

of Your Majesty in Council ratifying this Scheme the said territory shall be severed from the parish of Buttsbury and annexed to the parish of Stock.

"THE SCHEDULE

"All that part (coloured pink on the map annexed hereto) of the parish of Buttsbury which lies to the east of a continuous imaginary line commencing at a point on the boundary which divides the parishes of Stock and Buttsbury in the middle of the stream or ditch flowing along the southern boundary of Long Wood, and continuing thence generally south-westwards along the middle of the last mentioned stream or ditch, the northwestern and western boundaries of close numbered 342 on the map and the western boundary of close numbered 340 to a point opposite the northeastern end of the north-western boundary of close numbered 326, and continuing thence southwestwards to and along the last mentioned boundary and southwards in a straight

line in continuation thereof to the boundary which divides the parishes of Stock and Buttsbury."

And whereas the provisions of the New Parishes Measure, 1943, relating to the preparation and submission of this Scheme, have been duly complied with:

And whereas the said Scheme has been approved by Her Majesty in Council:

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said Scheme, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately upon the publication of this Order in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Measure.

And Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said diocese of Chelmsford.

WHEREAS the Minister of Housing and Local Government, after giving to the Incumbent and Churchwardens of the Parish of Aldeby, in the County of Norfolk, ten days' previous notice of his intention in that behalf, has, under the provisions of the Burial Act, 1853, as amended by subsequent enactments, made a Representation to Her Majesty in Council that, for the protection of the Public Health, the opening of any new burial ground in the Civil Parish of Aldeby in the said County of Norfolk, save with the previous approval of the Minister of Housing and Local Government, should be prohibited, and that burials should be discontinued therein as follows, viz.:-

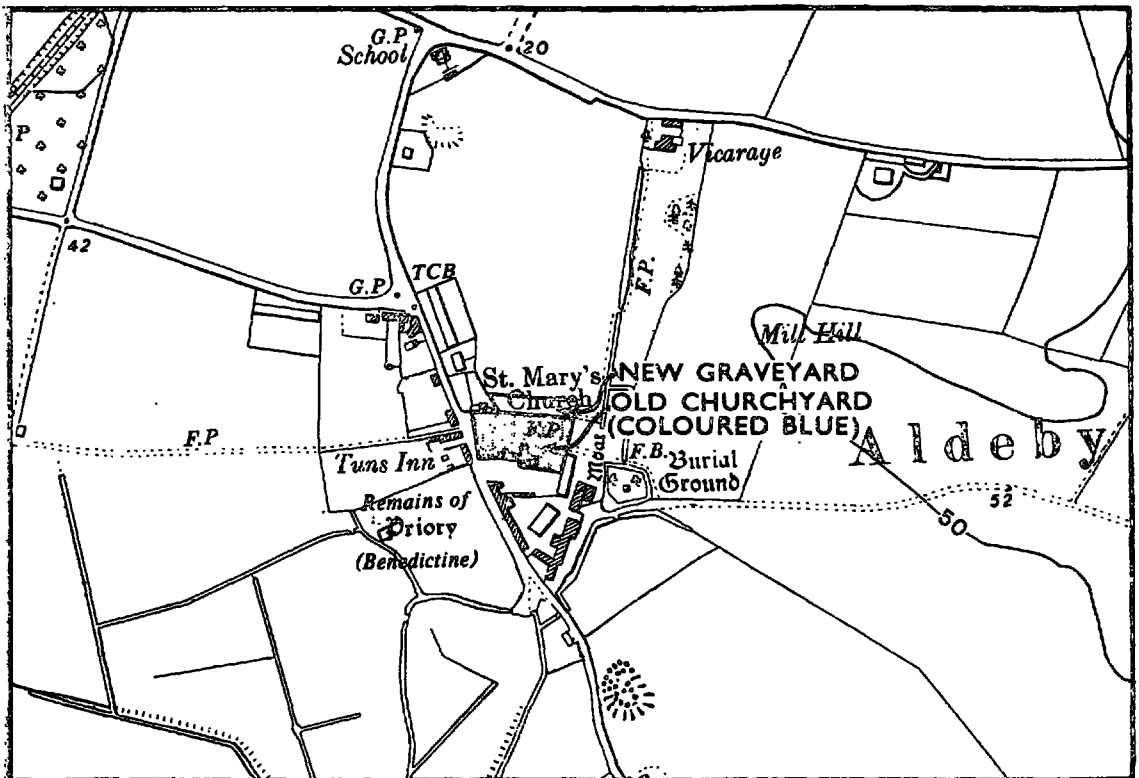
Aldeby.—Forthwith and entirely in the old Churchyard of St. Mary's Church, in the said Parish, coloured blue on the plan annexed hereto.

Now, therefore, Her Majesty in Council is pleased hereby to give Notice of such Representation and to order that the same be taken into consideration by a Committee of the Privy Council on the 16th day of September next.

And Her Majesty is further pleased to direct that this Order be forthwith published in the London Gazette, and that copies thereof be affixed on the doors of the Churches or Chapels of, or on some conspicuous places within, the Parish affected by such Representation one month before the said 16th day of September.

WHEREAS the Church Commissioners have duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a Scheme bearing date the 25th day of July, 1958, in the words and figures following, that is to say:—

"We, the Church Commissioners, acting in pursuance of the New Parishes Measure, 1943, have prepared and now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council the following Scheme for altering the

boundaries of the parishes of Lewtrenchard with Thrushelton, Bratton Clovelly and Broadwoodwidge, all in the diocese of Exeter.

"SCHEME.

"Whereas we are satisfied that it is desirable that the boundaries of the said parishes should be altered in the manner hereinafter mentioned:

"And whereas the Right Reverend Robert, Bishop of Exeter, consents to the proposed arrangements (in testimony whereof he has executed this Scheme):

"Now, therefore, we, the said Church Commissioners, humbly recommend and propose that from
