**T**HE last week a Party of 200 French Dragoons on Foot were sent to raise Contributions in the Beillois, in which Province the Enemy had been in Winter-Quarters, and used the Peasants so ill, that they took up Arms, and not only refused to pay the Contributions demanded, but attacked the Dragoons with so much Vigour, that they killed 50 of them, and took all the rest Prisoners, amongst whom were nine Officers. Since this Action all the Peasants continue under their Arms; and the Enemy have not thought fit to endeavour to revenge this Affront: The Duke de Vendosme has offered 6000 Livres to the Peasants for the Ransom of his Officers and Soldiers, with a Pardon for what is past: But the Peasants refused to treat with the Enemy without some General Officer as an Hostage for the Performance of their Promise. Our Foot continues posted between Chivas and the Po, where they are covered with a good Intrenchment: At Castagnito we have three Regiments of Foot, with some Militia, to guard the Mountain: Our Horse is encamped on this side Chivas; and his Royal Highness, with the rest of the General Officers, are quartered at that Town. His Royal Highness has ordered the Militia of the Provinces to be raised to guard our Mountain of Turin, where they are at work to fortifie several Posts, which may hinder the Enemy's approaching us. The 15th the Enemy finished a Bridge they had been making over the Doire, and yesterday they brought over their Artillery and Ammunition from Crescentino; so we expect every moment to hear that they are decamped from Rondizzone. Our Duke received Letters yesterday from Prince Eugene, who gives hopes, that his Royal Highness shall soon hear from him on this side the Oglio. Last night his Royal Highness received News from Casal, that Prince Eugene had passed the Oglio, and defeated 2000 French, that were entrenched on the Borders of that River to guard the Passage; which News has occasioned great Rejoycing here, in hopes that this will oblige the Duke of Vendosme to send some of his Forces towards the Milanese, and put off the Siege of this Place. Yesterday in the evening the Duke of Vendosme viewed the Country about Chivas; and this morning he decamped from Rondizzone and Torazzo, and marched straight to Chivas; but he cannot invest it so long as we can keep our Communication open between that Place and Castagnito, which is of the same use to Chivas, as Crescentino was to Verue.

**Venice, June 26.** The Tuscan-Galley arrived at Leghorne the 17th instant from St. Hellens, having been 33 days in her Passage: She sailed 5 days in Company with Admiral Allemonde and the Dutch Fleet under his Command, and left them a little on this side Cape Fimister: They had in their Passage retaken two English Ships, and taken one from the French. Prince Eugene of Savoy having been further reinforced from Germany, drew all his Forces together, and decamped from Clavardo the 21st past in the evening, marched all that night, and the day following took Post at Roncadello near Ponte del Oglio. When his Forces which were at Salo left that Place to join him, the French sent out a Detachment with intent to have prevented it, but were disappointed: And we just now receive Advice from Bergamo, That notwithstanding the Care which the Grand Prior had taken to secure the Poës

and Passes, the Imperialists had passed the Oglio near Soncino, about 14 miles from Cremona; and, as was thought, would march forward to Lodi, in the Milanese. Prince Eugene by this Means will, in all probability, not only barrafs the French Troops Commanded by the Grand Prior which are marching in order to observe him, but also oblige the Duke of Vendosme to send Detachments into the Milanese, and so put a stop to his Progresses against the Duke of Savoy.

**Vienna, June 27.** The Emperor has accepted the Mediation of England and Holland towards composing the Troubles in Hungary, as the late Emperor his Father had done. This morning Baron Szirmai's Secretary was dispatched with necessary Instructions for the Exchange of Prisoners; and within 2 or 3 days the two Deputies, Vila and Occuluciani, will be sent away, with new Proposals of Peace. Yesterday a Captain arrived here from Pax, with Advice, That General Glockelsberg made himself Master of that Post on the 22d. The Malecontents made a sort of Salley, wherein they killed 24 of the Imperialists, and lost 80 of their own Men. Their Commander Bobhiani was wounded in the Skirmish; upon which Accident the Garison in the night made their Escape over the Bridge. The Malecontents have since been driven away likewise from a small Redoubt they had on the other side of the Danube. Maj. Gen. Vismont is lately come hither from Field-Marshal Erbville, who proposes to march out of the Island of Schur, to engage Count Berzeni near Schiuta; and this evening the Major-General was dispatched with Orders to that purpose. This morning Colonel Durell, Adjutant-General to the Duke of Marlborough, arrived here; and was immediately admitted to Audience of the Emperor; to whom he explained the Reasons which induced his Grace to leave the Moselle, and to march with the English and Dutch Forces under his Command to stop the Progress which the French were making upon the Moselle.

