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Turin, June 24. N. S.

On the 17th Instant a considerable Detachment from the Duke of Vendôme's Army before Chiavassè passed the Po, and advanced towards Castagneto, with intent to have possession of some rising Grounds near that Place. Our Duke sent out 2 Regiments of Dragoons who secured those Posts, and prevented the Enemy's Design, and they found our Troops on that Point in good Posture, that they did not think fit to attack them. The 18th the Enemy attacked a Country where there were 30 Haydukes who defended themselves so well, that a Detachment of the Regiment of Starnberg coming to their Assistance, the Army were forced to retire with the Loss of 200 Men and wounded, and 20 taken Prisoners. Our Men took from them 150 Fire-Arms, and a great number of Instruments, their Design being to have forced that Post, in case they had taken it. The Duke of Vendôme sent over the Po all his Regiments and Carabiniers, most of the Grenadiers in Army, and 14 Battalions of Foot, who having secured their other Troops near Castagneto, advanced that day towards that Place, intending to have taken it, but found every thing so well disposed, they retired without attempting any thing. In the meantime Count Breuner with 2 Squadrons of Cavalry upon 600 of the Enemy's Horse, commanded by the Prince d'Elbeuf, who lay behind their Camp, Chiavassè, and were supported by some Companies of Grenadiers. Our Men entirely defeated them, killed 200 of the Horse and 85 Grenadiers, and took 20 of the Prince d'Elbeuf himself was killed. The Sieur de Marillac, a Colonel of Horse, was also wounded; 7 or 8 of their Officers were also taken Prisoners, and our Men took one of their Standards. All this was performed with no other Loss than that of about 20 Men killed and wounded. Upon this alarmed the Enemy, that the Duke of Vendôme sent 2000 Dragoons and Carabiniers, and 1000 of Foot, from the other side of the Po, to reinforce his Army before Chiavassè; and he seems now intent upon the Siege of that Place, having sent several Batteries against it.

On the Duke of Vendôme's Camp before Chiavassè, June 26. The 19th Instant there happened an Action between 2 Squadrons of our Horse, commanded by the Prince d'Elbeuf, who had been sent out to view the posture of the Duke of Savoy's Forces were in, and a Detachment of Horse from his Royal Highness's Camp. The Command of Count Breuner, wherein the Prince d'Elbeuf, and a considerable number of our Men were killed, and Colonel Marillac received 8 Wounds, whereof he is since dead. Count Breuner was advancing to near our Camp, was attacked by his Guard, and was obliged to retire. We immediately moved, and our Right stretched itself to the River. Also, the Left extending itself to the River. At night we opened our Trenches, and carried on within 200 Paces of the Count's Camp. At night one of our Batteries began to fire, and several others did yesterday, at noon, so that at present 25 Pieces of Cannon bring up to the Place. About 60 Pieces of Cannon more are sent in two or three days from Casal. The Sieur

de Morangies, a Brigadier General, being in the Trenches, was dangerously wounded. The Duke de la Feuillade arrived at Sufa the 23d inst with 13 Battalions of Foot and a Regiment of Dragoons; and after he had viewed the Posts in the Vallies of Perone and St Martin, he left two Battalions at Sufa for the Security of that Place, and came the 24th to Boffolini, where he is to leave another Battalion to guard the Bridge over the Doria, and to continue his March higher.

From the Grand Prior's Camp near Manerbio, June 26. Prince Eugene having on the 19th and 20th Instant been joined by the Palatine Forces and a considerable number of Recruits, marched the 21st to Nave, whither he had some days before sent a strong Detachment with his Baggage and part of his Artillery; and continuing his March the three days following, advanced beyond Torbole. The Grand Prior decamped the 22d, and came the 24th to this Camp, near the River Mela. The 25th he went with a Detachment to Ponte Vico, and gave Orders for the building of two Bridges there over the Oglio; and at his Return he found that the Imperialists were advancing towards our Right, whereupon the Army drew up in order of Battle, but they marched without attacking us towards Roncadella. We shall continue here to observe their Movements according to which we shall regulate ours.

Vienne, July 1. The Emperor intends to go next week to his Palace at Favorita, and to continue here part of this Season. Some of the Danish Forces designed for Hungary are arrived here, and the rest are still expected. The Malecontents, since the Fort near Pax has been taken from them, have not made any Motion. A Courier lately arrived here from Constantinople, who gives an Account, That the Ottoman Porte continues disposed to maintain the Treaty of Carlowitz, and to entertain a good Correspondence with this Court, and not to give any Assistance to the Malecontents in Hungary.

Strasbourg, July 3. The French Army commanded by the Marshal de Villars marched the 26th past Saarbrück, the 27th to Sargemine, the 28th to Bouquenon, and the 31st Instant came to the Chemin between Zabern and Haguenau, whither the Marshal de Marini came from his Camp to meet him. This day between two and three in the morning the Army marched again in order to join that which is commanded by the Marshal de Marini, and they are to advance afterwards towards Croon-Weissenbourg.

