“THE SCHEDULE.

“(a) Territory to be annexed to the parish of Lewtrenchard with Thrushelton:—

all that part (coloured pink on the map annexed hereto) of the parish of Bratton Clovelly, which lies within the boundary of the civil parish of Thrushelton.

“(b) Territory to be annexed to the parish of Broadwoodwidger:—

all that part (coloured blue on the map) of the parish of Bratton Clovelly which lies within the boundary of the civil parish of Broadwoodwidger.”

And whereas the provisions of the New Parishes Measure, 1943, relating to the preparation and submission of this Scheme, have been duly complied with:

And whereas the said Scheme has been approved by Her Majesty in Council:

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said Scheme, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately upon the publication of this Order in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Measure.

And Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said diocese of Exeter.

WHEREAS the Church Commissioners have duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a Scheme bearing date the 25th day of July, 1958, in the words and figures following, that is to say:

“We, the Church Commissioners, acting in pursuance of the Pastoral Reorganisation Measure, 1949, and the Union of Benefices Measures, 1923 to 1952, now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council the following Scheme which we have prepared with the consent of the Right Reverend Gerald, Bishop of Chester (in witness whereof he has signed this Scheme), for effecting the union of the benefice of Coddington and the benefice of Handley, both situate in the diocese of Chester.

“SCHEME.

“1. *Union of Benefices.* The benefice of Coddington and the benefice of Handley shall be permanently united together and form one benefice with cure of souls under the style of ‘The United Benefice of Coddington and Handley’ but the parishes of the said benefices shall continue in all respects distinct.

“2. *Taking effect of union.* Upon the day when any Order of Your Majesty in Council affirming this Scheme is published in the London Gazette the union shall forthwith take effect.

“3. *Parsonage House.* Upon the union taking effect the parsonage house at present belonging to the benefice of Handley shall be the house of residence of the incumbent of the united benefice.”

And whereas the provisions of the Union of Benefices Rules, 1926 and 1930, and the Pastoral Reorganisation Measure, 1949, relating to the preparation and submission of this Scheme have been duly complied with:

And whereas the said Scheme has been approved by Her Majesty in Council:

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to affirm the said Scheme and to order that it shall be and become effectual in law immediately upon the publication of this Order in the London Gazette.
