid Siege to the Garison and Inhabitants whereof make a vigorous Defence. General Pally marched the 16th with a Detachment from the Island of Schur towards Posing and Moscolino, in order to fall upon a Body of 3000 Malecontents which lay between those two Places; but they retired upon their Approach with great Precipitation into the Mountains; and our Men overtook their Rear, of whom they killed several, and took 50 Prisoners.

Frankfurt, July 1. N. S. The Confederate Forces which lately marched out of Triers were two days ago near Traerbach, according to Orders whither they should proceed. They write from our Camp at Lauterbourg, That the Duke of Wirtemberg was arrived there, with the Forces under his Command, and the Moselle; and that the French Forces commanded by the Marshal de Marlin continued encamped near Dorbach.

Paris, June 25. The Duke of Marlborough's Camp at Lieu les Beguignes, N. S. The Duke of Marlborough having taken Measures with Monsieur d'Auverquerque, and the other Generals, to march on the first Instant to the Enemy, Advice came that they were retired the morning before to Montenaeken, within which they added a half of their Lines; whereupon it was thought necessary to give the Troops one Day's Rest more; all possible Diligence being used in the mean time in embarking the Artillery for the retaking of Huy. We received the Confirmation from Triers, and other Parts, of General d'Aubach's

having, contrary to his Grace's Orders, abandoned that Town, and that at a time when there was not the least Apprehension of the Enemy's coming that way, the Marshal de Villars having made considerable Detachments towards these Parts, and being marched with the rest of his Troops, at least the most part of them, towards Alsace, to join the Marshal de Marlin. And by the last Advices from Triers it appears, that the French did not take possession of that Place till four days after he had quired it, and then only with 400 Men, detached from the Garison of Luxembourg. The first Instant the French Army marched from Tongeren: They had marked their Camp at Wareme, where Preparations were already making for the Entertainment of their Generals; but upon Advice that our Bridges were ready, and that our Army would pass the Maese that morning, they continued their March, and encamped at Montenaeken. The 2d our Army passed the Maese over two Bridges near Vifelle, and advanced to Hanef; the Army commanded by Monsieur d'Auverquerque marching to Theis upon the Jaar. The Enemy having Notice of our March, decamped that evening with great Precipitation, and retired into their Lines, having sent away most of their Bagage the day before. The 3d we made a Halt. The 4th the two Armies decamped; that which is commanded by his Grace the Duke of Marlborough came to this Ground, the Left being near Lieu les Beguignes, and the Right at Trelin; the other, under the Command of Monsieur d'Auverquerque, has its Right at St. Servain and Latine, and Brest upon its Left. This morning a Troop of 100 Hussars, which his Grace has brought from Germany, was ordered to march towards the French Lines, who seeing 3 Squadrons of the Enemy's Horse; advanced towards them; whereupon the Enemy immediately retired in great Confusion, and our Hussars followed them; but coming to a hollow way, only the Captain and 60 of the Hussars, who were best mounted, could get over; these however pursued the Enemy, and brought off each of them a Prisoner from out of the midst of their Squadrons, without the Enemy's firing at them, or making the least Opposition. The Enemy have divided their Army, and placed their Troops in several Poits, for the better guarding of their Lines, the Elector of Bavaria having his Quarters at Jausse, and the Marshal de Villeroy at Jandrain. The 5th Lieutenant-General Scholten, who marched from Triers with the heavy Bagage and the Dutch Artillery, joined us with 8 Battalions, and 3 Squadrons of Horse, having left 3 Battalions and two Squadrons to guard the Artillery and Ammunition which is coming up the Maese. The 6th in the morning Monsieur Scholten was detached with 12 Battalions, and 10 Squadrons of Horse, to take possession of Huy, where the Enemy have only two Battalions in Garison: We expect the Artillery will be there this evening. His Grace at his coming to Maffricht was complimented, by Deputies sent for that purpose, by the Chapter and the Magistracy of Liege.

Hague, June 7. N. S. The Army commanded by his Grace the Duke of Marlborough arrived at Maffricht the 30th Inst, and is since marched towards Hanef; a Detachment being sent to attack the Castle of Huy, where the French have left a slender Garison, having demolished the neighbouring Forts. Baron Hompeich, who lately came hither from the Duke of Marlborough, and the other Generals, to concert Measures with the States General, went from hence this morning, in order to return to the Army. The States have sent Orders for repairing and augmenting the Fortifications of Traerbach; and for providing of that Place with all Necessaries for its Defence, which is to be done at their Charge.

Dublin, June 16. The Rt. Hon. the Lord Cutts was on the 12th Instant introduced into the House of Peers in the usual Manner. His Lordship has since his Arrival received Visits from the Nobility and Gentry here.

Falmouth, June 25. Yesterday passed by this Port to the Eastward the homeward-bound Lisbon Fleet, being upwards of 300 Sail, which were joined by several Coasters from this Place: One of the Fleet put in here, called the Loyalty of Bidford, John Heart Master, laden with Salt. This day arrived here the Queen Packet-Boat, in 12 days from Lisbon: She left Sir George Bing yesterday off of Ushant, the French Squadron being in Brest, into which Harbour some of our Ships had two or three days ago chased 3 of the French Scouts, and were within Gun-shot of them, but they got under the Cannon of their Ports.

Plymouth, June 26. Yesterday arrived here the Betty of this Place, Peter Andart Master, and the Grace of Bididerd, John Grazeitear Master, both from Vana. The same day came in Her Majesty's Ships the Gosport and the Fubbs Yacht, which left the Squadron commanded by Admiral Bing, off of Uffant. This morning came in the Justow-Margaret from North-Bergen, laden with Deals for Breff, being taken by the Squadron under the Command of Admiral Bing.

Bristol, June 27. On the 25th Instant came in here the Experience of this Place, John Worton Commander, from Lisbon. Yesterday came in the Rooke Siboh, Richard Coward Master, from Kinsale: The Master reports, That on Saturday last he saw about 130 Sail of the homeward-bound Lisbon Fleet put into Cork, under Convoy of one of Her Majesty's Ships.

Dartmouth, June 26. Yesterday came in here the Success, the Annelly, and the Mary, all three of this Place, from Ekbon. The homeward-bound Portugal Fleet sailed by at the same time to the Eastward, with a fair Wind.

Yarmouth, June 29. On the 27th came into our Road from Holland the Henrietta Yacht, and also several Ships belonging to this Place, which came thence with a great Fleet, under Convoy of several Dutch Men of War, that passed by on the back of our Sands to the Northward. The Marquis of Carmarthen, with the Squadron of Her Majesty's Ships under his Command, having under their Convoy a Fleet of about 150 outward-bound Merchant-men, sailed yesterday morning out of our Road to the Southward. Since my last there are come into our Road about 150 Sail of light Colliers, from the Southward.

St. James's, June 29. His Grace the Duke of Ormond, Lord Lieutenant of Ireland, having left the Administration of that Government to the Rt. Hon. Sir Richard Cox, Lord Chancellor there, and the Rt. Hon. the Lord Curtes, Lieutenant-General of Her Majesty's Forces, who are constituted Lords Justices of that Kingdom during his Grace's Absence; came away from Dublin on board one of Her Majesty's Yachts, convoyed by Her Majesty's Ship, the Seaford, and landed at Chelsea the 26th past: His Grace lay that night at the Lord Cholmondeley's, and arrived here this evening.
