BY THE QUEEN A PROCLAMATION

IN ORDER TO THE ELECTING A PEER OF SCOTLAND

ELIZABETH R. Whereas Archibald James Murray, Lord Sinclair, was duly elected and returned to be one of the Sixteen Peers of Scotland to sit in the House of Peers in the present Parliament of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Northern Ireland, and is since deceased: In order to the Electing a Peer of Scotland to sit in his room, We do, by and with the advice of Our Privy Council, issue forth this Our Royal Proclama-tion, strictly charging and commanding all the Peers of Scotland to assemble and meet at the Palace of Holyroodhouse, at Edinburgh, on Wednesday, the First day of October One thousand nine hundred and fifty-eight at twelve o'clock Noon to nominate and choose a Peer of Scotland to sit and vote in the House of Peers in this present Parliament of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Northern Ireland, in the room of the said Archibald James Murray, Lord Sinclair, deceased, by open Election and Plurality of Voices of such as shall be absent and Flurality of Voices of the Peers that shall be then present, and of the Proxies of such as shall be absent (such Proxies being Peers and producing a Mandate in Writing duly signed before Witnesses and both the Constituent and Proxy being qualified according to Law); and the Lord Clerk Register or the Principal Clerk of Session or, in the absence of both these Officers of Session of, in the absence of both these Officers from any cause, such person as may be designated for the purpose by one of Our Principal Secretaries of State, is hereby required to attend such Meeting, and to take the Votes of the said Peers, and immediately after such Election made and duly examined to certify the Name of the Peer so elected, and attent the same in the presence of examined to certify the Name of the Peer so elected, and to sign and attest the same in the presence of the said Peers the Electors, and return such Certificate into Our High Court of Chancery of Great Britain: And We strictly charge and command that this Our Royal Proclamation be duly published at the Market Cross at Edinburgh and in all the County Towns of Scotland, Ten Days at least before the Time hereby appointed for the Meeting of the said Peers to pro-ceed to such Election.

Given at Our Court at Balmoral, this eleventh day of September, in the year of Our Lord one thousand nine hundred and fifty-eight, and in the seventh year of Our Reign.

DISCONTINUANCE

The Burial Grounds (Billinghay) Order, 1958 Made 11th September 1958

At the Court at Balmoral, the 11th day of September 1958.

PRESENT.

The QUBEN'S Most Excellent Majesty in Council

Whereas the Minister of Housing and Local Govern-Whereas the Minister of Housing and Local Govern-ment, after giving 10 days' previous notice of his intention in that behalf, did, under the provisions of the Burial Act, 1853 (16 & 17 Vict. c. 134), as amended by subsequent enactments, make a Repre-sentation to Her Majesty in Council that for the protection of the Public Health, the opening of any new burial ground in the Civil Parish of Billinghay, in the County of Lincoln, save with the previous approval of the Minister of Housing and Local Government, should be prohibited, and that burials should be discontinued therein as hereinafter directed:

And Whereas by an Order in Council of the 25th June 1958, Notice of such Representation was given, and it was ordered that the same should be taken into consideration by a Committee of the Privy Council on the 12th day of August next, and such Order has been published in the London Gazette, and copies thereof have been affixed, as required by the said Act:

Now, therefore, Her Majesty is pleased, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, to order and it is hereby ordered, as follows:

1. No new burial ground shall be opened in the said Civil Parish of Billinghay save with the previous approval of the Minister of Housing and Local Government, and burials shall be discontinued therein as follows, viz.:

Billinghay—Forthwith and entirely in the Church-vard of the Old Cemetery in the said Parish. Provided that-

In such grave spaces as are already reserved, the burial may be allowed at their decease of the bodies of Thomas Hansford and Mary A. Hansford.

2. This Order may be cited as the Burial Grounds (Billinghay) Order, 1958.