**Paris, July 3.** By Letters from the Duke of Vendosme's Camp before Chivas of the 24th past it appears, That the Attack on that side will be more difficult than was expected; our Men finding themselves under a Necessity of proceeding in the way of a formal Siege, and the Piemontese having over-flooded the Country. These Advices mention an Action between 3 Squadrons of our Horse commanded by the Prince d'Elbeuf, and a Detachment of the Duke of Savoy's Troops, wherein the latter at first had the better, the Prince d'Elbeuf himself being killed, with several others; but upon the advancing of our Piquet Guard were forced to retire.

**Frankfort, July 5.** Our Forces marched the 30th past from Lauterbourg towards Croon Weissenbourg; but upon Advice, That the Marshal de Marfin, having received a second Reinforcement from the Moselle, intended to march in order to take Possession of our Camp at Lauterbourg, they returned thither, and prevented the Enemy's Design. Our Army encamps daily by the Return of the Forces which were marched towards the Moselle.

**From the Camp at Lieu les Beguines, July 9.** The 7th instant the Army commanded by his Grace the D. of Marlborough made a small Motion, and has now its Right at Courtis, the Left extending to Avennes on the Mehaigne, the better to cover the opening between that River and the Jaar. The Army of the States under the Command of Monsieur d'Auverquerque march'd at the same time to the Left, and is encamp'd near Vignamont, that it may be near at hand to cover; and help to carry on the Siege of Huy. The Artillery for the Siege came up by Water on Monday, since which all possible Diligence has been used in landing it; and to day a Battery of 12 Pieces of Cannon and 6 Mortars began to play on Fort Picard: To morrow we expect another will be ready to batter the Old Castle. The first Line of our Army made a great Forage this day towards the Enemy's Lines, between the Camp and St. Tron, with a Guard of 600 Horse and 800 Foot; the second Line being kept all Saddled; and in a readiness to march on the first Alarm; but the Foragers are returned without having met with any Disturbance. The Enemy continue posted with

Brigades within their Lines, the last of their Reinforcement from the Moselle having joined them. His Grace has sent Orders to the Palatine Troops, and to those likewise of the Circle of Westphalia, which were at Trèves, to march to the Rhine; so that, with the Prussians, who are likewise ordered thither, his compared Prince Lewis of Baden will have an Army of 115 Squadrons and near 80 Battalions.

**Hague, July 9. N. S.** The Castle of Huy was invested the 6th instant, and in all appearance will not be able to make a long Resistance. The Rt. Hon. the Earl of Sunderland, Her Majesty of Great Britain's Envoy Extraordinary to the Emperor, and Mr. Stanyan, Her Envoy Extraordinary to the Swiss Cantons, arrived last night from England at Rotterdam, and came hither this day. Letters from Italy and Switzerland give an Account, That Prince Eugene had passed the Oglio the 23d of the last month near Soncino.

**Exmouth, June 30.** This day came in from Cruising the Queen Anne, a Privateer of Zealand, which has taken two Prizes and sent them home; one a French Privateer of 14 Guns; the other a Merchant-man, laden with Wine and Brandy.

**Plimouth, July 1.** The 23rd past came in here Her Majesty's Ship the Eye, with a Prize, called the Mary Rose of St. Malo, of about 80 Tuns, laden with Sugar from St. Domingo. The next day came in several of Her Majesty's Ships from the Eastward. This day came in a Dutch Privateer with a French Prize of 130 Tuns and 18 Guns, laden with Sugar and Cotton from Guadalupa.

**Dartmouth, July 1.** Sir George Bing, with the Squadron of Her Majesty's Ships under his Command, came into Torbay the 29th past; but will sail again as soon as the Wind permits.

**Bristol, July 2.** On the 28th past came in here the Severne and Hort Gallies, both of this Place, in 4 weeks from Leghorne. The same day came in the Cork-Galley of this Place; Joseph Eastmount Commander, in 8 weeks from Antegoa; who bravely defended himself against two French Privateers that attacked him off the North of Scotland. On the 30th at night came in the Anne Pink of this Port in 8 weeks from Nevis. Yesterday came in the James of Derry in 9 weeks from Antegoa, but lost from Londonderry. This day came in the Dolphin of Topham, Samuel Morris Commander, from Oporto, but lost from Coomb.

**Dublin-Castle, June 25.** His Grace the Duke of Ormond being informed of a gross Absurdity committed by inserting in the Address of the House of Commons to his Grace in the Printed Votes of Saturday the 16th instant, these Words, [We Your Grace's most Dutiful and Loyal Subjects,] immediately gave Order to the Lord Chief Justice of the Queen's Bench to examine by what Means the same happened; whereupon it plainly appeared, That the Journal of the House of Commons, and the Address presented to his Grace, both agree in this Expression, [We Her Majesty's most Dutiful and Loyal Subjects.] And the Speaker of the House of Commons, (who according to Custom presented the Proof, and gave Directions for the Printing thereof,) and the Persons who printed the same being examined by the said Chief Justice, do both alledge, That the absurd Expression in the said Print, contrary to the true Address of the Commons, proceeded from Mistake and Oversight.
