From the Imperial Camp near Soncino, July 8. N.S.

THE Grand Prior is encamped at Ombriano, and has sent a Detachment of 5000 Men towards the Adda. We have Advice, That a Reinforcement of Foot, with our heavy Artillery, is come by Water to Salo on the Lake di Guarda.

Venice, July 11. Field-Marshal-General Gronstedt and Duke Maximilian of Hanover are gone from hence to the Imperial Army upon the Rhine, and Field-Marshal-General Heister will be going thither in few days. A Courier arrived here yesterday from Prince Eugene, with Letters dated at Calzo near the Oglio the 2d instant, giving an Account of General Visconti's having defeated 5000 Spanish Battalion near Bergamo; They were reckoned at 1500 Men, whereof 500 were killed upon the Spot, and 300, with their General Toralba, and a considerable number of other Officers, were taken Prisoners. The Imperialists have since made themselves Masters of Ponte Oglio and Palazzuolo, which last Place will be of great Use to them for the erecting of Magazines, and preserving a Communication with Tirol. The Grand Prior had passed the Oglio at Soncino, and expected a Reinforcement of 8000 Men from the Duke de Vendosme.

Berlin, July 18. Monsieur Prebendow Ambassador from Poland, is gone from hence to Dresden, to wait upon the King his Master. The Saxon Forces continue encamped on the Borders of that Electorate; and it is said, that 20000 of them are to march into Poland. We hear, that 8 or 9000 Swedes are marching towards Warsaw; and that the Diet lately summoned by the Cardinal Primate to meet in that City is put off till next Month, in hopes to have it here before it had sat at the time it was first appointed. Letters from Brissau of the 15th say, that the Czar was marching with his Army by long Marches towards Poland; and we are in expectation to hear what he will undertake, the success of which may have a great Influence upon the Affairs of that Country.

Frankfurt, July 19. Our Army continues encamp'd at Lauterbourg, and will shortly be reinforced by the Palatine Troops in the Pay of the States-Général, and those of the Circle of Westphalia, which are returning from the Moselle, and by Five other Palatine Regiments that lie between Mentz and Creutznach. The Troops which the Electorate of Saxony is to furnish, as its Quota, towards carrying on the War, began to march this way the 10th instant, in order likewise to join the Imperial Army: They come by the way of Bamberg and Wurtzbourg. The Enemy are still near Hagenau: The Loss they sustained in their late Attack of our Lines at Lauterbourg is computed at about 1200 Men killed and wounded. It is said, they intend to divide their Army into two Bodies; whereof one will continue near Crois-Weissenbourg, and the other is to be posted on each side of the Rhine, in the Plains of Wayen and Endingen. Letters from Italy say, That Prince Eugene had his Head Quarters at Alzi, and had invested Soncino: That the Grand Prior lay encamped between Ombriano and Cremasco, had reinforced the Garisons of Cremona and Lodi; and expected a Reinforcement from the Duke of Vendosme: And that an Exchange was agreed upon of the German Governor of Mirandola for General Toralba; and of the Imperial Forces which were in that Garrison when the French took it, for an equal Number of French and Spanish Prisoners.

From the Duke of Marlborough's Camp at Vlierbeck, July 23. N.S. Our Army and that of the Enemy continue still in their former Camps, having between them the River Dyle and the City of Louvain, wherein the Enemy have a very strong Garrison, which fire still from the Wall towards our Line, without doing us any manner of Damage. The great Loss we have had for two days past, have so swelled the Dyle, that his Grace has thought fit to defer attempting the Passage of it till such time as the Waters are somewhat abated. The 21st Instant, some Stragglers of the French Army coming over the Dyle, at a Place where they had thrown up some Works on the other side, a Battalion of my Lord Orkney's Regiment was ordered to sustain our Guard of 200 Men posted on this side, upon whose Approach they immediately retired; but our Men pursuing them too far, a Captain of my Lord Orkney's Regiment was killed, and

some few Men wounded, by the Fire from behind their Line. Major-General Wood, who was upon Duty that day, going thither likewise, had a small Contusion, but is abroad again. His Grace has sent the Marquis d'Alegre and the other Officers which are Prisoners to Maastricht, from whence they are to be conducted to Amesford and Rhenen; and the private Soldiers are to be sent from Liege by Water, and to be dispersed in other Towns in Holland. Orders are given for several Regiments in Garrison in Brabant and Flanders to march out, and join Baron Spar, who commands a Body of Troops on that side, and may by this means be in a Condition to enter upon Action. His Grace has appointed to morrow to be observed as a Day of publick Thanksgiving through the whole Army, for our happy Success in forcing the Lines. This morning His Grace went with a Guard of 600 Horse to Arschot, which Place he entered 3 days ago with so much Precipitation, that they left a good quantity of Ammunition in the Garrison. His Grace left there a Detachment of 200 Horse, which will be relieved to morrow by a Battalion of Foot.

 Waters are somewhat abated, in order to pursue the Advantage which his Grace has lately gained over the Enemy. There was on the 20th Instant an Account of about 100 Officers and 2500 private Men which the Troops under his Grace's Command had taken Prisoners, and since the forcing of the Lines: Besides which, the Enemy have lost about 1000 Men killed on the spot, and about 2000 more who have deserted. Baron Hompesch, who had been sent by his Grace to give the States an Account of the Action, was presented by them with a Gold Chain and Medal. Yesterday we received Advice, That our homeward-bound East-India Fleet, consisting of 12 Sail of Merchant-men, was safely arrived in the several Ports, as is also our Eastland Fleet.

Dartmouth, July 13. This day came into our Port the William and from Guernsey, a Privateer, Captain Measurer Commander.

Tarmouth, July 16. Yesterday sailed out of our Road to the Northward about 300 Sail of light Colliers and Coasters, under Convoy of several of Her Majesty's Ships; and in the evening passed through our Road, and the back of our Sands, about 200 Sail more from the Southward, under Convoy of Her Majesty's Ship the Assistance.
