At the Court at Buckingham Palace, the 30th day of July, 1958.

PRESENT,

The QUEEN's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS the Church Commissioners have duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a Scheme bearing date the 22nd day of July, 1958, in the words and figures following, that is to say:

"We, the Church Commissioners, acting in pursuance of the Pastoral Reorganisation Measure, 1949, and the Union of Benefices Measures, 1923 to 1952, now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council the following Scheme which we have prepared with the consent of the Right Reverend William, Bishop of Salisbury (in witness whereof he has signed this Scheme), for effecting the union of the benefice of Maiden Bradley and the benefice of Horningsham, both situate in the diocese of Salisbury.

"SCHEME.

"1. *Union of Benefices.* The benefice of Maiden Bradley and the benefice of Horningsham shall be permanently united together and form one benefice with cure of souls under the style of 'The United Benefice of Maiden Bradley and Horningsham' but the parishes of the said benefices shall continue in all respects distinct.

"2. *Taking effect of union.* If upon the day when any Order of Your Majesty in Council affirming this Scheme is published in the London Gazette the Reverend Harry George Waight shall be the incumbent of both of the said benefices of Maiden Bradley and Horningsham the union shall take effect upon his avoidance thereof, but if upon that day the said benefices shall be vacant the union shall take effect forthwith.

"3. *Parsonage House.* Upon the union taking effect the parsonage house at present belonging to the benefice of Maiden Bradley shall be the house of residence of the incumbent of the united benefice."

And whereas the provisions of the Union of Benefices Measures, 1923 to 1952, the Union of Benefices Rules, 1926 and 1930, and the Pastoral Reorganisation Measure, 1949, relating to the preparation and submission of this Scheme have been duly complied with:

And whereas the said Scheme has been approved by Her Majesty in Council:

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to affirm the said Scheme and to order that it shall be and become effectual in law immediately upon the publication of this Order in the London Gazette.

"We, the Church Commissioners, acting in pursuance of the Pastoral Reorganisation Measure, 1949, of the Union of Benefices Measures, 1923 to 1952, and of the Church Patronage Act, 1870, and the Acts mentioned in the said Act, now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council the following Scheme which we have prepared with the consent of the Right Reverend Leonard, Bishop of Birmingham (in witness whereof he has signed this Scheme), for effecting (1) the union of the benefice of Saint Mary and Saint Ambrose, Edgbaston, and the benefice of Saint Thomas-in-the-Moors, Balsall Heath, and (2) alterations in the boundaries of the parishes of Saint Mary and Saint Ambrose, Edgbaston; Saint Thomas-in-the-Moors, Balsall Heath; Saint Anne, Moseley; and Saint Mary, Moseley; all of which benefices and parishes are situate in the diocese of Birmingham.

"SCHEME.

"Whereas we are satisfied that Thomas Austin Hamilton Baynes of 48, Calthorpe Road, Edgbaston, Birmingham, Chartered Accountant; Roger St. John Mathews of Bouts Farm, Inkberrow in the County of Worcester, Estate Agent; and Edward Spencer Seymour Smith of Phoenix Chambers, Colmore Row, Birmingham, Manufacturer; commonly known as the Trustees of William Sands Cox (hereinafter referred to as 'the said Sands Cox Trustees' are the patrons or persons entitled to present or nominate the benefice of Saint Thomas-in-the-Moors, Balsall Heath:

"And whereas the said Sands Cox Trustees desire to transfer the advowson of the said benefice to the Bishop of Birmingham for the time being:

"And whereas we are satisfied that the transfer will tend to make better provision for the cure of souls:

"(Now, therefore, we, the said Church Commissioners, do humbly recommend and propose to Your Majesty in Council as follows, that is to say:—

"1. *Union of Benefices and Parishes.* The benefice of Saint Mary and Saint Ambrose, Edgbaston, and the benefice of Saint Thomas-in-the-Moors, Balsall Heath, shall be permanently united together and form one benefice with cure of souls under the style of 'The United Benefice of Saint Mary and Saint Ambrose, Edgbaston' and, subject as hereinafter provided, the parishes of the said benefices shall
