

of Wiveton with Glandford after the severance of the area of the Chapelry of Glandford, which shall be known as 'The Parish of Wiveton', and the parish of Cley next the Sea shall continue in all respects distinct.

"(2) Upon the union taking effect the Reverend Arthur Mellor Gamble, if he is then incumbent of the benefice of Cley next the Sea shall, with his consent (which has been given to us in writing), be the first incumbent of the united benefice.

"(3) *Parsonage House.* Without prejudice to the exercise before the date when the union takes effect of any of the powers conferred by the Parsonages Measures, 1938 and 1947, upon the union taking effect the parsonage house at present belonging to the benefice of Wiveton with Glandford shall, if at that date it so belongs to the said benefice, be the house of residence of the incumbent of the united benefice of Cley with Wiveton.

" 3. *Taking effect of Unions*

"Upon the day when any Order of Your Majesty in Council affirming this Scheme is published in the *London Gazette* the unions shall forthwith take effect.

" 4. *Distribution of Endowments*

Upon the taking effect of the unions hereinbefore recommended and proposed, the endowments and property belonging to the said benefice of Wiveton with Glandford shall be divided and distributed as follows, that is to say, a capital sum of £2,282 6s. 3d. being part of a larger capital sum held by us for the said benefice shall be assigned and annexed to the united benefice of Letheringsett with Bayfield with Glandford and all other the endowments and property of the benefice of Wiveton with Glandford shall be assigned and annexed to the united benefice of Cley with Wiveton, provided that the liability for the repayment to us of the outstanding balance of the principal sum of £41 (together with interest) which by deed dated the first day of December, 1949, is charged upon the endowments and emoluments of the said benefice of Wiveton with Glandford shall, upon the taking effect of the hereinbefore mentioned unions, attach solely to the endowments and emoluments of the united benefice of Cley with Wiveton and the endowments and emoluments of the united benefice of Letheringsett with Bayfield with Glandford shall stand discharged from any of the said liability."

Whereas the Church Commissioners have duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a Scheme bearing date the 23rd day of September, 1959, in the words and figures following, that is to say:

"We, the Church Commissioners, acting in pursuance of the Pastoral Reorganisation Measure, 1949, and the Union of Benefices Measures, 1923 to 1952, now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council the following Scheme which we have prepared with the consent of the Right Reverend Robert, Bishop of Peterborough (in witness whereof he has signed this Scheme), for effecting the union of the benefice of Heyford and the benefice of Stowe Nine Churches, both situate in the diocese of Peterborough.

" SCHEME

" 1. *Union of Benefices.* The benefice of Heyford and the benefice of Stowe Nine Churches shall be permanently united together and form one benefice

with cure of souls under the style of 'The United Benefice of Heyford with Stowe Nine Churches', but the parishes of the said benefices shall continue in all respects distinct.

" 2. *Taking effect of union.* Upon the day when any Order of Your Majesty in Council affirming this Scheme is published in the *London Gazette* the union shall forthwith take effect and the Reverend Robert Hensher if he is then incumbent of the said benefice of Heyford shall, with his consent (testified by his signature hereto), be the first incumbent of the united benefice.

" 3. *Parsonage House.* Without prejudice to the exercise before the date when the union takes effect of any of the powers conferred by the Parsonages Measures, 1938 and 1947, upon the union taking effect the parsonage house at present belonging to the benefice of Heyford shall, if at that date it so belongs to the said benefice, be the house of residence of the incumbent of the united benefice.

" 4. *Patronage.* After the union has taken effect the right of presentation to the united benefice shall be exercised by the patrons of the two benefices alternately, the patron of the benefice of Stowe Nine Churches having the first presentation to the united benefice to be made after the union."

Whereas the Church Commissioners have duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a Scheme bearing date the 24th day of September 1959, in the words and figures following, that is to say:

"We, the Church Commissioners, acting in pursuance of the New Parishes Measure, 1943, have prepared and now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council the following Scheme for altering the boundaries of the parishes of Haddon, Orton Waterville, Orton Longueville and Yaxley, all in the diocese of Ely.

" SCHEME

"Whereas we are satisfied that it is desirable that the boundaries of the said parishes should be altered in the manner hereinafter mentioned:

"And whereas the Right Reverend Noel, Bishop of Ely, consents to the proposed arrangements (in testimony whereof he has executed this Scheme):

"Now, therefore, we, the said Church Commissioners, humbly recommend and propose that from and after the day of the date of publication in the *London Gazette* of any Order of Your Majesty in Council ratifying this Scheme the boundaries of the said parishes of Haddon, Orton Waterville, Orton Longueville and Yaxley shall be altered in the manner described in the Schedule hereto and delineated on the map annexed to this Scheme.

" THE SCHEDULE

" 1. *The territory to be annexed to the parish of Haddon:*

"All that part (coloured green on the map annexed hereto) of the parish of Orton Waterville which lies to the south of an imaginary line commencing on the boundary which divides the parish of Orton Longueville from the parish of Orton Waterville at the point where it crosses the northern boundary of close numbered 23 (on the map) and proceeding thence westwards along the last mentioned boundary and the northern boundary of close numbered 24 to a point on the eastern side of New Road, thence westwards in a straight line across New Road to the northeastern corner of
