

"4. The special gratuities specified in Clause 2 and the special gratuity of £20 referred to in Clause 3 shall not be payable to any rating who is discharged for disciplinary or medical reasons; or for inefficiency or unsuitability; or on account of age; or if he is not recommended for re-engagement.

"5. Applications for voluntary discharge under these regulations may be considered and where such applications are accepted the rating may be eligible for the same gratuity rates as those discharged compulsorily. The Admiralty, however, has the right of withholding permission for discharge under these regulations.

"6. Nothing in these regulations shall preclude the Admiralty from discharging any rating during the currency of this scheme under any other regulations which may be appropriate in his case.

"7. No rating who has at one time received any benefit under these regulations in respect of discharge at that time may be granted any benefit under them in respect of discharge at another time notwithstanding that he may be re-engaged or re-employed in such conditions and with such a termination as would bring him within its scope again.

"8. Where a rating was compulsorily discharged from the Royal Navy immediately prior to the Japanese Occupation of Hong Kong in December 1941, the period of the occupation may be allowed as reckonable service in the assessment of these special gratuities, provided that

(a) the individual served to the latest practicable date prior to the occupation;

(b) his conduct was satisfactory during the occupation period and

(c) he rejoined the Royal Navy as soon as practicable."

Her Majesty, having taken the said Memorial into consideration, was pleased, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, to approve of what is therein proposed.

And the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty are to give the necessary directions herein accordingly.

Whereas the Church Commissioners have duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a Scheme bearing date the 23rd day of April 1959, in the words and figures following, that is to say:

"We, the Church Commissioners, acting in pursuance of the New Parishes Measure, 1943, have prepared and humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council the following Scheme for constituting a new parish to be taken out of the parish of Cheadle in the diocese of Chester.

"SCHEME

"Whereas we, the Church Commissioners, are satisfied that the spiritual interests of the area defined in the Schedule hereto and delineated on the map hereto annexed would be best served by constituting it a new parish:

"And whereas we are satisfied that a suitable endowment thereof will be provided:

"And whereas we have not approved any consecrated church within the area as suitable to be the parish church of the new parish:

"Now, therefore, with the consent of the Right Reverend Gerald, Bishop of Chester (in testimony whereof he has set his hand and affixed his episcopal seal to this Scheme), we, the said Church Commissioners, do humbly recommend and propose as follows, that is to say:

"1. *Constitution*

"(a) As from the date of the licence thereto of a Minister the area defined in the Schedule hereto and delineated on the map hereto annexed shall be a separate district for spiritual purposes.

"(b) As from the date of the consecration of a church within the area approved by us, the said Church Commissioners, as suitable to be a parish church, or if the church is consecrated before such

approval, the date of the approval, the said area shall become a new parish.

"(c) The name of the district (or parish as the case may be) shall be 'The District (or Parish) of Saint Andrew, Cheadle Hulme'.

"2. *Archdeaconry and Rural Deanery*

"The district (or parish) shall be in the Archdeaconry of Macclesfield and in the rural deanery of Stockport.

"THE SCHEDULE

"The area comprising:

"All that part (coloured pink on the map annexed hereto) of the parish of Cheadle which lies to the south of an imaginary line commencing on the boundary which divides the parish of All Saints, Cheadle Hulme, from the parish of Cheadle in the middle of Lady-bridge Road at a point where the road is carried over the middle of Micker Brook and extending thence generally northwestwards along the middle of Micker Brook to a point opposite the northern end of the western boundary of close numbered 695 (on the map) thence southwards to and along the last mentioned boundary and the western boundary of close numbered 693 to its end and in the same straight line to and then northwestwards along the middle of Cheadle Road to a point opposite the middle of an unnamed stream at the northern boundary of close numbered 671 thence southwestwards in a straight line to and then along the middle of the last mentioned stream to a point opposite the northeastern end of the southeastern boundary of close numbered 672 then southwestwards to and along the last mentioned boundary to its end thence in the same straight line (thereby crossing close numbered 616) to the middle of Bruntwood Lane thence southwards along the middle of Bruntwood Lane to a point opposite the northeastern end of the southeastern boundary of close numbered 612 thence southwestwards to and along the last mentioned boundary to its end and thence in a straight line to the northeastern end of the southeastern boundary of close numbered 514 (thereby crossing closes numbered 608 and 609) thence in the same straight line to the boundary in the middle of Wilmslow Road which divides the parish of Cheadle from the parish of Saint Catherine, Heald Green."

And whereas the provisions of the New Parishes Measure, 1943, relating to the preparation and submission of this Scheme, have been duly complied with:

And whereas the said Scheme has been approved by Her Majesty in Council:

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said Scheme, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately upon the publication of this Order in the *London Gazette* pursuant to the said Measure.

And Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said diocese of Chester.

Whereas the Church Commissioners have duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a Scheme bearing date the 1st day of October 1958, in the words and figures following, that is to say:

"We the Church Commissioners, acting in pursuance of the Pastoral Reorganisation Measure, 1949, and the Union of Benefices Measures, 1923 to 1952, now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council the following Scheme which we have prepared with the consent of the Right Reverend George, Bishop of Ripon (in witness whereof he has signed this Scheme), for effecting the union of the benefice of Brearton and the benefice of Nidd, both situate in the diocese of Ripon.

"SCHEME

"1. *Union of Benefices.* The benefice of Brearton and the benefice of Nidd shall be permanently united together and form one benefice with cure of souls under the style of 'The United Benefice of Nidd
