### HONOURS AND AWARDS

#### CENTRAL CHANCERY OF THE ORDERS OF KNIGHTHOOD

St. James's Palace, London S.W.1.

The QUEEN has been graciously pleased, on the advice of Her Majesty's Canadian Ministers, to approve the award of the George Medal to:

SB.801972 Sergeant Bernard Waugh HOLLIGAN, Canadian Army.

During an exercise in an aircraft engaged in a para-drop, one of the jumpers became entangled in his parachute after jumping from the machine and remained, hanging on a rope, swinging wildly across the stern of the fuselage. Sergeant Holligan displayed outstanding bravery and initiative in effecting the rescue of the parachutist who was eventually pulled back into the aircraft.

#### PRESENT

The QUEEN'S Most Excellent Majesty in Council

Whereas the Church Commissioners have duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a Scheme bearing date, the 26th day of February 1959, in the words and figures following, that is to say:—

"We, the Church Commissioners, acting in pursuance of the New Parishes Measure, 1943, have prepared and now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council the following Scheme for altering the boundaries of the parishes of Brushford, Dulverton and Brompton Regis with Withiel Florey, all in the diocese of Bath and Wells.

#### "SCHEME

"Whereas we are satisfied that it is desirable that the boundaries of the said parishes should be altered in the manner hereinafter mentioned:

"And whereas the Right Reverend William, Bishop of Bath and Wells, consents to the proposed arrangements (in testimony whereof he has executed this Scheme):

"Now, therefore, we, the said Church Commissioners, humbly recommend and propose that from and after the day of the date of publication in the *London Gazette* of any Order of Your Majesty in Council ratifying this Scheme the boundaries of the

said parishes of Brushford, Dulverton and Brompton Regis with Withiel Florey, shall be altered in the manner described in the Schedule hereto and delineated on the map annexed to this Scheme.

#### "THE SCHEDULE

"The territory to be annexed to the parish of Brushford:—

"(a) all that part (coloured pink on the map annexed hereto) of the parish of Dulverton which lies to the southeast of a continuous imaginary line commencing at a point on the boundary which divides the last mentioned parish from the parish of Brushford in the middle of New Bridge over the River Barle and continuing thence northeastwards along the middle of the road which runs from the said bridge to Newbridge Lodge and along the middle of the track leading to Pixton Park to a point opposite the western end of the northern boundary of Steart Wood and continuing northeastwards along the last mentioned boundary and thence generally in the same direction along the north-western boundaries of closes 1312, 1309 and 1308 and along the western boundaries of closes 1307 and 1306 and thence eastwards along the northern boundary of the last mentioned close and in a straight line to the western end of the northern boundary of close numbered 1196 (thereby crossing Puzzlecombe Copse) and continuing thence eastwards and northeastwards along the last mentioned boundary and the northern boundary of close numbered 1195 and thence southwards along the northeastern boundary of the last-mentioned close, and eastwards along the northern boundary of close 1197 and the southern boundary of close 1193 (thereby crossing close 1194) and in a straight line to the eastern boundary of the parish of Dulverton in the middle of the River Exe.

"(b) all that part (coloured blue on the map) of the parish of Brompton Regis with Withiel Florey which lies to the southeast and south of a continuous imaginary line commencing on the boundary which divides the last mentioned parish from the parish of Dulverton at a point on the northern side of Weir Bridge and continuing thence northeastwards along the northwestern boundary of close 1520 and in a straight line in continuation thereof to the southeastern boundary of close numbered 1517 (thereby crossing close numbered 1442) and continuing thence generally northeastwards along the last mentioned boundary and northeastern boundary of the said close and along the north-western boundary of Bury Wood to a point opposite the southern end of the northeastern boundary of close numbered 1405 and continuing thence generally northeastwards to and along the last mentioned boundary thereby crossing close 1449 and along the southwestern, western and northern boundaries of