From the Imperial Camp at Lauterbourg, July 6. Count Hohenloern marched the 3d Instant from Croon-Weissenbourg with a Detachment of 1500 Men to reinforce the Garrison of Landau. That day we received a Reinforcement of 3 Regiments of Horse. The 4th the French Army advanced to our Lines near Croon-Weissenbourg, which they attacked with great Fury. Our Forces there at first made a good Resistance, but finding themselves overpowered retired thence with inconsiderable Loss, which fell chiefly upon two independent Companies that were at Weissenbourg. The 5th the Enemy came in light of our Camp, and attacked our advanced Guard, which was obliged to retire. They have been all night intrenching themselves, and erected a Battery of 8 Pieces of Cannon to fire upon us, which has hitherto done us but little Damage. This day they attacked our left Wing, but were repulsed with Loss.

Landau, June 7. The French Army under the Command of the Marshal de Villars and the Marshal de Marini having possessed themselves of our Lines at Croon-Weissenbourg, marched the 31st Instant towards General Thungen's Camp near Lauterbourg, where he is advantageously posted, having the River Lauter before him, a very good Intrenchment on his Right, towards Weissenbourg, the Rhine on his Left, and a Forest behind him. The Enemy attacked him

three several times, but were as often repulsed with considerable Loss, and retired to Scheitel, on the other side of the Lantz, where they are at present encamped. They have erected several Batteries to fire upon General Thungen's Camp, but hitherto with little Success. Yesterday our Army was joined by 31 Battalions, and the Duke of Wirtemberg is marching thither from Philippsbourg, with a further Reinforcement of 4000 Men. The Enemy have for a great number of Days been working to demolish the Lines at Croon-Weissenbourg.

From the Duke of Marlborough's Camp near les Beguines, July 13. N. S. The 9th Instant a Battery of 12 Pieces of Cannon, with 6 Mortars, began to play upon Fort Picard, with so good Success, that General Scholten made the necessary Dispositions that afternoon for attacking it, and our Men with great Bravery bear the Enemy out of the Covered-way, and were resolutely climbing up the Fort, which the Enemy perceiving, they fled into the Castle, however their Commander, with 7 more, were taken Prisoners. They had quitted the Red Fort two hours before; so that in 4 hours we became Masters of both these Forts. The 10th a Battery of 12 Guns and several Mortars was brought to play against the Castle. The 11th a Battery was erected in Fort St. Joseph, which, with the other, had so good Success, that the Enemy seeing a Breach was already made, beat a Parley at 4 a Clock, desiring Leave to march out, and that they should be conducted to Namur; which being refused, they surrendered upon the same Conditions as were allowed to the Dutch; Garrison when the French took that Place about a Month ago, and were made Prisoners of War, our Forces taking possession of the Castle at the same time. The Garrison consisted of 500 Men, commanded by Monsieur de St. Pierre, a Brigadier-General in the French Service; besides whom there was likewise a Governor appointed by the Elector of Cologne. The 12th the Garrison marched out, to the number of 450 Men, besides the sick and wounded, and was carried to Malbricht. Monsieur Scholten began this afternoon to embark the Artillery and Ammunition; which will be ready to fall down the Meuse to-morrow, and in two or three days the Troops that have been employed in this Siege will join the Army. The Loss they have sustained is very inconsiderable. This day the Duke of Marlborough reviewed the Horse of the Right Wing of our Army, as he had done those of the Left two days before, and found them all in very good Condition, notwithstanding the great Marches they have made from the Moselle. To-morrow, his Grace intends to review the first Line of the Foot.

Hague, July 14. N. S. The Army commanded by his Grace the Duke of Marlborough, and that of the States General under the Command of Monsieur d'Auverquerque, continue in the same Camp, as the Enemy do within their Lines. On the 9th Instant our Troops before Huy took Fort Picard and the Red Fort by Storm; and last night an Express came with the News, that the Castle surrendered the 11th. We have an Account from Italy, as well by the way of France, as by Switzerland, that Prince Eugene passed the Oglio the 2d Inst. at Vrago without Opposition; the Marquis de Toralbo, who lay on that side with a Detachment of the Enemy's Troops, retiring to Palazzuolo upon his Highness's Approach; and that his Highness had posted his Army very advantageously near the Adda. Upon Advice of his Highness's Movements, the Grand Prior marched to Sencino, where his Army had its Right, the Left being extended towards Crema. Letters from the Duke of Vendôme's Camp before Chiavari of the 4th Instant say, that he had carried on his Trenches to the foot of the Counter-Scarp, and intended that day to attack the Covered-way; and that he had sent out a Detachment of 3000 Horse to meet the Duke de la Feuillade, who was to join him the 7th with the Forces under his Command.

Dartmouth, July 3. The Squadron of Her Majesty's Ships commanded by Sir George Bingham failed this morning from Torbay to the Westward.

Plimouth, July 3. Her Majesty's Ship the Centurion came in here this morning from Ireland. Sir George Bingham is now off this Harbour with the Squadron of Her Majesty's Ships under his Command.
